## Youth center plans approved

Plans to renovate first floor Bittinger Hall to serve as the McPherson County Youth Care Center were approved at the April 24th meeting of the McPherson Board of Zoning Appeals.

At the public hearing which attracted about 50 McPherson residents, the board approved a special permit and dismissed several objections of nearby Bittinger Hall residents.

The meeting opened with a presentation of the history and organization of the Youth Care Center program. The operation was described and Robert Keim, professor of sociology, explained the college's role in the program.

Al Goodson, who lives across from Bittinger Hall on East

Gordon Street presented a petition with 200 signatures to protest the location of the center. The Board found that the issue was not one of rezoning, but rather one of issuing a special use permit. Property owners do not have to be notified in case of a special use permit according to City Attorney Robert Stover, who spoke at the meeting.

In response to the accusation that the Youth Care Center would lower property values Bill Adams, a local realtor, stated that he does not think property values will be affected by the center.

Construction began on the center in March in order to obtain a \$55,000 federal grant. Plans indicate that the center will be in operation by May 15.

The idea of having a student representative on the McPherson Board of Trustees that was aired during last month's student body elections is one of Hoover's primary goals.

A student on the Board of Trustees would sit in on meetings where the hiring and firing of faculty and administration is discussed. He would also take part in making policy and financial decisions.

"A student might find some tasks, such as the decisions to hire and fire, too much to bear," commented Hoover.

The procedure for getting a student on the Board of Trustees would be to amend the by-laws of the college. This can be done by a simple majority vote of the trustees.

When asked his stand on having a student trustee, Dr. Galen Snell, president of McPherson College, commented, "As far as I am concerned, this is strictly up to the Board of Trustees. It is not an administrative issue."

Bob Wise, McPherson attorney

and former trustee commented favorably on getting a student trustee.

"I think it's an excellent idea and I don't know why it hasn't been developed before — perhaps the selection process is too difficult," Wise commented.

"Three possibilities that I can see for this process," commented Hoover, "include a student elected trustee, a trustee appointed by the student body president or a trustee appointed by the Board of Trustees."

## Books due

All library materials are due next Wednesday reports Miss Virginia Harris, head librarian. Material may be checked out for a short loan period after that date but Miss Harris and her staff will need to know where the materials are by the 9th.

With books due only once each term, Miss Harris says it is difficult to know if books are being stolen from the library. The whereabouts of several books is questionable. She does report that 25-30 volumes of periodicals are being detained from the binder because one or two issues have been taken from the racks.

"We shall appreciate the cooperation of all students and faculty in returning material which is charged out in their name," states Miss Harris. She encourages all borrowers to check closets and drawers for missing books and return them.

## MCCC views military issue

The McPherson College Community Council considered a request to ban military recruitment from the McPherson College campus in its April 23 meeting.

The following proposal was placed on first reading:

**Be it resolved that McPherson College affirm its opposition to war and the instruments of war by barring all branches of the military from recruiting on the McPherson College campus.**

In support of this proposal, Dan Lichty produced correspondence with HEW, the Library of Congress, and the Secretary of the Senate affirming that there is no direct relationship between military recruitment and National Direct Student Loans, as thought earlier.

Those members of the council favoring the proposal were DeCoursey, Egle, Fox, Keim, Kienholz, Kitzel, Lichty, Mc-

Cadney, Melhorn, Reynolds, Smith, and Strause. Holman and Lengel voted against the resolution. Highbanks abstained. The proposal will have a second reading at next Monday's MCCC meeting.

Considerable discussion followed concerning the Youth Center on the first floor of Bittinger Hall and the possibility of both male and female workers being allowed to live on upper floors in the building. It was generally recognized that the program is still evolving and that what its exact nature will be is yet unknown.

The possibility of having a student and a member of the faculty on the board of Trustees, and a member of the Board of Trustees on MCCC was also discussed. A proposal recommending that the Trustee Board adopt these ideas as policy will be the first item on the agenda for the next meeting.

## Students vital to youth center

The Bittering Youth Center is a great idea come to pass on our campus. We can be excited about this new educational experience in our midst and the part it will play in the lives of boys and girls of this area.

