## Fox gives report to Stuco on activities of FS of ACCK

Reports on the Federated Students of the Associated Colleges of Central Kansas and Kansas College Student Association were given at the Dec. 6 Student Council meeting.

Mike Fox, sr., Valley Center, reported that the following were discussed at the FS of ACCK meeting, Dec. 2 at Bethel College in Newton:

1. Big name group. There is a possibility that the six ACCK colleges will support a big-name group sometime during the second semester.

If the suggestion gets the backing needed, the big-name group will appear in the McPherson High School Roundhouse.

2. Inter-term programs. There have been some problems about enrollment in the inter-term courses because of a lack of communication about the programs being offered by the ACCK schools.

3. Tele-lectures. Bethel and Tabor have tele-lectures. These are amplified lectures given by prominent business or government persons over telephone.

By amplifying these lectures, several hundred students may listen to them. A panel is also formed to ask the lecturer questions. These tele-lectures may be initiated by other ACCK colleges.

There are two exams scheduled for the final day, Dec. 20. From 7:30 - 9:30 a.m. exams will be given for all 7:30 M.W.F. classes. Exams for all 10:30 T.Th. classes will be given from 10 a.m.-12 noon.

Students enrolled in evening classes have been taking their exams during the last scheduled class period.

## Green to teach debate courses next semester

Persons interested in any occupation which requires public speaking might be interested in debating second semester.

Bob R. Green, assistant professor in English, will instruct the lower level course, Practical Debate and the upper level course, Advanced Debate. Both courses are for two hours credit.

The main work of the courses will be in tournaments. Prof. Green said the students will probably participate in five tournaments during the year.

No previous experience is needed to participate in the debate classes.

The debate topic for this year is "Resolved that the federal government shall guarantee a minimum annual cash income to all citizens."

1. KCSA regions. The KCSA schools were divided into three regions. Each school in a region is to discuss problems or suggestions with other schools in that region.

The three regions are A) Ottawa, Baker and College of Emporia; B) Southwestern and Friends; and C) McPherson, Bethany, Kansas Wesleyan, Sterling and Bethel.

2. Executive Steering Committee. This committee, composed of student council presidents, was formed to organize the activities of KCSA.

3. Talent show. The winner of the KCSA second semester Talent Show will be awarded \$100.

Other topics discussed at the Fall Convocation were the sportsmanship trophy and the revision of the KCSA Constitution.

Following the reports, the Student Council appointed Monty Ganshorn, jr., Warsaw, Ind., as Social Committee Chairman.

He was appointed to fill the position which will be vacated at the end of the first semester by Cliff Gates, sr., Alexandria, Va.

The Council also voted to send a letter to the administration requesting the installation of a campus phone in the College Courts.

be charged \$40 for room and board.

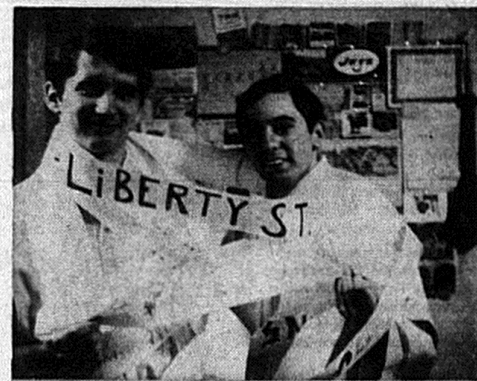

## Faculty to have guest speaker at workshop

Dr. Vivian H. Hewer will be the guest speaker at a faculty workshop held here Jan. 10-11. The theme is "Student Personnel and Counseling."

Dr. Hewer will address the faculty twice. Characteristics of the young adult will be the first topic. Organization and growth of a student personnel program with adaptations to the small college will be the other topic.

Topics of the group discussions following the addresses will be about freshman counseling, faculty advising, coordination of counseling services, extracurricular activities, and housing.

Presently, Dr. Hewer is professor of psychology at the University of Minnesota. She has a bachelor of science in chemistry, a master of science in psychology, and a doctorate in

psychology, all obtained from the University of Minnesota.

Her employment includes counseling in Minn. secondary schools, Minn. State Employment Service, United States Veterans Administration, and the Univ. of Minn., and teaching at Minn. secondary schools and the Univ. of Minn.

