Helpers, typists and nurse's aides are also needed throughout the day. Those interested should contact Glenace, Dave, Joan or Joanne by Monday.

If you have taken any antibiotics during the two weeks before the bloodmobile, you will not be accepted. "If you are questioning whether or not you can give, sign up anyway," Dave stressed.

"Also, eat breakfast," he said. There will not be sack lunches provided, so students are asked to eat lunch in the cafeteria before coming to Friendship Hall over the noon hour. However, snacks will be available.

One-hundred pints is the quota for the day. The committee was

pleased with the turnout at the last bloodmobile and hopes that those who gave then will donate on Thursday.

Stuco president reviews meetings

The spring meeting of the McPherson College Board of Trustees took place Thursday and Friday, March 2 and 3, 1978. Thursday morning, the various trustee committees met to discuss current business and to talk with selected students.

Thursday afternoon, the first session of the full board was called to order by Mr. J. Paul Jewell, Kansas City, Kansas, the chairman of the board. Following the initial comments and acknowledgments, the board went into executive session. Under these circumstances only voting members and the secretary are allowed to attend the meeting.

The full board reconvened and the various trustee committees gave their reports. Mr. Robert Burkholder, Buhler, presented the education committee report. The trustees approved Mr. Burkholder's recommendations for the promotion of Mr. John Cameron, leave of absence for Dr. Richard Zerger and Mr. Paul Graber and sabbatical leaves for Dr. Dayton Rothrock and Professor Bob Green.

There were several concerns

voiced by the board dealing with the approvals and the general education system. There was the concern about the number of people that will be on leave next year, with special attention being given to the physical education department. The resignation of two coaches was discussed, with emphasis being given to its effects on student morale.

Dean Norma Tucker reported that such educational endeavors as Learning Skill Lab, and interterm are valuable assets to students. In addition, Dean Tucker commented on the Auto Restoration Program and particularly of the ineffectiveness of the one year program and the need for more students. Finally, Dean Tucker voiced concern about the rising number of students graduating with honors and the possible need of raising the GPA necessary to attain the various honors.

Dean Merlin Frantz reported on the present status of the North Central Evaluation. His reaction to the written report was very favorable and he stated that an evaluation committee from North Central will be on campus in the near future.

Following a short break, board member Mr. Richard Clinefelter, Littleton, Colo., delivered the admissions committee report. He noted the staff changes and the addition of the tuition deposit of \$75 to be required of all applying students. The tuition deposit is supposed to give the admissions office a more accurate idea of the number of prospective students.

Mr. Clinefelter also reported that student admissions are ahead of schedule this year. In addition, he commented on the need to minimize the emphasis on institutional financial aids and to give more emphasis to the use of governmental forms of financial aid.

Mrs. Kathy Ball, McPherson, chairman of the student life committee, commented on student life and morale and the concern that students either have no channels of effective communications with administrative figures or the existing channels are unknown to students.

Mrs. Ball reported that there is a very negative student attitude toward this year's intramural program. The entire board expressed the need for a well organized and operated intramural program.

Mrs. Ball also noted that McPherson College is a "suitcase college." Through students, she was informed that a large number of students leave campus on the weekends. This severely restricts attendance at planned social events.

The final item of Mrs. Ball's report concerned Fahnestock Hall. Residents of Fanny have written numerous letters to administrative personnel concerning the need for certain repairs and additions. Copies of and responses to each of the letters were given to all the trustees with the hope that Fanny would not be allowed to become another Kline Hall. The Fanny residents believe that they have something special and do not want to lose it due to poor maintenance conditions or mismanagement.

The concerns were well taken by the board: pertinent questions as to why the students feel the way they do, and what, if anything, is being done to remedy the situation. Administrative figures stated that work is being done to improve the situation and assured the trustees that Fanny is under the normal maintenance schedule.

The finance and investments report was presented by Mr. Milton Morrison, Salina, and the development report by Mr. Jack Harter, Northridge, Calif.

Next on the agenda was the president's report. Dr. Paul Hoffman stated that all institutions of higher education, McPherson College included, are faced with certain problems.

