Farouk M. Shalaby, assistant stration and economics, attended Walter Heller's lecture, "The 'New Economics' and the New Nixon," at Oklahoma State University on April 28.

Heller, a faithful disciple of Keynesian or the New Economics, served as chairman of the Council of Econômic Advisers under President Kennedy and as economic consultant to Presi-

Heller stresses that the New Economics has no political label but lists economic alternatives producing similar results. Its goals are full employment. a rapid rate of economic de velopment, price stability, balance of international payments, economic freedom and econom ic opportunity.

Looking into the 1970's, Heller sees continuing prosperity but emphasized that social problems such as civil rights and youth rebellion will remain strong and become inseparable from economic issues

President Nixon will rely more heartily on the tool of monetary rather than fiscal policy, differing from the past ad-ministration, Heller observed.

Inflation will continue in the near future, Heller predicts, stating it would be lucky to reduce the rate of inflation to two and one-half per cent in three years.

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
