New faculty announced

There have been several faculty and staff changes since last semester. The following changes were available at press time.

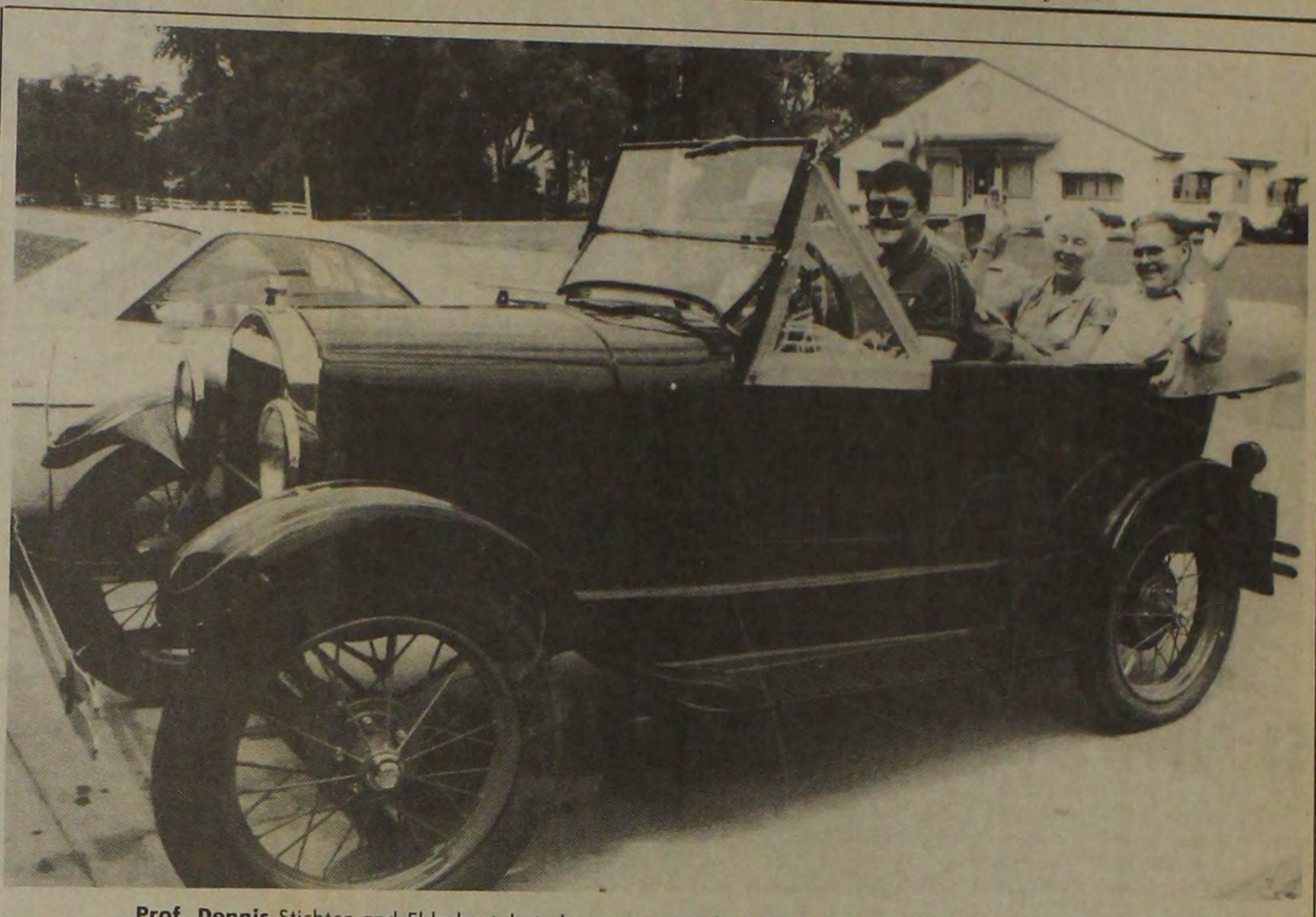
Dr. Dale Goldsmith, former Professor of Religion and Philosophy, has accepted the appointment of Vice President for Academic Services. His seventeen years at the college have seen him in roles such as Philosophy and Religion Department Chair, Humanities Division Chair, Faculty Chairman, coach of the soccer and cross country teams, and the Faculty Observer to the Board of Trustees. He will assume the duties of the office on September 8, 1986.