There is a decline in the total number of students nation wide. Uncertainty of curriculums, i.e., whether to be vocational or liberal arts oriented, skyrocketing costs, an oversupply of well qualified professors and the current surge

of crime on campus are some of the problems faced today.

He commented briefly on the quality of McPherson College's staff and faculty, but noted that the average ACT scores for entering students have dropped below national averages for the last two years. He also spoke highly of admissions, academics and student services.

The spring meeting of the Board of Trustees is the time when budget proposals are considered. Mr. Alan McNamee, Director of Institutional Research and Financial Planning, approached the board with four possible budget proposals, each of which would leave the institution in better financial shape.

A \$250 tuition increase for next year was agreed upon. None of the four budget proposals were given definite approval.

The board agreed that the money available for administrative and faculty and staff salaries should be increased six percent over this year's budget and that base salaries should be administered by the President of the college.

NIH representative to visit Mac

The National Institutes of Health and its Normal Volunteer Program will be the purpose of a visit to the Mac College campus by Mrs. Esther Taylor, NIH representative.

The National Institutes of Health, which is located in a Washington, D.C. suburb called Bethesda, is a research hospital. Research is done at NIH with those students involved in the Normal Volunteer Program.

"The studies in which volunteers participate reveal information about a variety of normal body functions ranging from sleep or the effects of diet...to biofeedback," states an NIH information pamphlet.

This information aids in the cure of diseases by comparing normal body functions with abnormal body functions.

Students can also obtain credit for the experience by being involved in a "career assignment." This allows the student to work as a lab or research assistant alongside researchers at NIH. Arrangements for credit should be made with an appropriate faculty member.

When asked about the students who would be interested, Professor John Burkholder stated, "The experience is open to all students, although it would be of more interest to those students majoring in biology, psychology and possibly, chemistry."

Compensation for joining the program consists of free room, board, hospital clothes, laundry, and daily essentials. The students also receive a stipend for incidental expenses incurred during their time spent at NIH.

A general meeting for all interested students in either a summer '78 or interterm '79 program will be Wednesday in Harnly Hall, Room 308. All prospective applicants are encouraged to attend this meeting.

All applicants must also be interviewed by Mrs. Taylor. Interviews will last approximately 1/2 hour. Appointments for interviews can be made with Mrs. Betty Barchesky, secretary to the Academic Dean.

Inclement weather affects highways, shrubs, people

Winter has been wicked this year; taking things out on everything around it, including highways, cars, trees and shrubs, and people.

Romo named to KCAC team

Dave Romo, one of McPherson College's senior basketball standouts, has been named to the 1977-78 KCAC All-Conference team. His average of 22 points per game has earned him the distinction of being second highest leading scorer in the conference.

Last year Romo was fifth highest leading scorer in the KCAC and was named to the honorable mention list.

As a junior, Romo transferred to McPherson from New Mexico Military Institute, Roswell, N.M.

"I was looking for a small school to finish up my education," Romo said, explaining why he chose McPherson College.

While at the Institute, Romo was a starting player on the basketball team which was ranked third in the nation in total defense among junior colleges.

Romo himself was selected as the team's best defensive player

both his freshman and sophomore years.

Romo's basketball career dates back to high school. As a member of the Albuquerque, N.M. High School basketball team, he was involved in state competition three years in a row. During his sophomore year, AHS placed first at state, and during his junior and senior years, AHS captured second place.

According to Romo, "My high school coach taught me most about what I know about basketball."

During this past season, the 6'2" senior had a chance to play in the guard, forward and post positions.

"This year I had a chance to play a little of everything," he said.

Looking back, Romo considers being named to the all-tournament

teams at both the Rockhurst and Phillips tournaments as this season's highlights.

After graduation, he plans to return to Albuquerque to teach on either the elementary or the secondary level.

"I'll be certified to teach PE, biology, health and general science," he said.

Graduate school is another possibility. Romo would like to work on a master's degree at a foreign university in Venezuela, Mexico or Europe.

Mac has four returning lettermen out this year. Craig Holman, jr., McPherson, who played first court for the Bulldogs last year is the team's most solid and talented returning player. His powerful serve and great court quickness should make him one of the KCAC's top players.

Marty Ward, sr., McPherson, is a solid and intelligent player. He is not the flashy, quick type, but he gets the job done. He played second court for the Bulldogs last season.