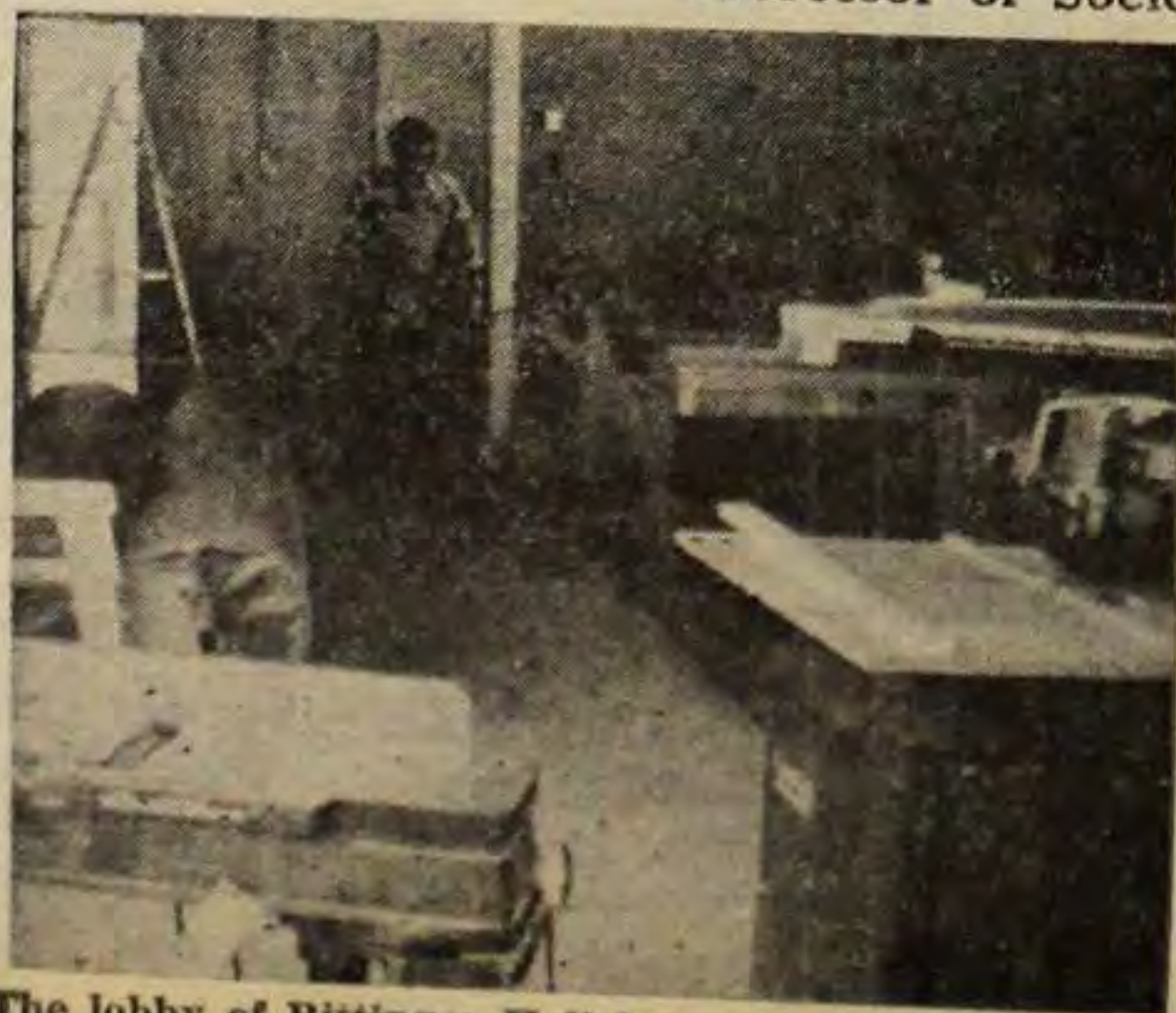
The idea is to provide for a crisis intervention center — a place where youth aged 12 to 17 can find a therapy team concerned enough to help them with their problems. A director, houseparents, a social worker and a caseworker, all trained in the behavioral sciences, will work as a team to diagnose what is wrong, work out a therapy program, and carry it into action in the child's natural setting — his home and community.

These youths will come from many referral agencies in varying degrees of troubled stages. McPherson County and all its surrounding counties will be invited to use the center. Juvenile Courts will make referrals as will the police, schools, social welfare agencies and churches. Some youth may even come by themselves or with their parents before their trouble becomes too great.

Where does the college community come into the picture? We are the big brothers and big sisters. We are the love these kids have missed. We are the companions on hikes, at school, at church, on home visits. We are the eyes and ears of the staff reporting the casual and informal hours. We are an important part of the therapy team.

Bittering Youth Center is a treatment center to help troubled youth regain a normalcy in their lives. I for one am happy we have been given the opportunity to show our concern as, at the same time, we are learning.

# Freshmen compared in nation-wide poll

More McPherson College freshmen come from farm backgrounds than do freshmen in general of the nation's four-year colleges and fewer McPherson freshmen than in general believe that marijuana should be legalized, according to a survey recently reported by the American Council on Education.

McPherson College was among the 246 four-year colleges which participated in the assessment. Results show how McPherson College freshmen compare with freshmen enrolled in other four-year colleges across the nation.