The new Director of Housing and Orientation is Jeanette Mick Johnson. She received her B.S. and M.S. from Fort Hays State University, taught one year of high school art at Russell, Kansas, and has been Resident Director at both Fort Hays State University and Tulsa University, Tulsa, Oklahoma. She took over July 15, 1986.

Professor Wayne Conyers also became a full-time status employee. He is the new Assistant Professor of Art. Many of his watercolor paintings and ceramics have been extensively exhibited across the country.

Assistant Football Coach and Career Counselor Roland Wray has been named Director of Athletics, effective July 1, 1986. In addition to prior experience as an Athletic Director, he has coached football, basketball, baseball and track at several high schools.

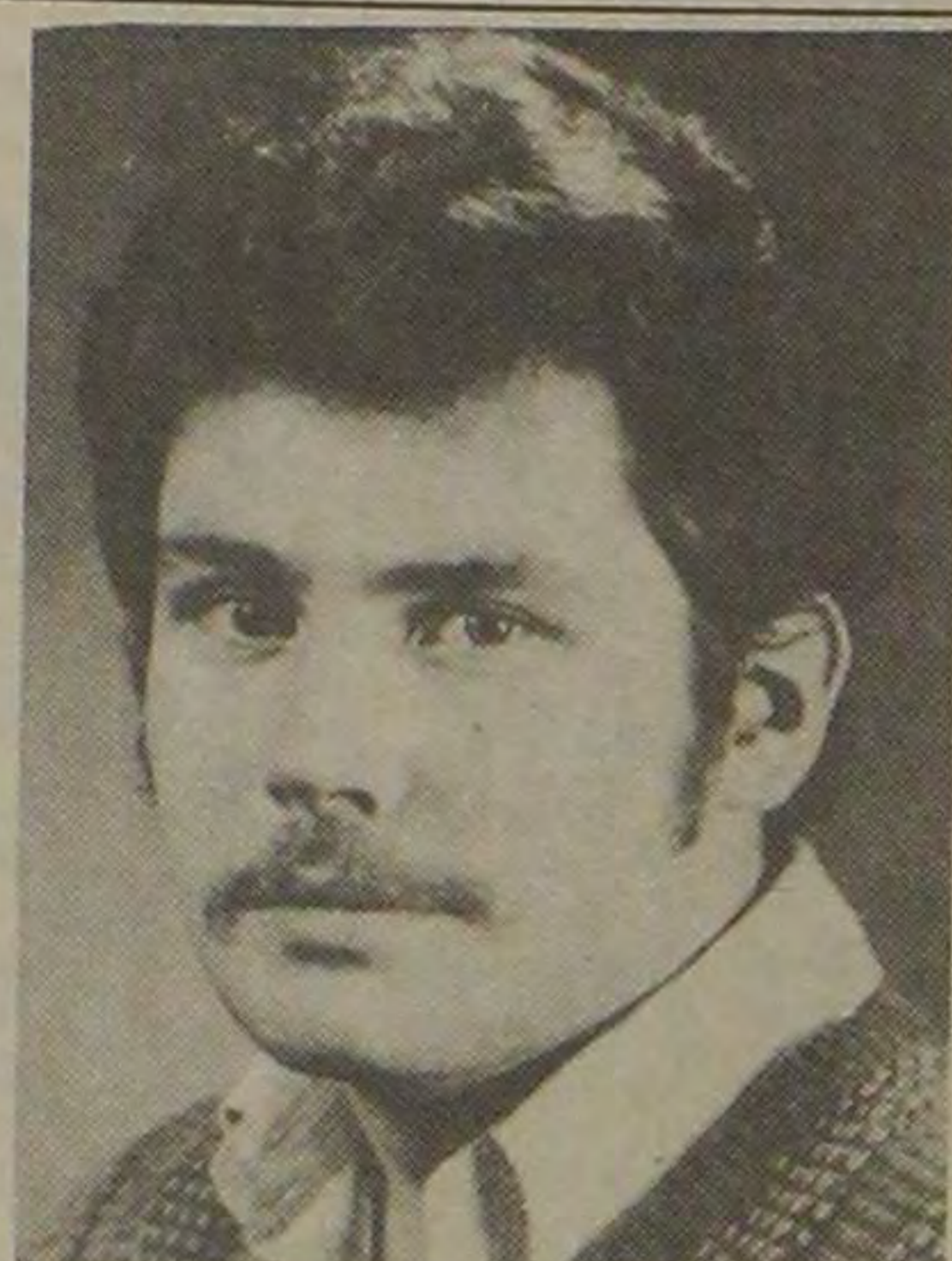

Professor Robert Fisher joins McPherson College as Assistant Professor of Music. He will direct the choir, the Singers ensemble, and teach voice lessons as well as theory classes.

