Leonard B. Crnmpacker



The passing of Leonard B. Crumpacker on October 2, 1943, came as a shock to his many friends and acquaintances. Those who knew him alway's chought of him as a powerful, hard working, happy individual. Although he was only forty-five years old, his many achievements give give indication of his many interests and abilities.

He played as he worked, hard, joyoutly and thrill, ingly. In college, students were many cimes thrilled by his accomplishments. He won first place in the 4cy orad dash and the 880 yard run at the state track meet in 1918 and was awarded a guard position on the all conference basketball ayoud in 1923, and had the bonor of carrying the football över the goal line for the first toechdown ever made by a McPherson College "bulldog." In later years fishing and hunting occupied his leaver eine.

A college romance culminated in his marriage to Modena Heckman of Overbrook, Kanss, April ag, 1930. Doris Jean and Ruth Marie came to share the home, which he enjoyed greatly and generously provided for. Pienicking and raveling with his family were his delight.

Next to his home, his hig interest was his Church, which he served in many capacities. For many years he either aught or was superintendent of the young pople's department and in nexent years was General Superintendent of the Studay School. The Church recognized his loyaity by calling him to the office of deacon. The also was a member of the trustere board, of which he was sercentary. Leonard aught in the elementary schools of the coursy and did considerable of his college work by returning to college in the spring for a month or so after his teaching yeas over. He graduated in 1939 with a B. S. degree. He was a successful teacher in the city schools of McPherson for nearly twenty years. In addition to teaching, Industrial Arts, he spent considerable time coaching Athletics and sponsoring the Hi-Y Organization.

His many interests occupied his busy life. For he was also trustee of McPherson College and on the Executive Board. He spent several summers soliciting students and promoting the college in many ways. He was active on the Alumni Board and actended many college events.

The Alumni Association has lost a vigorous leader. He died as he lived, courageously, determinedly, and hopefully. His going challenges all who knew him to live for the best and noblest.
