## CYR's gather at Capitol

McPherson College Young Republicans sent a delegation of seven to the Annual Resolutions Convention at Topeka Dec. 5-7. The convention was a mock legislature, meeting in the State Capitol House and Senate Chambers.

Members of the convention passed bills relating to a number of current issues: Black studies, liquor by the drink, support of Nixon's Vietnam program, more state appropriation of funds to state universities and colleges, and Black participation in the Republican Party.

Members of the McPherson delegation helped push through many bills. Bunny Helman, head of the Education Committee, presented the education bills to the House. Sylvia Eller pushed a world population bill through the House, but it was defeated in the Senate.

Linda Taplin presented the bill on Black Participation in

the Republican Party in the House which passed it unanimously.

Patrick Hill supported in the Senate the McPherson bills encouraging Black studies and Black participation in the Republican Party.

Members of the McPherson delegation were Patrick Hill and Alan Berndt, senators; Francis DeMarco, Bunny Helman, Linda Taplin, Sylvia Eller, and Tom Urbick, representatives.

Rick Harmon, 1968 gubernatorial candidate, addressed a joint session of the Senate and House on Friday night. Kent Frizzell, Attorney General of Kansas, was at the Capitol on Sunday afternoon to express his views to the legislators.

## Cowsills to appear in concert tonight

The Cowsills, family recording stars, appear tonight in concert at the McPherson College Brown Auditorium at 8:30 p.m. Admission to the concert, sponsored by Student Council, is \$3 in advance or \$3.50 at the door.

"The Rain, The Park, and Other Things," The Cowsills' first million-seller of June, 1967, marked their entrance into national music consciousness.

It was hard work and lots of talent that brought the Cowsills from Hildon Hall, their run-down, 22-room mansion in Newport, R.I., no money, and little furniture to success in the hard business of hard rock.

But The Cowsills — Bob, Paul, John, Barry, Susan, and parents Barbara and Bud — haven't let success effect their family unity that makes them a refreshing addition to the world of pop groups.

Bob started in on the guitar at seven, joining older brother Bill, and they performed as a duo; Barry reached seven and began on the bongos, later switching to bass guitar, having taught John a single drum beat which sparked him to become one of the best and youngest drummers in the U.S. today.

Paul only recently switched from the backstage to performing aspect of Cowsill life, debuting as keyboard man on The Cowsills' second million-seller, "Hair."

Barbara found herself conned into joining her progeny for "The Rain, The Park, and Other Things;" and Susan convinced the boys to accept her as one of The Cowsills in time for the "We Can Fly" album.

Bill and Bob cut their teeth as record producers on the "We Can Fly" single album, and Bob solo'd in the capacity for the first time on "The Prophecy of Daniel and John the Divine." He writes material which the group performs both in concert and on record.

Paul is now finding composing even more of a challenge than his previous passion, football. Bill, who no longer performs and records with the group, has

become an independent producer.

The Cowsills, constantly on the move, recently made a big move, from their Rhode Island mansion to a sprawling Spanish-style home in Santa Monica, Calif.

The Cowsills have appeared on many television shows including Ed Sullivan, Johnny Carson, Merv Griffin, Mike Douglas, Operation Entertainment, Hollywood Palace, and others.

On Dec. 24 they will be featured on the Kraft Music Hall.

The Cowsills have given several concerts in Kansas before and have been welcomed by sell-out crowds each time.

## Choral Concert will be Friday

The Winter Choral Concert, on Friday, Dec. 12, 8 p.m. will feature guest composer John Biggs. Mr. Biggs has been working with the choirs on campus this term.

The concert will be composed of a variety of music ranging from sacred to fun songs.

Those participating in the concert are from A Cappella and Chamber choirs. The Select Ensemble and Male and Female Quartets will also sing.

This is the last convocation of the term.

## Fischer to teach European theater

Charles W. Fischer, assistant professor in English - theater, has been named to teach a World Academy course in the history and development of the European theater this summer.

The course, which includes 40 days in five countries on the Continent plus a specially arranged week in England, will count as six hours of credit for McPherson College students.

The hours will be given in Group Participation and Leadership and the Development of Drama, which meets the literature general distribution requirement.

The course deals with the historical development of the European theater from ancient Greece to the present, including all types of dramatic presentation.

The origin of the theater in Greece and development of various types of Greek plays, the Roman theater and its influence,

and drama as a religious instrument and as a means of entertainment are areas of study.

Scheduled for July and August, the class will visit Rome, Naples, Pompeii, Sorrento, and Venice, Italy; Athens and Thessaloniki, Greece; Nis, Zagreb, Ljubliana, and Belgrade, Yugoslavia; St. Cergue and Geneva, Switzerland; Paris, France, and cities in England.

More information may be obtained from Prof. Fischer.