Dr. Shingo Kajinami will serve as Assistant Professor of Chemistry. He received his Ph.D. in Chemistry-Biochemistry at the University of Oklahoma.

Professor, husband overcome tragedy

When the Publicity Office decided to print the following story in Spectator, student body president, Jay Nicholson of Wichita, urged, "Please don't capitalize on the terrorist attack. The media does enough of that. Focus on Dr. Nichols' response, her Christian response, even in the face of adversity."

A wounded McPherson College professor startled the nation with her gracious response July 7 after a Staten Island ferryboat stabbing incident left two dead and nine injured.

Dr. Connie Nichols, Director of Continuing Education and Head of the Home Economics Department, lay in her hospital bed and told New York reporters, "Liberty Weekend was a total success. This attack should not detract from a party you gave for a whole nation."

The McPherson professor, who suffered a wound in the stomach from a deranged Cuban immigrant, had visited every event during Liberty Weekend. She and her

husband, Mr. Richard Nichols, president of McPherson's Home State Bank, had enjoyed their weekend so much that they made special plans to go out in the harbor early Monday "to see the Statue in the mist just one more time" before catching a return flight home.

The macabre incident caught the media's eye early in the day, but by afternoon Dr. Nichols and her gracious attitude toward New York City, in spite of being a victim, had made the news. "Someone has to be a spokesperson for Liberty Weekend, separate from this deranged person," she said from her hospital bed at St. Vincent's Medical Center.

Mr. Nichols, transported to a different hospital across the island with a serious wound in the back, exhibited the same attitude. Mayor Ed Koch made an emergency trip to the hospital to console victims "only to find Mr. Nichols consoling me just before he was wheeled into surgery."

"It's not your fault, mayor. It's not the city's fault. This won't spoil the celebration. New York's a wonderful city, mayor."

Without knowing her husband had said virtually the same words, Professor Nichols across town told Mayor Koch later in the day that weekend events had been a "stunning success" and that New York had been a wonderful place to visit.

Among many well-wishers who phoned was Senator Robert Dole who described Dr. Nichols as "remarkably buoyant and spirited in the wake of a personal nightmare."

Dr. Nichols' statements were aired live on all three networks nationwide and printed in major newspapers as well as in "USA Today." When her first comment was fed over the UPI wire to Alan Montgomery of "The Hutchinson News," Mr. Montgomery read it aloud to the employees in the newsroom.

"Do you really believe she said that?" one incredulous employee asked.

Montgomery, who knows the Nichols couple, replied simply, "Yes, I do."

Two news announcers from Wichita's KAKE-TV had similar reactions.

"Her response is absolutely amazing," one said.

Another answered, "But people say Connie Nichols is like that."

The Nichols' response is representative of midwestern hospitality at its best. Students, faculty and staff at McPherson College attest to her compassionate ways and can feel justifiably proud of the example she has set.

When Dr. Nichols returns to the office and classroom, one can be sure she will have quite a story to tell.

Repayment of GSL surveyed

The National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators conducted a survey of 3,000 Guaranteed Student Loan borrowers, to check the repayment status on their loans. Borrowers were selected randomly from the files of twelve state GSL agencies. The responses of 628 of these borrowers form the basis for the following results, obtained in the spring of 1985.

The typical GSL borrower currently in repayment is about 28 years old, has a total educational loan debt of nearly \$6,500 (over \$5,000 of which is GSL) and repays nearly \$1,000 annually from an income of \$20,000. Fifty-two percent of all borrowers repaying are women, with 42.3 percent being married. Over 91.6 percent of GSL borrowers in repayment are white, a finding which suggests that postsecondary institutions have focused other forms of assistance (grants, scholarships and lower interest rate loans) on the needs of minority students who are oftentimes more economically disadvantaged.

Postsecondary institutions were given the highest marks by borrowers as the best source of information about student loans. GSL lenders, secondary schools, newspapers-magazines, and state agencies followed, in this order, with the federal government being ranked last.

For the most part, loan debt does not have a major impact on the borrower's decision as to when to marry, or when to begin or add to a family. For the great majority, loans do not negatively impact such consumer decisions as purchasing a home or a car, though clearly, the greater the percentage of loan debt as a function of disposable income, the more difficult these decisions are.

The highest ranked observation made by all borrowers about their loans was that they were essential in enabling enrollment. The second highest ranking was attributed to the observation that loans permitted a greater level of choice in attending a postsecondary institution.

