Long Range committee begins study

"What is McPherson College? Where has it been, where is it headed, how do we get there?"

These are questions the Long Range Planning Committee began to tackle this summer as a two-year study of the College was launched.

The committee is composed of administrators, faculty, students an alumnus, trustee, and moderator; and the thinking of all groups represented is being sought.

Concerns of the committee include developing a concise statement of purpose and setting specific goals, dealing with areas such as the number of students desirable and financial resources.

A major focus of the committee will be a comprehensive curriculum study. In this area, especially, the creative ideas of students relating to the educational process are necessary.

Inevitable questions about the nature and purpose of the College are arising from the inquiry. The relationship between college and church, the value of the present distribution requirements, the financial position of the College — these issues and others are being faced.

Presently, the main task of the two student members is to draw up the mechanics for channeling student ideas into student involvement in the total planning process.

Spec takes on new look

The Spectator takes on a new look this fall with a different size.

Effective ways to hear and organize student voice must be established. Possibilities include group meetings of students in a major field, informal gatherings, or a larger student committee, but further suggestions are needed.

The faculty began to contribute their ideas and time at the faculty retreat August 28-29.

The committee itself began its work with a three day meeting in July. The next meeting will be September 15, when an educational consultant will meet with the group.

Rapid results are not the aim of the committee. The two year period will allow time for study and involvement as well as the use of numerous consultants. A reading list is on reserve in the library for anyone interested.

The student members of the committee, Larry Banks, sr, Culver, Ind., and Susan Krehbiel, jr, McPherson, are eager to involve students in what they feel to be an exciting and most important experience.

The moderator of the committee, Don Steffes, is unaffiliated with the College and a vice-president of McPherson and Citizens State Bank.

Faculty members are Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, professor of chemistry; Dr. G. J. Ikenberry, Jr., professor of biology; Dr. Leland L. Lengel, associate professor of history and political science; Dr. Dayton G. Rothrock, professor of education and psychology; and Dr. Jan van Asselt, associate professor of German and linguistics.

Representing the administration are Dr. J. Jack Melhorn, president of the College; Dr. Merlin L. Frantz, dean of academic affairs; Dr. Galen R. Snell, dean of student affairs; and Gerald J. Holman, director of development.

Other committee members are M. Claire Miller, McPherson, trustee; and Bill Dirks, Wichita, alumnus.

Faculty earn doctorates

Two faculty members earned doctorates.

Jesse D. Krehbiel, associate professor of mathematics, completed his Ed.D. at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater.

Alvin Willems, associate professor in industrial arts education, completed his EdD at the University of Utah.

College gains new staff over summer

McPherson College has added new members to the faculty, administration, and staff over the summer months.

Dale Goldsmith, Chicago, assumes duties in the department of philosophy and religion. He graduated summa cum laude from Princeton University, receiving the AB degree in religion and literature, and obtained the MA degree from the Divinity School of the University of Chicago in Bible.

Goldsmith has all of the work completed at the University of Chicago for his PhD except for the dissertation, which he is presently writing.

Last year he was professor of Biblical literature at Baptist Seminary of Mexico, Mexico City, D. F.

Goldsmith has traveled in Sweden, Costa Rica, and Mexico. He has been studying under a Rockefeller Theological Scholarship.

James Baxter is teaching in the sociology department. He received the AB degree from Transylvania College in mathematics, the STB degree from Boston University in theology, and the MA degree from Boston University in sociology and social ethics.

His thesis for the MA degree is entitled "Boston Hippies."

Baxter has held several Methodist pastorates, and has been director of the Marblehead Arts Festival, the Fair-housing Association, the Family Counseling Center, and a senior citizens program.

Young reads psych report

Dr. Lewis Young, professor of psychology, read a report at the annual meeting of the American Psychological Association in Washington, D. C., over Labor Day weekend.

The report, "An Undergraduate Practicum for Senior Psychology Students in a Mental Hospital Setting," was read at a meeting of the association's Division Two, the division of the teaching of psychology.

Dr. Young and Dr. James Harris, chief psychologist at Larned State Hospital, prepared the report and in it summarized the in-service training program for Associated Colleges of Central Kansas students conducted at Larned State Hospital during January, 1969.

Jean-Michel Fulgraff, a graduate of the University of Strasbourg teaches French.

Fulgraff has passed the French examinations with the equivalency of a masters degree, and is preparing a thesis for the third cycle, which is work beyond the masters.

He held the position as instructor in French and English at the Lycee Barthelemy in Colmar, France.

Mrs. Anne Shalaby teaches in the English department in the absence of Dr. Harley Stump, professor of English, who is on sabbatical leave.

Mrs. Shalaby received the AB and MA degrees from Oklahoma State University in English, and has attended the University of Chicago in graduate work beyond the masters.

Her graduate thesis is entitled "The Development of Dylan Thomas' Use of Private Symbolism in Poetry."

Mrs. Shalaby was the recipient of the J. B. Parriott Fellowship and the Phillips Petroleum Company Scholarship.

