

Hodge, Swenson Named As Part-Time Instructors

Ralph Hodge and Christian Swenson have been named as part-time instructors at McPherson College for the 1962-63 academic year.

Professor Christian Swenson from Bethany College will instruct a General Physics course on Monday and Wednesday evenings.

Ralph Hodge will be a part-time instructor in the fields of history and political science. Hodge will teach one section of Western Civilization and American Diplomatic History.

Mr. Hodge taught at the secondary level before entering into business in McPherson. He is a graduate of Southwestern College where he majored in history.

Hodge has a Master's degree from the University of Kansas where he specialized in political science.

College Houses Men In Warren

Plans have been completed to use the second floor of the Warren Hotel in McPherson as a men's residence hall this year. The arrangement is an interim one, providing needed housing until the new men's dormitory is ready for occupancy.

Students housed in the hotel will be responsible to Mr. Wayne Grossnickle, '59, who is to assume the position of head resident and counselor. They are to be subject to the same supervision and regulations governing men housed on campus.

When the new construction is completed a year from now it will make temporary housing facilities unnecessary.

Award Contract For Men's Dorm

The contract for the construction of a new McPherson College men's residence hall has been awarded to the Clarence E. Vollmer Construction Co., Wichita, for a total of \$495,213.

Vollmer was the low bidder with a base proposal of \$531,913. In order to keep within the funds designated for construction, alternate proposals were accepted which reduced the figure to \$495,213.

When questioned concerning the deduct alternates omitted from the contract, college officials stated that they have hopes that private funds may be secured to reinstate these alternates.

The Community Facilities Ad-

ministration has approved a federal loan to finance the construction.

Construction work is expected to be started yet this month or by early October in order that the building will be ready for occupancy by the fall of 1963.

The new dormitory will be located just east of the present Fahnstock Hall on the east side of Lehmer Street. It will face the west toward the main campus.

The three-story structure will be similar in style to Dotzour Hall. The type of construction will be of pre-cast and pre-stressed concrete rather than the lift-slab type as is Dotzour and Mohler Halls. It will provide facilities for 158 men students. Two

students will be housed in each room.

Furnishings
Furnishings in each room will include built-in desks, beds, closets, and a dresser. Only the desk chairs will be movable.

The first floor, in addition to the dormitory rooms, will include a head resident's apartment, an infirmary, a laundry room, a guest room, and public lounge. Each floor also has a lounge in the living areas.

The space used on the first floor for laundry facilities will be typing room areas on the second and third floors.

A name for the dormitory will be determined at a later time by the Board of Trustees.

Mac Announces Cultural Series Season Schedule

A variety of five programs have been announced for the third season of the cultural series at McPherson College. "The Singing Boys of Mexico", a group that has appeared in movies and on television and that has conducted several tour of the United States, will appear Friday, October 19.

NCATE Approves Mac For National Accreditation

McPherson College has been placed on the approved list of institutions preparing public school teachers by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

Dr. D. W. Bittinger, president of McPherson College received notification from the National organization last June.

National accreditation simplifies obtaining a teaching position for graduates across the nation. A graduate from an institution with NCATE approval can get a job in any state regardless of that state's requirements for credit hours in his field. Thirty-four states have reciprocity under NCATE.

To start the accreditation process, the McPherson College faculty conducted an institutional survey of the education program.

A survey team from NCATE came to the campus in Novem-

ber, 1961 to prepare a report for the National Council.

McPherson has had accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and secondary schools for some time.

National accreditation is "a real step forward" for the education department of McPherson, according to Dr. Merlin Frantz, professor of education and psychology.

As of June 3, 1962, there were 363 institutions in the United States approved by the NCATE.

McPherson has received attention in the Midwest recently because it was one of the first among private colleges to incorporate the block system of teacher education.

In the block system the student teacher, during the first semester of the senior year, has a nine-week period of supervised teaching in a public school.

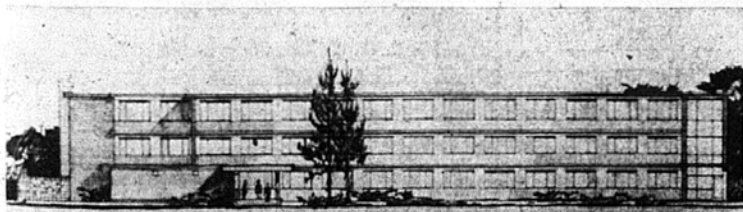
The menu includes a variety of sandwiches and french fries, malts and shakes in three flavors can also be purchased.

Typical of many of the reactions heard on the campus was a comment from Sharon Keith, senior, of Chicago, Ill. "It's about time something like this was started at Mac. The students here are or soon will be of voting age and I feel they are apathetic toward politics. I think the Democrats should get started too. Maybe we could bring in some Chicago Democrats to get the ball rolling."

Another student also gave the Young GOP encouragement. He stated, "I'm glad to see that an organization exists to bring the truth about our national well-being to Mac students. I would like to see a Young Democrats club formed so that we could have some political clashes."