Alum speaks at commencement

Dr. Dale Brown addressed 90 graduates and approximately 1,000 guests during Commencement in Brown Auditorium Sunday, May 25.

Dr. Brown's topic "Free at Last" was based on his experiences with Protestant, Roman Catholic and peace church groups who are searching for biblical and theological bases for peacemaking.

The speaker talked of American freedoms of speech, assembly and religion which are envied by people around the world. "Behind the Iron Curtain," Dr. Brown said, "people are so anxious to be free from want, misery, hunger and disease that they do not seem to be as concerned about human rights as Americans think they should be."

The professor of theology from Bethany Theological Seminary in Oak Brook, Illinois, spoke of his travels in the U.S.S.R. Visiting with Russian citizens, he learned that they have a great fear of the United States. "The Russian people are careful to explain how they are not afraid of the wonderful American people. Rather, they fear our government which wants to place missiles within eight minutes of their cities."

Referring to his experiences with Pentagon personnel in Washington, D.C., Dr. Brown said Americans display a similar fear toward the government and military system of the U.S.S.R.

"It may be risky to trust the Russians," Dr. Brown continued. "However, it may be more risky to pursue a policy of escalation, moving toward nuclear holocaust or mutual bankruptcy."

The McPherson College alumnus maintained that people can be in slavery to self-centered desires regardless of political systems under which they live; by the same token, many have found spiritual freedom, even within oppressive economic and political systems. "True freedom comes when we claim what is best from our past, from tradition and reject those things that inhibit fresh perspectives on truth."

"People who strive to be happy, to be free, are often those who do not make it," Dr. Brown told the new graduates. "Instead, truly happy people are those who give their lives to others, a cause, a truth, a movement."

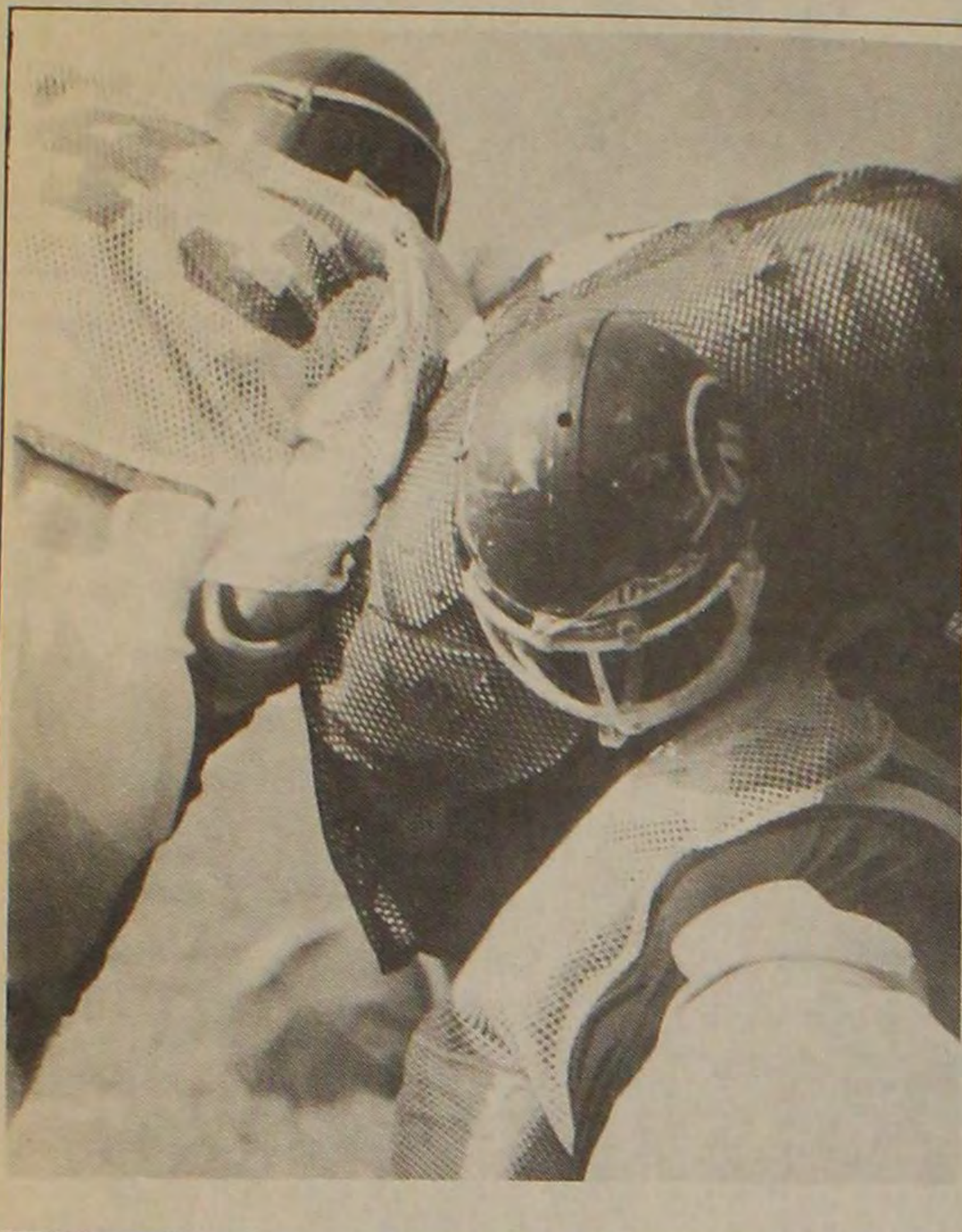
The liberal arts institution, Brown believes, must keep before it "purposes, goals and visions that transcend self-centered orbits."

