The schedule of courses for College at Greeley, will conduct are Written Communications, the 1967 Summer Session has been announced, and is once again designed for entering freshmen as well as for those who want to earn more college

A six-or-eight-week summer session is planned for freshmen who want to accelerate their college program, remove academic deficiencies, enter on a trial basis to prove their abil-ity, enrich their educational experiences, or profit from special help in reading and study skills.

Fall enrollment at McPherson College will be contingent on 5 hours of "C" or better.

Students entering McPherson for the first time are required to make formal application to the Director of Admissions and be accepted by the Admissions Committee. College graduates must present evidence of the completion of a degree at the time of enrollment.

Housing will be available in a new, air-conditioned, carpeted hall, and meal service will be available if there is sufficient in-

Tuition per semester hour will be \$25. A package plan for resident students including tuition, housing, and 18 meals per week for the six-week session from June 26-Aug. 4 will be \$320.

General Biology will be available for four hours credit from May 29 to June 26. Two hours of credit will be given for Metal Design workshop from May 29-June 12. A one-hour workshop in Conservation will be taught by John Colyn, conservation teacher in the McPherson Public Schools, the week of May 29.

Three hours of credit may be earned in Elementary Economics, Psychology of Adjustment or Geology from June 5-June 26. Dr. D. Harold Bowman, director of the Instructional Materials Center, Colorado State

When the big man jumps up and shoots from under the basket, be it a stuff or a layup, what advantage will be prevent ed - somebody has to be up there with him anyway or he