She taught at Southwestern High School in Kansas City, Mo., and at Oklahoma State University.

Howard Barr joins the faculty as associate professor in music. Barr received the Bachelor of Music Education from Texas Wesleyan College, and the Master of Music from Texas Christian University.

He studied piano with Stefan Bardas at North Texas University and has begun work toward a Doctorate of Musical Arts at the University of Missouri, Kansas City.

Barr had taught at Marymount College since 1965, and with his wife, has toured the United States as duo piano concert artists.

Jess Cooper will work in the education department. Cooper received the BS in mathematics and science from Ottawa University and the MA in education from Kansas University.

He has served in teaching and administrative positions at schools in Elk Falls, Blue Rapids, Salina, and Pratt.

Cooper was president of Pratt Community Junior College.

Gene Hill will take over duties in the industrial arts education department. Hill received the BS in industrial arts from Kansas State College, Pittsburg, and the MA in industrial arts from California State College, Long Beach.

He taught industrial arts at McFadden Junior High School in Santa Ana, Calif.

Stanley Price assumes duties in the English department. Price received the BA in English from LaVerne College and the MA in English from California State College, Los Angeles.

He taught at Chaffey Junior College, Alta Loma, Calif., 1966-1967.

Dennis Heisey will be the new admissions counselor. Heisey received the BS in business administration and agriculture from McPherson College in 1968.

He had worked for the New Holland division of Sperry Rand at Memphis, Tenn.

William Knuckles will be the head football and baseball coach. Knuckles received the BS in physical education from Denver University and the MA in physical education from Colorado State College, Greeley.

He has coached high school teams in Colorado and Washington and has served on coaching staffs at Whitworth College, Spokane, Wash., and University of Idaho, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale.

Knuckles was most recently coaching at University of Louisville, Ky.

Mrs. Anne Price will be the new Dean of Women and Assistant Dean of Students. Mrs. Price received the BA in religion, education, and psychology from Bridgewater College.

Mrs. Price has worked as an elementary school teacher in Virginia and California, a social worker in Chicago, associate director of Brethren Volunteer Service training, and Director of Christian Education for the LaVerne Church of the Brethren.

Mrs. Price had been Dean of Women at LaVerne College from 1966-69.

Edwin Mohler will be publicity assistant and will be in charge of public relations.

Miss Christina Flory will be assistant registrar. Miss Flory, a 1968 graduate of the College, was employed as assistant in the Registrar's Office.

Mrs. Alma Bruce will serve as secretary to the Dean of Student Affairs.

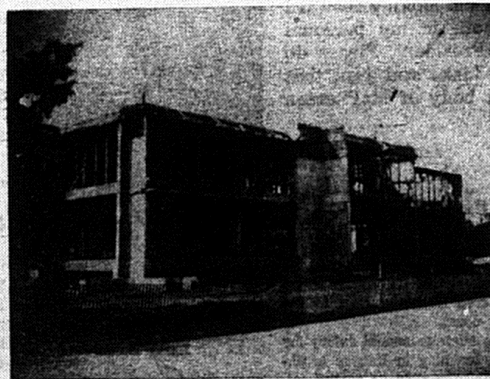

47 grads sign for teaching

McPherson College Teacher Placement Bureau assisted 47 beginning teachers in locating teaching positions during the past year.

The teachers had received their bachelor's degrees within the class of 1969. Of these teachers, 28 have

signed contracts to teach in Kansas schools. Others will go to schools in 11 other states scattered from the East to the West coast.

The average annual salary for those teaching in Kansas is \$6,051, and the average annual salary for the 19 taking jobs out of state is \$6,645.

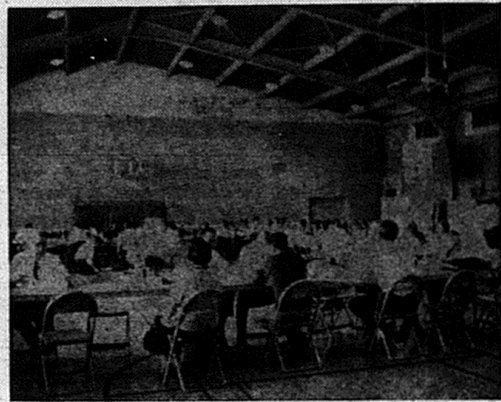

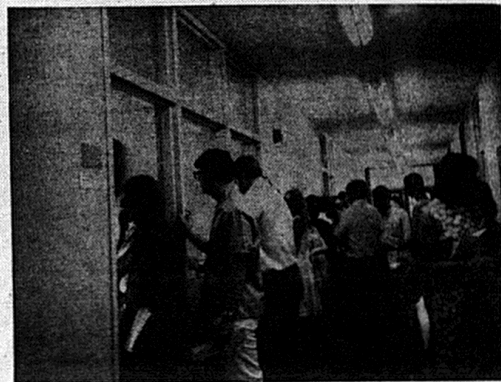