Dr. Brown, a native of Wichita and a 1946 graduate of McPherson College. He is President of the American Theological Society, Midwest Section, and is the author of several books, "The Christian Revolutionary," "Understanding Pietism, Flamed by the Spirit," "What About the Russians," and "Biblical Pacifism."

Summer remodeling in full swing in many campus buildings

The Student Union of old is no more. Well, at least the upstairs and downstairs we knew is different. This summer has brought changes to most areas of the SU with lots of planning by college committees going into the present stage of existence. ACTION!

First, the Bookstore moved to Templeton Hall for the duration of the remodeling. Judy Foulke and Linda Funk have been working in smaller quarters in the drafting room area. Campus minister Herb Smith has temporarily relocated to the Learning Center in Miller Library. Student Activities Director, Dave Unruh, now calls the Sport Center home for his office. And the Church of the Brethren Western Plains District Conference, scheduled for August 8-10, will probably use the Church of the Brethren near the campus more than planned at first, rather than the campus exclusively.

Secondly, the renovation started on June 16th and is scheduled for completion August 28th. The work being done downstairs involves switching things around and improving facilities. The Snack Bar has moved to what used to be the gameroom, where both will be housed. The counter projects in a half-circle around the door to the old game room and will sport a neon sign to brighten the area. The seating for the Snack Bar area has been relocated across from the Bookstore, raised up on a platform with new chairs, tables and booths. A glass block wall will partition that section of the basement from the pool tables, which will be placed where the seating platform and some booths along the north wall used to be. A chrome railing is in the plans for the seating area, and incandescent lighting will provide a more pleasant atmosphere. The support posts will be round, instead of square. And the stripes that used to decorate the walls will not exist after this summer.

The tv room can be found where the Snack Bar was. It too will have totally new furnishings and lighting, and will be enclosed by a glass block wall. All the new mailboxes will be on the wall that used to hold just student boxes. The mailroom door is just around the corner of its previous placement. A display area is going to occupy the wallspace where the faculty boxes were. The Bookstore is getting a newer wall for display space inside. The jukebox will be with the pool tables in their new location, and the video games will remain in about the same area. Restrooms will have new stall partitions, flooring, and improved plumbing. And throughout the basement, new carpeting and tile are being installed. The ceiling is being repaired and repainted, also.

Going upstairs involves something new, too. The stairs will be enclosed, and hopefully storage space can be utilized underneath. The telephone booth at the foot of the stairs will be replaced.

Continuing on upstairs, students will have a new way to enter the lobby. Instead of the lobby door being at a 90 degree angle to the outside door, the new entrance will have two sets of double doors leading straight into the lobby from outside. The Quiet Room will have new carpet, new lighting and all new furniture. Restrooms will have new flooring, new lighting, and other improvements. The campus minister's office will have the ceiling lowered, and new lighting and flooring will enhance his working space.

The Private Dining Room will be more spacious after being extended to the area where students usually stand in line for meals. The sliding doors for the cafeteria will be replaced, as well as the light fixtures and carpet in the cafeteria. There is a possibility of new trays, but at

press time, that is still an uncertainty. The Lobby will get a facelift with the new lighting, new carpet, new furnishings and varied open spaces.