LaMonte Rothrock, soph., McPherson, who played fourth court for Mac last year, is much improved after playing in summer tournaments. He should help the Bulldogs a great deal.

The last of the returning lettermen is Tracy Ikenberry, jr., Quinter, a tough competitor, with lots of court quickness.

The Bulldogs will have to be very strong this year to win the conference title. Mac has four newcomers who should contribute immensely to the squad. One of them is Doug Gayer, who finished third in the state last year at the 3A level. Other newcomers include John Hoffman, Rob McIntosh, and Kevin Crist.

Bethany, who won the KCAC and was ranked 13th in the nation in 1977, should represent the Bulldog's stiffest competition.

Bethany has solid returners this year and is picked to finish first in the KCAC.

Mac is picked to finish second. With an upset here or there, they could be conference champs.

The Bulldogs open their season Wednesday against Washburn here at 2 p.m. The Bulldog's next match will also be at home; Kansas Newman will come to town Thursday, March 23, at 2:30 p.m.

Men tracksters 'hit the road'

The 1978 Mac track season starts tomorrow (March 11) when a squad of 5 or 6 runners and Coach Don Rominger will travel to Fort Worth, Texas, for the Fort Worth Recreation Meet. Then on Thursday the team will travel to Bethany for a triangular with the Swedes and Kansas Wesleyan.

There is a break in competition until after spring break, when the Bulldogs will again travel to Bethany April 5 for the Bethany Invitational.

Other highlights of the season will be two home meets, an April 11 triangular and an invitational meet on May 3 that will feature five teams. The conference meet is May 12 at Southwestern.

There are 12 men out for track this season. This is a much smaller turnout than in recent years. This is at least partly due to the fact that Coach Rominger did not take the job as head track coach until December. Because of the lack of a head coach before

that time, no recruiting took place.

The main strength of this year's Bulldog team will be in the long distance events, from the mile run on up. Dave Burgess, sr., Wamego, has to be considered one of the premier long distance men in the conference. Albert Zavala, jr., Rocky Ford, Colo., is another top runner. But Albert has been injured, and it isn't known when he will be ready for competition. Harold Spencer, fr., Kansas City, lacks experience, but has run some good times during the indoor season, and could surprise some people.

The hurdles should be another strong point. Brian Cordel, soph., Tipton, will be running the intermediate hurdles. Coach Rominger commented that "Brian is in very good shape, and should be a tough competitor."

Adding to the hurdle strength is a transfer from Barton Co. Juco, Stu Sutton. "Stu had an outstanding record as a high school hurdler, and is a major addition to the team," commented Coach Rominger.

Jim Kitson, soph., Haven, adds strength in the middle distances. He had a very good season last year running the half mile, and more outstanding results are expected from him this year.

Also mentioned as having the potential for a good season is Lester Finney, soph., Belle Glade, Fla., who will compete in the hammer throw event.

Other Bulldogs who will be competing are Bob Trocheck, shot put; Dave Hodges, discus; Butch Jones, high jump; John Hoffman, high jump and pole vault; and Keith Hunter, sprint events.

"The Bulldogs will have difficulty in contending for the conference title because of the small size of the team, but should place in at least the top half of the conference," commented Coach Rominger.

"We will be hurting in the sprint events and relays especially. This is, however, a hard-working and dedicated group of athletes, so we can expect some outstanding individual achievements."

Women's track season to begin on Thursday

Quality rather than quantity will have to be the motto of the Mac women's track team this spring.

"This is more than a rebuilding year," stated Coach Don Rominger. "We are just maintaining a track program for those that are interested."

Team members include seniors Deb Enos and Lesley Goodrich, and freshmen Bambi Crumpacker, Terri Enos, and Sandy Sharp.

Deb will compete in the high jump and Terri will be running the 440. Bambi will run the 100 yard dash and Sandy will be participating in the half mile event. Lesley is the team's distance runner.

"It really hurt the team's depth when Sharon Luthi was injured during basketball season," commented Coach Rominger.

The first track meet of the season will be a triangular practice meet against Kansas Wesleyan and Bethany, March 16 at Bethany.

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
