

JACOB HUGH HECKMAN, A. B., B. D., Th. M., A. M. TO BE ADDED TO THE FACULTY

Since the new President of McPherson wastrained in History rather than Theology and Philosophy, which was Dr. Kuriz's teaching field, there has been no one on the faculty who was ospecially trained for Theology and Philosophy.

In view of that fact the local trustee board elected Prof. Heckman to this field on November 18, 1927, and it is quite likely that he will accept the position and hegin his work the second semester of 1927-28.

He has had from four to five years of experience as a pastor and has had considerable experience in Bible Institute work and evangelian.