You might wonder what colors have been implemented in the remodeling. According to a consulting interior designer-decorator, the downstairs is mostly school colors (red and white), grey, black and white. The upstairs scheme includes dark teal blue, rose-apricot, and cream-colored shades in the carpet and furnishings. Almost all the floor surfaces will be redone, whether in carpet or tiling.

What is the cost for all of this? Business Manager Jim Dodson estimated \$200,000 for the expenses incurred by the renovation. The funds have come from Module II of the College Centennial Commitment, individual donors and foundations who contributed to Module II. Dodson commented that the Student Union is twenty-six years old and needed something to make it more attractive. The cafeteria had been redone five years ago, and the basement had received some improvements in 1973. Three years ago the tv room walls were installed. Otherwise, the SU had remained the same since it was first built.

Besides the Student Union, other areas on campus are being worked on. Miller Library is in the process of installing an electronic system to detect unrecorded removals of library materials. This means that everything must be checked out at the circulation desk before leaving, or reminder alarms will sound. The sensors in the books and magazines themselves work on a radio frequency basis and would have to be de-activated at the desk or the doorway detection process would take over and let those on duty know something was wrongfully or accidentally removed from the library.

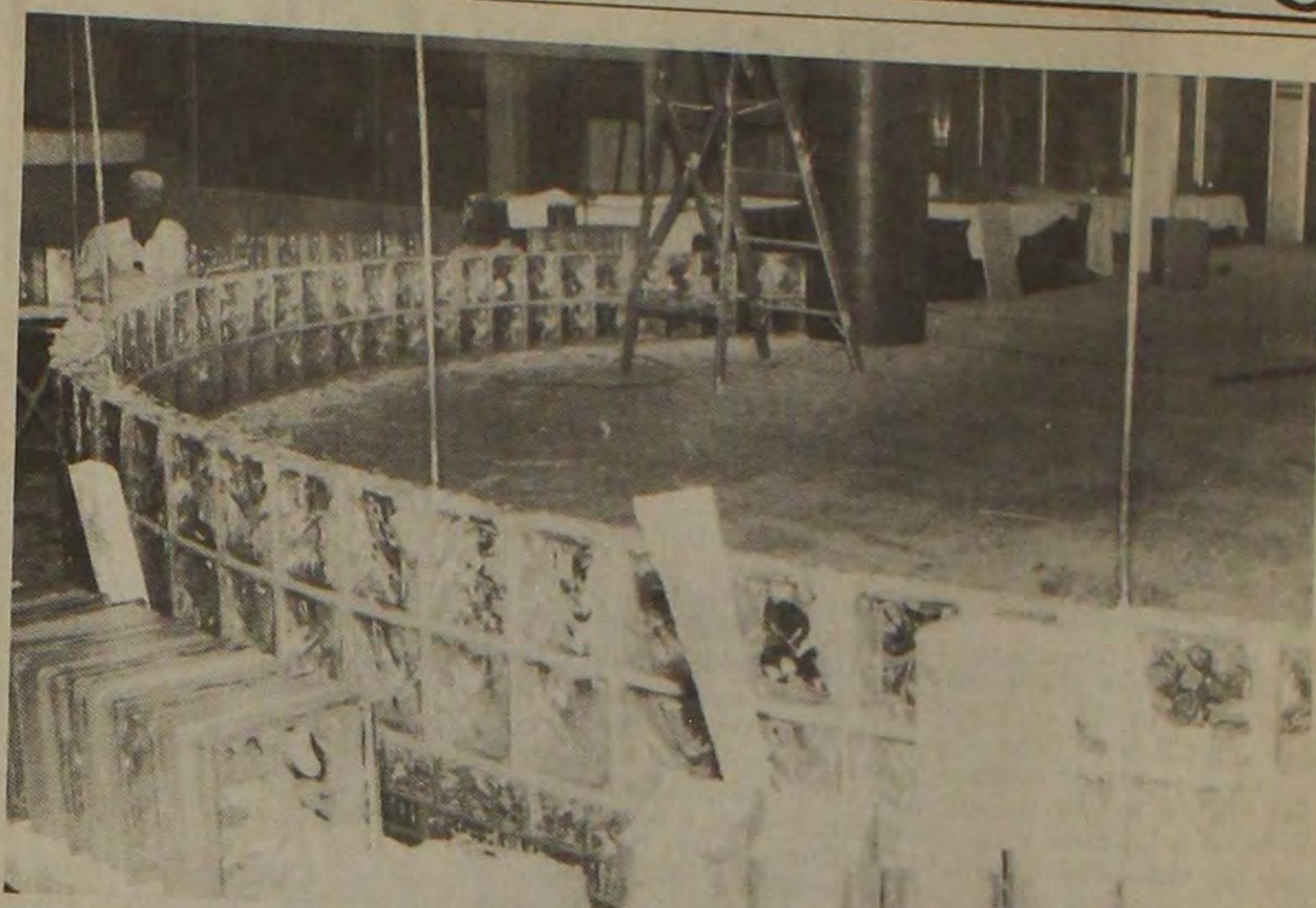
Another addition to the library is date due cards. There had been several requests for these, and Librarian Rowena Olsen felt this warranted action. The security system was not requested by as many students, but several types of libraries, whether public, private or collegiate, have also implemented these channels of property protection. Both additions should help keep track of library materials more efficiently. The belief in the security system is that it will prevent as large of losses of property to pay for itself within a year to a year and a half.