She is a member of the American Psychological Association, division of Counseling Psychology; American Personnel and Guidance Association; American College Personnel Association; and the Minn. Psychological Association.

Besides having published various research and professional articles, she was program coordinator of the 1965 National Convention of the American Personnel and Guidance Association.

## Rothrock announces new summer school dates

Summer school courses may be available to McPherson students at other Associated Colleges of Central Kansas schools. An attempt has been made to coordinate the schedules among the ACCK schools.

Dr. Dayton Rothrock, professor of education and psychology, announced that summer school dates will be May 27-Aug. 16.

# McPherson College Players give excellent performance

The bitter wine distilled from the trampled grapes by the "Little Foxes" presented Dec. 7 and 8 in Brown Auditorium by the McPherson College Players was a "Vixen"-ish elixir indeed.

Miss Kerry Givens' performance as the vain and callous Regina Giddens was convincing as she employed her icy cunning to satiate her unrequited lusts.

John Smith dominated every scene in which he appeared with his inspired interpretation of Ben Hubbard. Each foppish gesture and egocentric smirk artfully employed by Smith fascinated morbidly. Even as the audience despised his villainy, it applauded his endearing, cavalier manner. Jaded by self-indulgent living in the grand ante bellum style, Smith's impeccable grooming typified the southern dandy. (We only wished for him a cigar to complete the image.)

As the long-suffering, yet faithful family servants, Sue Duncanson and Tom Nee lent

the necessary comic relief to their portrayals of Addie and Cal. Their collective, expert mannerisms gave favorful tang to the brew.

Vapid, saccharine, yet pathetically winsome was Marilyn Smith in her role as the vacillating, but sweetly respectable "hush lush," Birdie Hubbard. All sympathies were with Birdie as she confessed that she didn't much like her own son, Leo.

Nick Mosher succeeded in alienating any audience affection for the character of Leo Hubbard. The degenerate, young toady, whose every motive culminated in self-interest, was despicably evident in Mosher's excellent characterization.

As the grasping and domineering Oscar Hubbard, Alex Rygas's only deficiency lay in what might be one of the few negative comments which might be said of the total production — a nagging lack of consistency in authentic period costuming and hair styling.

Costuming is, admittedly, a secondary consideration in drama, and accomplished acting can overcome such inadequacies; but desirable esthetics are lost along with illusion.

The single stage setting more than compensated for wardrobe lapses with its symbolic rafter vines and authenticity in period pieces and lighting. Kudos are due those behind the scenes responsible.

During his brief, yet crucial first-act appearance, Jody Serensits adequately fulfilled his plot-furthering role with aplomb. A crafty businessman he appeared to be.

As one of the few tendrils to survive the ravages of the vineyard, "Xan" was artfully reflected in the depiction by Chris Lippy. The audience was relieved to discover in her a gentle and uncomplicated plant, unlighted by perverted entanglements or tie-ups.

So convincingly ill did Mike Loveless appear as the dying Horace Giddens, that the audience expected an impromptu

transfusion to be administered to him momentarily. He died with beautiful convulsions, too.

With the final scene, the audience was left with the compensative thought that the foxes would not escape retribution for their pillage of life's vineyard. In answer to Regina's invitation to sleep in her room, Alexandra replied, "Are you afraid, Mother?" Addie smiled sardonically, and the audience realized that this vixen, at least, would be pursued forever by the "hounds of Heaven."

# Editor says thank-you

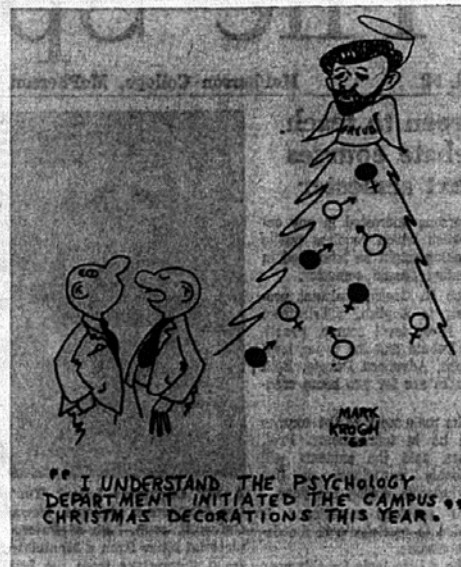

The McPherson College Bulldogs will meet a power-packed Kansas Wesleyan team at Saturday, Dec. 16, for their third conference game of the basketball season.

