STENOGRAPHY AT McPHERSON COLLEGE.

The coming year we are planning special work in this department. A two-year course has been outlined. The first year is to prepare stenographers for ordinary positions, such as general office work, common dictation and letter writing, etc. The second year is to train heads of offices, teach the art of dictation, work up greater speed in shorthand writing and typewriting. This course will include reporting of lectures, sermons, business letters of all kinds and special work.

THE NEW DORMITORY.

The New Dormitory is nearing completion. It contains thirty-five student's rooms, matrons room, parlors, three bath and toilet rooms, three storage rooms, wide corridors, dining room 32x70, large kitchen, cook's room, pantry and coal room, double decked porches, 12x40.