Dotzour Hall has a new heating system. One pump will be doing the work that four pumps previously did to heat the dorm. New piping, a new pump, an automatic temperature sensor and a three-way valve are part of the equipment in the set-up. Merrin Godfrey, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, feels that this heating process will work efficiently with each room's heating needs.

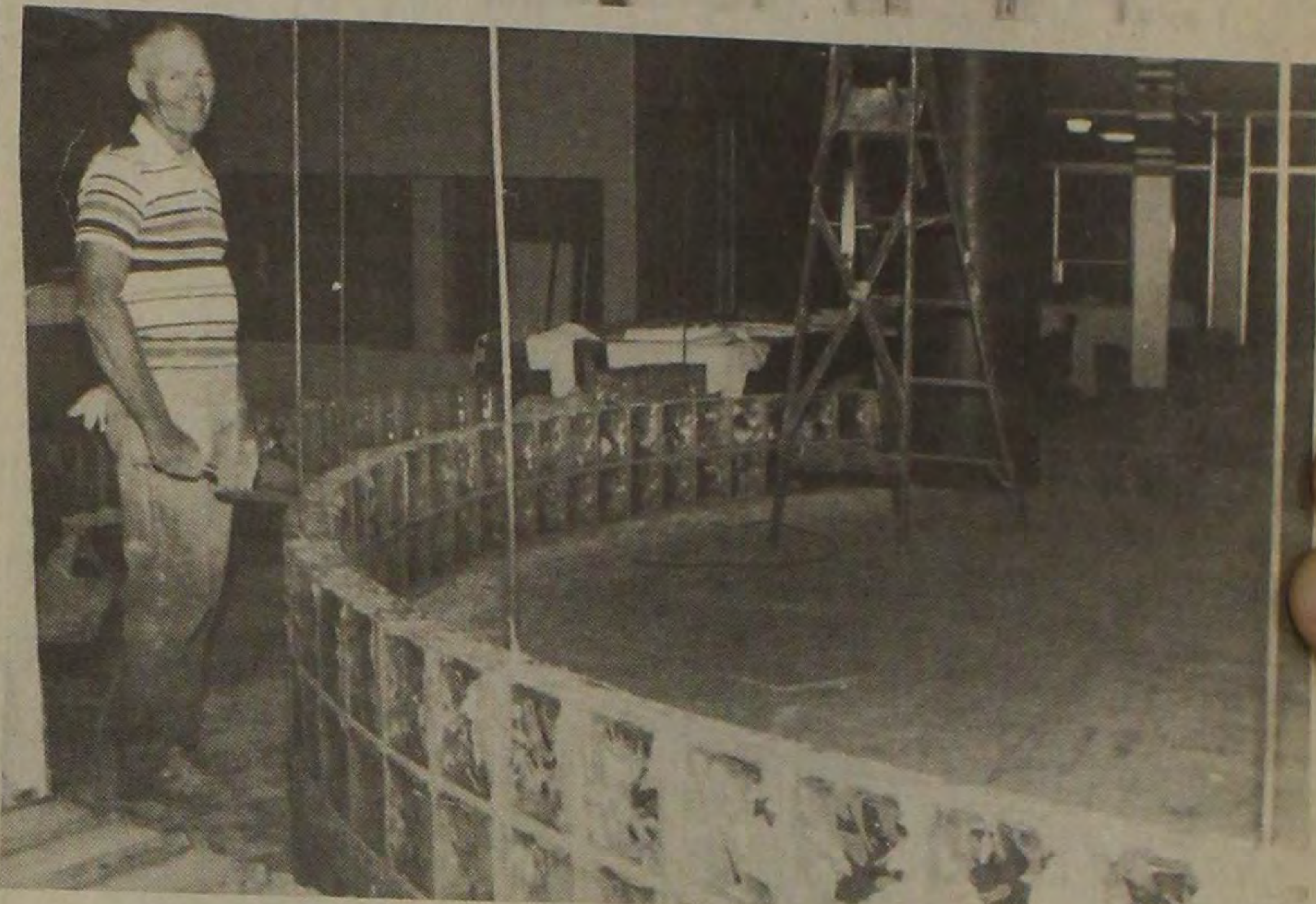
Carpeting makes its appearance in the halls of Fahnestock, while Dotzour hallways got a fresh coat of paint in June.