Game time is 8 p.m. The game will begin at 5:30.

The Bulldogs, coached by Don Meris, lost their first conference game to Friends University 81-69. They had a record of one win and four losses going into the Baker game Tuesday night.

Kansas Wesleyan in Salina has ten returning lettermen including all of last year's starting five.

Larry Williams, 6-6 senior center, and Jack Stroller, 6-5 senior forward, have been providing rebounding strength for the 1966-67 co-champions of the Kansas College Athletic Conference.

High scorers for the Coyotes this year have been senior guards Phil Colman, 5-11, and Bruce Johnson, 6-0; and John Pickett, 6-3 sophomore.

The Bulldogs have two returning lettermen, Don Woodcock, 6-1 senior guard, and Hal Wright, 6-0 sophomore guard.

Other varsity players for McPherson are Larry DeTour, jr., 6-0; Charles Vandervoort, jr., 6-5; Jim Rakes, sr., 6-5; Jim Mowry, soph, 6-3; Jerry Grant, jr., 6-3; Dan Stockstill, sr., 6-5; Stephen Pitts, jr., 6-3; Lowell Monke, jr., 6-2; and Mark Falen, jr., 6-3.

The two teams have not met this year but have both played Tabor College. KWU defeated Tabor 77-62. The Bulldogs lost to Tabor 69-61.

The Coyotes were upset in their first conference game by Southwestern 93-79.

The Bethel Threshers who were 12-9 overall last year and 10-8 in league play, have four returning lettermen.

Miss Pequeno, who graduated from the Sacred Heart of Jesus High School in Matanzas, received her B.A. degree at Wichita State University and plans to finish work on her master's degree there in 1968.

Her major field of study is

languages, particularly French and Spanish.

Her working background prior to coming to McPherson included director of conversation in Spanish at the National Defense Educational Act Summer Institute at Wichita State in 1966, and as translator for Cessna Aircraft Company. In the latter position, she acted as translator in four different languages.

Miss Pequeno came to the United States in 1962 with her brother under the Catholic Social Welfare Service Program. She entered school at Mt. Scholastica College in Atchison, and then went to Wichita to finish work on her degree.

Her brother, who also received his bachelor's degree at Wichita, is now working on his Ph.D. at Southern Illinois.

Miss Pequeno's father used to be the owner of two shoe factories and a lovely home in Matanzas. He had to forfeit everything to the Cuban government, so he and his wife had little more than travel money when they came to the United States.

## Faculty approves new major in psychology

It has officially been announced that a major in psychology will be offered at McPherson College second semester.

The faculty has accepted the recommendation of the Educational Policies Committee of a psychology major based on a 27 hour requirement including general psychology.

The committee also approved the offering of two new upper level courses, Psychometric Methods, and History and Systems of Psychology.

Psychometric Methods, course in test theory and practice, will be offered fall semester, 1968, and will be taught by Dr. Lewis C. Young, associate professor in psychology.

History and Systems of Psychology, a comparative history course in psychology, will be taught by Dr. Galen R. Snell, dean of men. The course will be offered spring semester, 1969.

What is man's relationship to a fragmented world?

The principal speaker, Robert Theobald, who is a noted socioeconomist, talked on the following two topics: "Needed: A Compassionate Revolution" and "Education and Social Reform."

Discussion groups were formed to discuss Theobald's talks and the series of Sunday "Look up and Live" TV programs, which they had been instructed to watch.

Theobald predicted to the 53 students and Brethren Volunteer Service members that if our institutions continue to lose their relevancy to the individuals in them, we stand a fair chance of destroying the very essence of mankind himself.

One of the highlights of the conference was a Celebration Friday night of the awareness of each other. The group met in a large room to do whatever they wanted to, whatever they felt comfortable doing.

Some danced, some made collages and some talked personally, but they all celebrated and expressed the fact that they were alive.

Those who went came back with the basic idea that it was not society that needed a change, but the individuals in it.

The emphasis was on man's awareness of himself in a fragmented world. The individual was urged to look within for the answers to life's and society's problems.

Miss Pugh summed up her idea of the weekend by stating, "The essence was that human love prevails above everything else. We need each other."

Summerhays said, "I would like to see a program on the McPherson campus to stimulate dialogue between the fragmented societies on campus."
