

Universities Emphasize Need For Qualified Librarians

"Reading Is the Key," is the theme of the seventh annual national observance of Library Week which has been in effect this week, April 12-18.

The McPherson College Library is cooperating with about 1,000 other school, public and special libraries in Kansas in this observance," said Miss Virginia Harris, librarian.

One of the emphases in the 1964 campaign in Kansas is the recruitment of more librarians to meet the tremendous demand for trained personnel in the nation's rapidly growing system of libraries.

There are now 10,000 positions available for men and women who can qualify as librarians, according to Dr. Robert Ellis Lee, chairman of the Department of Library Education at Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia.

"If you like to work with people and enjoy the stimula-

tion of new ideas, you will find a career as a professional librarian especially rewarding," Dr. Lee said.

"You can choose your library—there are opportunities for library service in cities, towns, rural areas and overseas.

"There are public libraries and libraries supported by public and private schools colleges and universities, government agencies, research associations, hospitals and business and industrial firms.

"You can choose your position. You can cultivate almost any of your intellectual interests and exercise almost any special skill that you possess in some type of library service."

Library salaries compare favorably with those in other educational and social service fields. The average salary for the 1962 master's degree graduate, without previous work experience in a library, was \$5,661. Opportunities for advance-

ment are frequent for qualified men and women. Chief librarians, department heads and subject specialists are often paid from \$6,000 to \$12,000 or more.

Along with the material benefits that commonly include vacations, sick leave, retirement plans, and a 40-hour week—there are the personal satisfactions derived from intellectual stimulation, interesting contacts with many different people and congenial work in a pleasant atmosphere.

Library recruiters are looking for candidates with such personal qualifications as intellectual ability, imagination, resourcefulness and understanding of people.

They advise a sound academic preparation including a four-year liberal arts education. For students preparing to become school librarians, the college course would include courses required for certification by the State Department of Education.

Dramatists Present Ibsen's 'Doll's House'

Peg Messick, a junior from Bethesda, Md., will be seen as Ellen, and Joyce Martin, sophomore from Sterling, Ohio, will be seen as Anna.

In his introduction to "A Doll's House," Seymore L. Flaxman of New York University writes, "Henrik Ibsen is the greatest dramatist since Shakespeare. He is the most significant playwright of the modern theatre."

"Ibsen has woven into this play the ideas that charged the atmosphere of his time. Women's rights, the economic basis of middle-class marriage, the theory of heredity, the criticism of orthodox religion—all these appear in "A Doll's House."

Yet the fundamental problem in "A Doll's House" is the conflict between Nora and her possessive, unbending Heimer.

"With this play, Ibsen brought the middle-class tragedy to new heights, proving that the failures of common people can be just as moving as those of kings and queens."

Tonight's production will be set in the period of the 1880's, the time of the play's first production.

A special performance of "A Doll's House" was given Wednesday to members of the McPherson College A Cappella choir who will be on choir tour the nights of regular performances.

Tonight and tomorrow evening, the McPherson College Players will present "A Doll's House" by Henrik Ibsen. The production, directed by Mrs. Wilbur Yoder, director of dramatics, will start at 8 p.m. in Brown Auditorium.

The concert concluded with Mr. Severinsen and the Brass Choir playing the popular tune of "Tenderly."

There they will perform at 11:00 a.m. in the Garden City Church of the Brethren. At 7:30 p.m., they will have travelled to the Eden Valley Church of the Brethren near St. John.

Monday at 9 a.m. they will perform in the St. John High School. At 1:30 p.m. they will be in the Fairfield High School near Langdon. This will be followed by a 3 p.m. stop at the Nickerson High School and a 7:30 p.m. performance at the Hutchinson Church of the Brethren.

Throughout the past a major emphasis has been placed on what we called the McPherson College family. We did this purposefully and with vigor, for we hoped that there would exist within the college group, both from student to student and from faculty to student, a sense of real fellowship. It was our hope that each person at McPherson College would be genuinely concerned for the welfare of every other person.

Within a good family every member seeks to be helpful in whatever problem or burden any other family member may feel. When one member of the family needs special help, all members of the family concentrate on seeking to help that one, knowing that in due time they also may need such concerted help. If one member of the family is weak the stronger members help bear the burdens of the weaker.

For many years this sense of family has operated at McPherson. The students, with some sense of pride, have spoken of themselves as "The McPherson College family". If there were defections within the student group other students in a kindly way often sought to help the defecting students to growth and maturity. Students of those days still call the president and his wife "pop" and "mom".

This emphasis lessened somewhat as we grew large. We now sometimes refer to ourselves as the "McPherson College Community". If we do have an actual awareness of "community", this is good; many of the attributes which constitute a family also belong to a community.

I believe that the values of community con-

sciousness or of family awareness are values which we should not lose, no matter how large we might become. Our sense of community or family should cross all barriers. I feel enthused and hopeful about a "world family."

I have confidence that McPherson College can be a family: I believe that we should take pride in our campus, our home; I covet for us justified pride in our behaviour and our achievements; I know that we can take pride in our alumni who are serving in many parts of the world; I trust that we will eagerly receive many freshmen year by year and as quickly as possible have them become a part of our "family".

If we can continue to be a McPherson family living helpfully together here, perpetually growing in intellectual and spiritual stature we will be better prepared to live in, and contribute to, the larger family which comprises the nation and the world.

Let's keep at it!

City Voters Approve Site For Park

Park and recreation issues were approved by McPherson voters by narrow margins in the city election Tuesday, April 7, as 2,127 local residents cast their ballots at the polls.

The proposal to buy and begin preliminary development of 46 acres for additional park land in the city was approved by a margin of 186 votes.

On the proposal to raise the maximum levy limit by one-half mill for the supervised recreation program, 1,206 yes votes and 877 no votes were cast, for a margin of 329.

Finance Commissioner Les Premer, who ran unopposed on the ticket for his second term in office, received 1,737 complimentary votes.

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De Tour Sets Record In Javelin Throw

Bob DeTour set a new Maccollege record in the javelin with a heave of 198 feet to help the Bulldogs to a second place finish in a quadrangular track meet April 14. The final totals show Kansas Wesleyan 77, Mac 29, Baker 32, and Bethany 26.

DeTour's record throw broke the mark of 191'8" set by Don Widrig, current Maccollege track coach, in 1958.

McPherson College collected three more firsts in this meet: John Chance won the open quarter in 51.8, Gary Coleman won the pole vault at 12'6", and Chance, Larry Bierwirth, Jim Steidle, and John Treadwell combined to win the 880-yd. relay.

Lynn Warner captured two of the four second-places won by Maccollege. Lynn was runner-up

in both the mile and the half mile. Treadwell placed second in the 100-yd. dash, and Galen Bollinger won three points for second in the 2-mile run.

Mac won three thirds—Bierwirth in the 100, Chance in the 330-yd. hurdles, and Steidle in the 220.

Miler Bollinger Suggests Ten-Mile Practice Runs

Running ten miles a day is a sure-fire way to get in shape for track. Ask Galen Bollinger, freshman from Caldwell, Ida., who ran ten miles a day throughout February to ready himself for track season.

As expected Galen is a distance man on the track team, running the one mile and the two mile races.

In the two meets thus far this year Galen has garnered several points for the team, taking fourth place in the mile and third place in the two-mile at Sterling, and taking second in the mile in the meet held at McPherson.

Galen is also an excellent student, majoring in mathematics. At the end of the first semester he had compiled a three point average. This

The Mac track squad failed to score in the mile relay, shot put, discus, high jump, and broad jump. The only event in which they placed two men was the 100-yd. dash.
