69 students declare candidacy for elections

Student Council elections this year will involve more candidates than in any previous year. At 6 p.m. last Monday, which was the final deadline for petitions to be turned in, 69 students had declared themselves as candidates.

Nine persons are candidates for Student Council executive offices. Three students are running for president, three for vice president, two for secretary and one for treasurer.

Nineteen persons are candidates for Student Council representatives-at-large. Six students are running for senior class representative, five for junior representative, and three for sophomore representative.

One person has petitioned for Student Court chairman.

Twenty persons are candidates for Student Court. Six students are running for senior representative, nine for junior representative, and five for sophomore representative.

Six girls are candidates for varsity cheerleaders.

Student Council elections will be held Friday, March 22. The week of the elections had been named "Speak Week" by the Student Council Election Committee.

"Speak Week" will include many activities for candidates and other interested students. All evening activities will be held in the Student Union lounge.

The first activity will begin at 7 p.m., Monday, March 18. Walter Spitz, speech instructor at Hutchinson Junior Community College, will speak on "Start Your Own Riot." A discussion period, led by Spitz, will follow. Dr. Merlin Frantz and Dr. Galen Snell will lead the session at 9 p.m., Tuesday evening.

Students will be interested in hearing the presidential candidates present their platforms Wednesday night at 9 p.m.

Student accepts teaching position

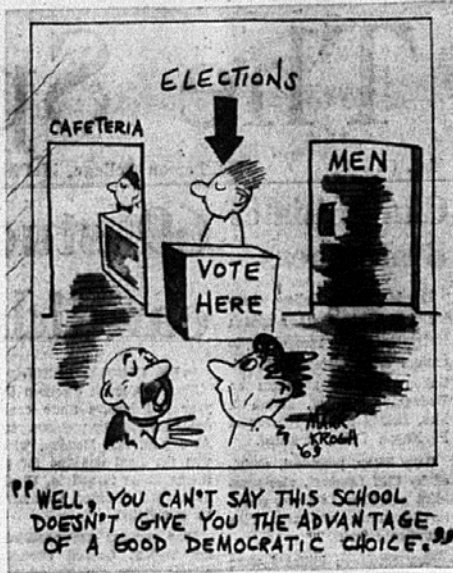

Dear Editor:

April 24 is the date on which colleges and universities all across the nation will be participating in the National Collegiate Presidential Primary known as CHOICE 68.

The Student Council had decided that McPherson College should also become an active part of this opportunity for students to express themselves on issues on the national level.

It should be emphasized that students should not underestimate themselves on the possible role that they can play in the elections of 1968.

James Reston of the New York Times has said, "The politically conscious university students are potentially a very powerful force in this country. Their intelligence and energy could be critical, and in many ways even decisive, if they really got down to the hard work of helping the best candidates available. It all depends, however, on whether they want to dream or work."

answer for those students who would have an influence on the direction this country will take in the next four years, but it is a very important first step.

Students will have a chance on April 24 to let the rest of the country know that they are willing to stand up and be counted.

To date, nearly 1000 colleges with enrollments numbering over five million students, representing 75 per cent of the total student electorate, have decided to participate in the CHOICE 68 election.

Reaction from academic circles has been extremely favorable. Those indicating support for the primary have been Senators Robert Kennedy, Edward Brooke, Charles H. Percy, Eugene McCarthy, and former Vice-President Richard Nixon, among others.

Typical of this pattern of favorable response was that of Senator Joseph D. Tydings, who wrote, in part: "Most college students today are infinitely more mature and aware of national and world events than were their parents at the same age. I think the idea of CHOICE 68 is excellent, and will be anxious to see the results."

Time magazine has agreed to underwrite the cost of the national organization and administration of CHOICE 68.

The program will be run by students, however, and all decision regarding the election will be made by students.

The Board of Directors for CHOICE 68 has finalized the plans for the primary and has selected a slate of candidates for the presidency which will include: Fred Halstead, Mark Hatfield, Lyndon Johnson, Robert Kennedy, Martin Luther King, John Lindsay, Eugene McCarthy, Richard Nixon, Charles Percy, Ronald Reagan, Nelson Rockefeller, Harold Stassen, and George Wallace.

The Board also decided that three referendum questions be included on the ballot. Two deal with the country's current involvement in Vietnam, and one

Concern for peace escalates with war

As the number of troops committed in Vietnam steadily rises and the sickening pictures of death confronting us in the news media multiply, the concern and desire of Americans for peace in Vietnam escalates with the war.

On our campus, as elsewhere, I see people working in several different ways in an attempt to bring us closer to a peaceful world.

One area of concern is interpersonal communications. Love and understanding between individual human beings is the only solid basis on which to build a peaceful world, and those who want peace must continually work toward this fun-

damental goal.

Another area is the intellectual and political realm. Wide reading, open discussion, and deep thinking about world issues is the only practical route toward intelligent democracy in our own country, and hopefully we can work from there toward saner relationships between nations. A deep frustration results for many of us when we realize that in spite of earnest efforts in these areas, the war in Vietnam rages on. Nothing we as individuals can do is likely to prevent thousands more human beings from being killed, wounded, and left homeless in Vietnam.

This frustration is the reason why some of us feel compelled to work in still another area—that of open protest. For those who believe the war is wrong, opposition is the only alternative.

I believe that one must oppose evil even if one cannot prevent it. If one fails to personally oppose what he believes is evil, his failure to act makes him an accomplice in the deed.