Nationally, only 27.7 per cent

grew up on farms, whereas McPherson freshmen came from farm backgrounds. Only 29.5 per cent of McPherson freshmen agreed that marijuana should be legalized compared with 45.3 per cent nationally.

In many areas, however, McPherson College freshmen were very much like other freshmen. Academically, 51 per cent ranked themselves in the top one-quarter of their high school graduating classes as to 52.1 per cent nationally. Compared with 41.9 per cent nationally, 53.2 per cent of McPherson freshmen agreed that the chief benefit of a college education is that it increases one's earning power.

Politically, 47.2 per cent at McPherson consider themselves middle-of-the-road, 12 per cent conservative, 37 per cent liberal, 2.8 per cent far left and .9 far right. The statistics for all colleges were respectively 46.3 per cent, 16.1 per cent, 34.3 per cent, 2.6 per cent and .7 per cent.

Questions on personal expectations considered "essential" or "very important" to McPherson College freshmen revealed that helping others who are in trouble rated higher (74.8 per cent) than at other colleges (69.7 per cent).

And why did the class of 1976 choose McPherson College? Primarily on the basis of financial assistance (58.7 per cent compared with 22.1 per cent nationally).

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# Bulldogs capture first in ACCK meet

The Battling Bulldog Track Team captured the 7th Annual ACCK Track Meet last week for the third straight year in a row. Mac trailed by as many as 35 points midway through the meet, but came thundering back to erase the Tabor College lead.

The turning point in the meet came when Mac placed second, third and sixth in the 220-yard dash. Later, Randy Porter put on a brilliant display by winning the three-mile and Vic Doll and Rich Randolph finished third and fifth, respectively. Dayton - flash, Jim Anewalt, placed second in the 220, followed by "Mad Dog" Myers third and Bill Reece fifth.

McPherson finished with 171 points, Tabor 160, Bethel 136, Bethany 86 and Sterling 33. KWU did not show.

Bay Lawrence of Tabor was

the outstanding individual of the day. He broke records in the long jump, javelin and 220. He also won the 100 and was on the winning 440-relay team.

Big Roger Kamla broke two records for McPherson with record heaves in the shot put and discus. He also finished fourth in the hammer throw.

Other individual winners for McPherson were Cope in the high jump, Doll in the mile-run, Lynch in the hammer throw and Myers in the 440.

Mac picked up 14 points in both the 880 and the steeplechase as Best and Hirt finished two and three in the steeplechase and Work and Doll went two and three in the 880. Other third-place finishers were Cameron in the 440, Hornbaker in the discus, Porter in the mile and the mile-relay team. The

440-yd. relay team finished second behind Tabor.

A girl's division was also held.

Jan Foley, in the high jump, tied the winning height of 4'8" of a competitor from Kansas State University, but, because of more misses, received 2nd place in the event.

The 880 yard medley relay team — Sue Cook, Jan Foley, Jan Renshaw, and Norma Wilson — took 3rd place with a time of 2:06.9.

Norma Wilson, with a time of 66.3, received 5th place in the 440 yard dash and, with a jump of 14'4½", took 6th place in the long jump.

Sandy Loshbaugh got 6th place in the 880 yard run. Her time was 2:51.

Winning school for the women was K-State with 114 points, second went to Hays with 60 points and third to Kansas University with 28 points.

The McPherson soccer club closed its season last weekend with a home game against Bethany on Saturday and a tournament at Wichita on Sunday. McPherson overpowered Bethany 5-2 on their home field on Saturday. After defeating Bethel in Sunday tournament the team lost to Wichita and would have taken either third or fourth place had a game been played to determine those positions.

The McPherson scoring streak in the Bethany game was started by Vinay Samudre. Only minutes later, Bethany brought the game to a 1-1 tie. Dan Lichty, fullback, put McPherson back in the lead with a high, arching goal kicked from center field. Jose Urzagaste scored a third goal for the club, and at the end of half McPherson

led the ball game 3-1.

Bethany scored a second goal early in the second half, but Luis Quevedo soon countered with a corner kick that bounced off one of Bethany's defensive men into the goal to give McPherson another point. Luis also scored the last goal of the game, bringing the final score to 5-2.

McPherson did somewhat less well in the tournament on Sunday. The first game with Bethel was a hard-fought battle which still had no score at the end of two overtimes. When it was decided to determine the game in a kicking match in which each team would take five penalty kicks, McPherson won 4-2. Scorers for McPherson were Solomon Ifabiya, Jerry Serrador, Luis Quevedo, and Marty Nolan.

With only a ten minute rest, the team started its second game with one of the two Wichita teams present. The only goal scored in the game was against McPherson on a penalty kick in the second half.

McPherson's victors went on to take first place in the tournament. Other teams participating in the contest were a second Wichita soccer club, Southwestern College (second place), and Emporia.