Robert Crabb, junior from Spartanburg, S. C., had reservations about the new group. He commented, "It's a very good idea, but I think there are too many right-wing tendencies. Nolan Howell, junior from St. John, summed up the typical reaction when he said, "The Rally Master views are too one-sided and radical to be taken seriously, but it is a start and I feel we should all support political parties on Macampus. Every opinion counts."

Weight, Speed Keynote Mac Gridders This Fall

More weight and definitely more speed seem to be the keywords as Macollege's 47 man football squad continues a full schedule of heavy scrimmage workouts in preparation for tomorrow's game with Sterling.

Speed is promised by Central college transfer, Clemon Bailey who will be running at the halfback position. Halfback lettermen returning are Galen Huffman, senior from St. Joseph, Mo., Calvin Unruh, junior from Galva, Larry Crumrine, senior from Hazelton, Ida., will carry the load at offensive halfback, and will be followed closely by Don Kuhlman, junior from Athol.

Two promising freshman prospects at the halfback position are Jim Steale from McPherson and John Chance from DeKalb, Ill. They may see action both offensively and defensively. Steve Krebbiel, McPherson, will also be running at the right halfback spot.

Junior College transfer, Stratman Judson, junior from Piney Woods, Miss., will be running at fullback. Other fullbacks are Larry Bowman, sophomore from Quinter; Tom Reazin, freshman from Lyons; and Laurel Petric, freshman from Marquette, who will see action in the defensive unit.

Freshman quarterback, Buddy Taylor from Thomas, Okla., will play a lot of ball both offensively and defensively. Returning quarterback Nick Petrucci is presently nursing a bruised chest and sprained ankles so probably won't be seeing action for a while.

Jim Brown, freshman from Union, Mo., is also in competition for the quarterback position. Art Hoch, senior from Dwight, is nursing a bruised shoulder. Although he has been transferred from quarterback to fullback, he will be used intermittently at quarterback if necessary.

John Harrison, junior from Beloit has been transferred from back to center position.

Garth Wood, senior from Panora, Iowa, is the strong contender for center position along with John Ratzlaff, sophomore from Buhler who transferred from Hutchinson Junior College this year, and Jim Emack, freshman from Cabool, Mo.

Gary Wilson, freshman from Peabody, who weighed in at over 200 pounds is expected to play a lot of defensive middle guard.

At the tackle position, Duane Sword, junior from Eldora, Iowa, and Dennis Wallace, junior from Gypsum, will carry the bulk of the offensive load.

Richard Patton, sophomore from McPherson, and Hurley Smith, freshman from Dighton, show promise defensively as well as offensively.

Kellogg Gives Library Grant

McPherson College is one of the ten private, liberal arts colleges in Kansas which will receive a grant of \$10,000 by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation for the purchase of books to improve the quality of its teacher preparation program and to increase the effectiveness of its library service.

This grant is part of a series in a nation-wide three-year program during which a total of \$2,500,000 will be given by the foundation to approximately 250 of the nation's liberal arts colleges.

Institutions considered for the grants were ones which have regional accreditation, well-organized teacher education programs and a need for financial assistance to improve their libraries.

Foundation funds are used for the purchase of books only and distributed over a period of three years.

As a basis for the grant McPherson College was asked to submit a carefully drawn-up, long-range plan describing its teacher education program.

Attention was focused on the need for additional books to increase its effectiveness and that of its library services generally.

Mac Will Offer Speech Major

A total of 24 hours is required for a Speech and Drama major. Mac now offers 11 courses totaling 27 hours. Courses which tentatively will be added are Introduction to Broadcasting and Technical Theatre, increasing the total to 33 hours offered.

The Mac Speech and Drama Department is now working out an approved program with the University of Kansas and Wichita University for those students who are interested in pursuing Speech Therapy Majors.

Mac does not offer all the courses necessary to fulfill the requirements for a certificate in Speech Therapy. The new program would enable students to earn a degree at Mac and complete their requirements in the summer following graduation.

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Mistrust, Poverty, Characterize Much Of World, States Bitterer

"Each day is like looking through a new window into religious understandings and comparisons of values as understood from different places where one stands," commented D. W. Bitterer, president of McPherson College who is in Taichung, Taiwan China.

"Although, Dr. Bitterer said, 'we have been thinking of McPherson College, these feelings are somewhat allayed by the awareness that we are learning many things and getting many new insights into the manners and values of the world's peoples.'

We have dipped into the cultures of Southern Europe; Africa, east and west; Egypt; the Holy Land; the Baghdad, Persian, Babylon area; Saudi Arabia; Pakistan, and a dozen varieties in India.

It is strange how, people mistrust each other and yet how much they need each other! Since we are traveling with no group we have time to meet many people rather individually and to let them talk. They seem to feel we can sympathize and understand!

We have spoken to many groups. In Africa and in India we were continuously preaching or lecturing; 20 to 30 times in Africa, ten or so in India. We hope we have been helpful. We tried.

We think of the college very much. We are more than ever convinced that McPherson and other colleges must help the rest of the world with broadened people. We can never dwell alone anywhere in the world any more. We shall return to our work with
