ACCK employs visiting prof

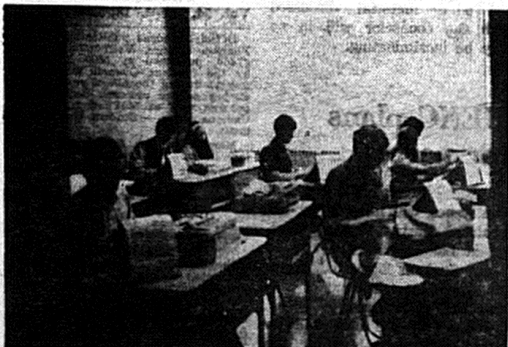
Associated Colleges of Central Kansas has hired Dr. J. Clayton Feaver to be a visiting professor.

Feaver will conduct a course in philosophy, "Science and Human Values," on the Kansas Wesleyan University campus, Salina, Saturday mornings.

He has held the position of a Kingfisher College Professor of philosophy of religion and ethics since 1951 and a David Ross Boyd Professor of philosophy at the University of Oklahoma since 1959.

Feaver has also received the Outstanding Teacher Award at the University of Oklahoma as Kingfisher College Professor.

His major responsibility at the University of Oklahoma is to introduce and develop a core curriculum in the philosophy of religion and ethics.

Film reveals 'Third Reich'

"The Rise and Fall of the Third Reich," portraying one of history's darkest hours, was shown in the second Convocation program this morning.

The documentary, based on William L. Shirer's best-selling novel of the same name, traced the entire life of Adolph Hitler, from his birth in a Bavarian inn to his death in a Berlin chancellor.

Rate and familiar film clips along with the eye-witness accounts of Shirer gave the true picture of the brute force which marked Hitler's reign of terror.

Richard Basehart narrated the remainder of the documentary which was condensed from the original American Broadcasting Company's television program.

Mac evaluates 1969 interterm

Roles switched when College students completed lengthy report cards evaluating the College's interterm program during May, 1969.

The 33-point questionnaire, completed by 379 students, evaluated course offerings, personal reactions, and student attitudes toward the 1969 interterm.

Response from the survey showed that more than 80 per cent of the students believed the interterm program should include intensive study in topics of special interest or courses not available during regular terms.

Of the 30 per cent of the College students who traveled off campus, an overwhelming majority of them endorsed study-travel experience, but some of them felt that finances may limit student participation.

While 71 per cent of the students said class work was at least as demanding as regular classes, only 25 per cent said interterm grades were below their average, and 47 per cent said interterm grades raised their grade point average.

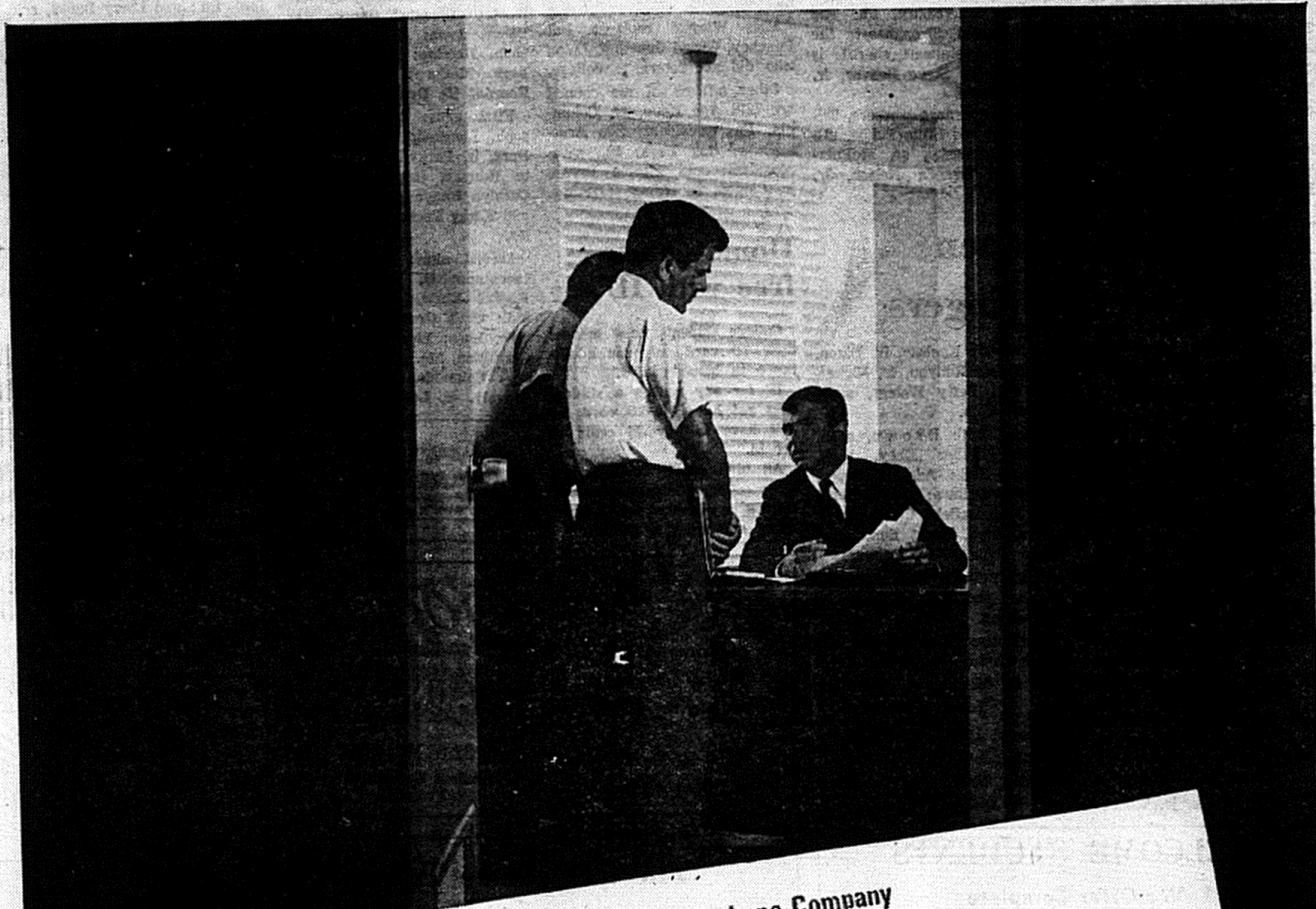
