

MCCC tables issues

In its final meeting of the academic year Monday night, the McPherson College Community Council voted down a resolution that would have banned military recruitment on the McPherson College campus.

In other business, the council tabled until next year a proposal recommending to the Board of Trustees that they consider having a student on the Board and that they select a trustee to represent them on MCCC.

Also tabled until next year was the proposal increasing the number of dorm visitation hours from twelve to thirty-nine that

was passed by the council last semester but vetoed by Dr. Snell, President of McPherson College. The proposal had been re-submitted to MCCC with the one hundred signatures required to bring a resolution already dealt with by the council back to the council for review.

The possibility of off-campus housing for students was the final topic discussed.

Major reasons for the defeat of the proposal on military recruitment were that it would restrict "academic freedom" on campus, that it would decrease the effectiveness of the college's role as a "witness for peace" in the community, and that such an action would be financially

detrimental to McPherson College.

The resolution recommending more interaction between MCCC and the Board of Trustees was tabled because the council felt that more discussion on the subject was necessary than would have been allowed by passing the proposal in a single meeting.

The idea that next year's council would be better qualified to deal with the situation (due to the change in student body that will occur) was the reason for tabling the bill calling for an increased number of visitation hours.

The discussion on off-campus housing for students brought out that the major reasons for the campus residency requirement are financial and are due to various contracts by which the college is legally bound.

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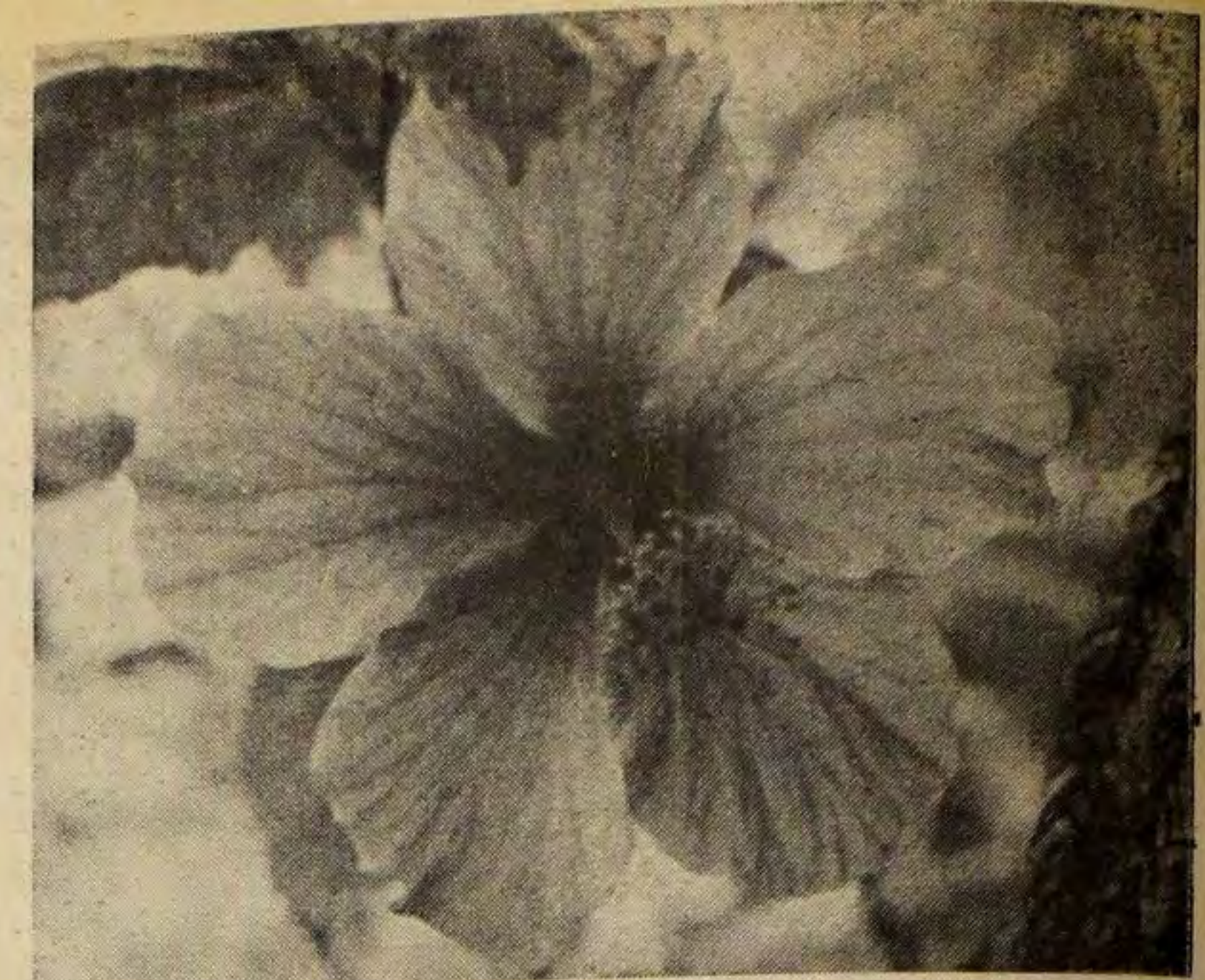
Student directed one-acts commended