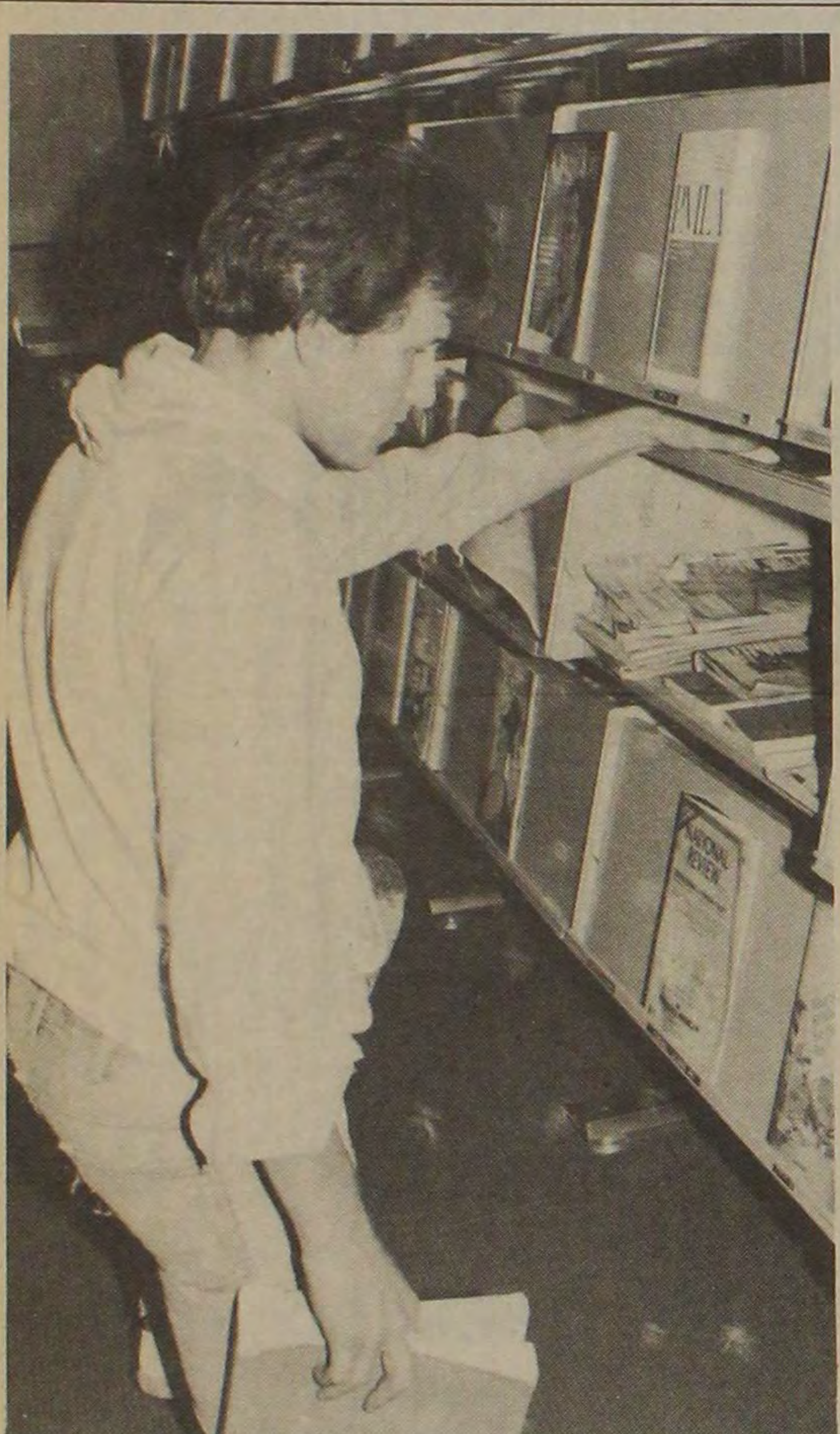