## Noted musician visits music classes today

Kim Richmond, a musician noted for explorations in the fusion of jazz and rock music, is in McPherson today as composer-clinician for the College music department.

A saxophonist, Richmond's career includes work with a number of outstanding artists, including George Shearing, Jack Jones, Petula Clark, The Doodletown Pipers, Spanky and Our Gang, and the California Tonight Show orchestra.

Richmond will be speaking to the music classes today. He also will visit the high school and work with the McPherson High School Stage Band.

Richmond, now a resident of Los Angeles, Calif., began his musical studies at the Univer-

sity of Illinois, where he played in the University Orchestra, Concert Band, and Wind Ensemble and was lead alto saxophonist and arranger for the University of Illinois Jazz Band.

After studying music composition five years, he joined the "Airmen of Note," the U. S. Air Force Dance Orchestra, spending four years as arranger and soloist.

In 1967 he moved to Los Angeles to join the Stan Kenton Orchestra. Since then, his work has included television, concert, commercial, night club, and theater appearances, and he has written and arranged for the orchestras of Stan Kenton, Buddy Rich, Si Aentner, Les Elgart, and the North Texas State Lab Band.

# FS seeks student reps

The Federated Students of the Associated Colleges of Central Kansas unanimously approved in their meeting in McPherson last Saturday a position paper recommending that student representatives be placed on the major ACKK committees with full voting privileges.

Also discussed was the possibility of obtaining standard identification cards for all ACKK students.

Suggestions for speakers at the Spring leadership conference are being sought.

The next meeting will be Saturday, Feb. 7 at 1:30 p.m. in McPherson.

The approved paper states that FSACKK "has become acutely aware of the need to reach the average student in the ACKK with identifiable benefits from the Federated Students. Due to the lack of adequate financial backing, it is seen as impossible to sponsor large-scale social and cultural events with ACKK-wide partici-

tion. "This fact, along with the belief of the FSACKK Council that education remains the primary goal of the college experience, has led the organization to seek closer ties with the larger organization of the ACKK.

"The route selected would place student representatives on the major ACKK committees with full voting privileges. As students are represented on major committees of the member colleges, it is felt that the larger organization would benefit from student representation on ACKK committees.

"The ACKK organization serves the member colleges, and the colleges serve the students. Representation on ACKK committees would place students on the ground floor of decisions-affecting them. It is the opinion of the FSACKK Council that this involvement would lead to more effective programming of ACKK services and activities."

During Interterm, many students will be leaving campus on field trips. At this date, the Registrar's Office has recorded the number of these students at 142.

Twenty-five students enrolled in Exploration in Visual Art will be going to Chicago. Two students will be traveling abroad for the Literary Odyssey in Southern England.

California is the scene for nine students who are enrolled in Philosophy of Popular Culture. Nine students are also going to Mexico for the Biology field trip.

Geology students, numbering twenty-seven, will be going to Texas and the Gulf of Mexico. Nine students enrolled in Investments will travel to New York.

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Forty-one students enrolled in Urban Sociology will be going to Kansas City. Puerto Rico will be the location for the inter-cultural Education Seminar in which six students from McPherson are enrolled.

There are fourteen students going to Pennsylvania and other eastern locales on the Agricultural Travel course.

## Spring Convo European jobs open

Although the plans for the spring term convocations series have not been finalized, the confirmed dates are as follows: Feb. 12, Handover, Kansas Choral Group; Feb. 19, the production "St. Joan" by the Alpha-Omega Players of Dallas; Feb. 26, Baron Erik Gyldenkrone of Copenhagen, Denmark; March 5, Clinton Duffy, formerly the warden of San Quentin, will speak about capital punishment;

March 19, Martha Towry, a lyric-soprano who has sung in operas and is a senior at Tulsa University majoring in music; April 9, Communication Day sponsored by Student Council; April 16, Warren French, an English instructor at the University of Missouri in Kansas City who is sponsored by the ACCK Department of English;

April 23, Richard Hrdlicka, who is attorney for the Hesston Manufacturing Company and escaped from behind the Iron Curtain; and in the closing convocation, J. Jack Melhorn, President of McPherson College, will speak.

Work this summer in the forests of Germany, on construction in Austria, on a farm in Germany, Sweden, or Denmark, on road construction in Norway, in industries in France or Germany, or in hotels in Switzerland.

There are jobs available in Ireland, England, France, Italy, and Holland as well, open by the consent of the governments of these countries to American university students.

The purpose of this program, sponsored on a non-profit basis by the American-European Student Service, is to afford the student an opportunity to get into real living contact with the people and customs of Europe.

In return for his work, the student will receive his room and board, plus a wage scaled to the European economy. The working conditions will be strictly controlled by the labor ministries of the countries involved.

In most cases, employers have especially requested American

students and hence are interested in the student and making the work interesting for them.
