EXPECT TO START SCIENCE HALL WORK

Plans Underway For Work to Commence Within Sixty

A number of items of business were taken up and disposed of. President Kurris' report dwelt upon the needs of the college in a masterly way. The statement was made in the report that the enrollment last year totaled 598, but that of account of a fallure to canvass for students the student hody of the last schneater fell short of this figure by about one hundred.

The report of the President was distinctly favorable to the admission of foot-ball to the regular athletic activities of the college. This feeling was approved by the trusters.

The Science Hall was one of the weighly matters before Board. Not enough money is yet in sight to much superations, but the Board authorized the executive committee to proceed to work on the building just as soon as possible. Plans are under way whereby it is thought that work may be begun within sixty days. The plan is to finish the basement at least by next fail. meeting, although it is announced that almost all of the teachers of this year will stay. The Board was reorganized with the following officers: J. J. Yoder, President; F. A. Vaniman, Vice-President; H. J. Harnly, Secretary; and J. H. Fries, Assistant Secretary, Professor Yoder retains his position as Treasure of the college.

SYNOPSIS OF PRESIDENT KURTZ'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF McPHERSON COLLEGE,

JANUARY 31, 1921.

The report of President D. W. Kurtz submitted to the Trustees of the college is a brief document, but it contains a complete account of the institution for the past very A few of the leading features are here mentioned.

The President reports that the student earollment for the year 1919-1920 was the largest in the history of the college. There was a total of 598, including the summer school of the previous summer. There were 95 graduates in the class of 1920.

The policy of continuing the summer school was presented, and for many reasons the President held that the summer school had amply justified itself in the years of the past.

A statement was made relative to the part that the col-

A statement was made relative to the part that the college played in the Sedalia Annual Conference, last June. Participation of the faculty and students in the affairs of District and Annual Conference was strongly urged.

served to prevent a canvass for students last summer. It was felt also that the financial campaign was more praising than student getting. In view of the smaller student body that materialised, however, the President is convinced that the failure to canvass for students was a mistake. The student body of the present year is reported about one hundred short of last year.

A couple pages of the report are taken up with the financial condition of the College. About \$21,723 was rala4 ed last summer for the Science Hall, Dr. Kurtz's ill health

interfered with the prosecution of this campaign. The trip to Tokyo improved his health to a great extent.

Discussing the subject of foot-ball, the President expresses his belief that the game has justified itself in McPhernon College. He says: "The game is an asset to our school life, and it has added to the moral tone of the institution. The credit is due to Professor Mohler. Coach Daniel, and the ethical surject of the college.

The President urges that every effort be made to enter the college into the North Central Association of colleges, as the academy has already been admitted.

Speaking of the Science Hail, the President recommends that work be begun aoon—just as soon as enough money is in hand to complete one story of the building. The pressure for class rooms is so great that this move is a necessity. A financial policy was also urged upon the Board

The report is concluded with an appeal to the Trustees to unite in the fullest extent in popularizing the college in the districts which they represent.

> THE SCIENCE HALL By President D. W. Kurtz

The question that is asked most frequently as I travel about is "When are you going to build the Science Hall?" I am glad to answer "We are hoping to begin is less than sixty days." But I must still answer "We hope."

The trustees have carrelly studied the needs of the the cillege and the vote was unanimous that we should be gin at once, and that at heart one story should be ready sign at once, and that at heart one story should be ready should be ready of for the opening of college nest September. Our present buildings are entirely inadequate for the size of the college and the high-grade work that is done here. We there we have the college and the high-grade work that is done here. We twenty-even teachers and only fitteen class rooms. Also not the trustee that the majority of the students are not college department. These facts show to any one how inswerstire it to one that the need at once.

Since we do not as yet have money enough to build the Science Hall we are planning to get enough by the payment of past pledges and the budget for the new year, so as to make possible the errection of the building and the completion of the first floor for the coming school year. We can then finish the other floors as rapidly as the money comes in. If we cannot do that much, we can at least erect the first story and put on it a temporary rof, so that some of the needs of the school can be met.

If we could only induce a thousand of our friends to come to McPhenen and with the college, I an unity the come to McPhenen and with the college, I and unity would strain every point to help the cause at this time. The need is so great and the embarrassment to the standard for the college so keen that we must have the whole-heavand apport of the entire church and community to relieve the situation. We must have an immediate response from the citizens of McPhenen and the larger support of the churches, else there will be serious bandicaps and emparamement to the efficiency and standing of the college.

The Forward Movement budget of last year closes on Spiruary 28: 1921. The Forward Movement budget for the new year is comparatively small, but it is an absolute minimum which must be raised. Our plan is to begin at once on the Science Hall, in the hope and faith that this new budget will be raised and make it possible to have as least a part of the building available by September 15, and perhaps continue to work without a break until the entire structure is comnicte.
