Dear Students:

A student is a learner and a learner is one who acquires knowledge and understanding by means of the exercise of his mental processes. To one, therefore, who has given his life in an attempt to give some direction to the organized education of youth, the request by the Editor of the Quadrangle to write something on Education for World Democracy, is indeed a pleasant privilege, as well as a serious responsibility.

The hope of humanity is world democracy, and its acceptance by the world, and its success in the world, are dependent upon Christian ethics and education. The greatest and longest lived democratic government in the history of man is the United States. As to whether or not the other nations of the world will come to believe in, and to practice democracy is pretty largely to be determined by whether or not we in the United States make our democratic concepts increasingly successful.

To preserve our democratic way of life and to improve it, we must keep alive and growing our free educational and religious institutions. We must come to understand that in the kind of interdependent world we have, certain fundamentals must be learned and practiced: (1) There are no superior races or nationalities; (2) Nations, as well as individuals, must earn the right to be free by means of disciplined living where spiritual values are the supreme values; (3) "The earth is the Lord's," and all of its bounties are for man as means to the end of the glory of God and the good of all mankind; (4) There must be respect for personality on the part of each for the other, and where this is true there will be neither exploitation of material nor of human resources; (5) Understanding among peoples results through the processes of education, and where there is honest understanding there will be sympathetic and constructive cooperation; (6) World peace is possible through the United Nations built around, and supported by, understanding and good will.

Of great value to many students on Macampus is the Student Christian Association. This group consists of students interested in a higher type of Christian living. The co-presidents are Eula Lucore and Kent Naylor; the secretary, Lois Kauffman, and the treasurer, Warren Hoover.

Weekly meetings are held which consist of Tuesday morning Commission groups and Thursday night programs made up of a well-rounded variety of panel discussions, group sings, debates, individual music, and student speakers.

Deputation teams are sponsored by the Student Volunteers which sends several groups out each week. Practical experience is gained from this which will be especially useful in the future life of those preparing for Church work. Other commissions are just as active in their fields.

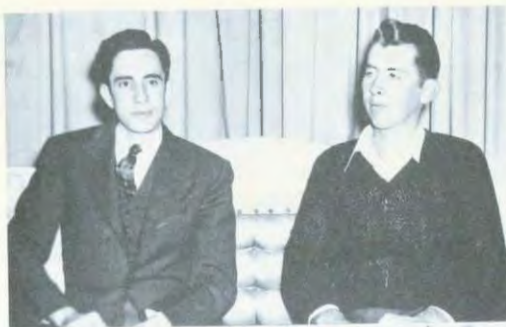

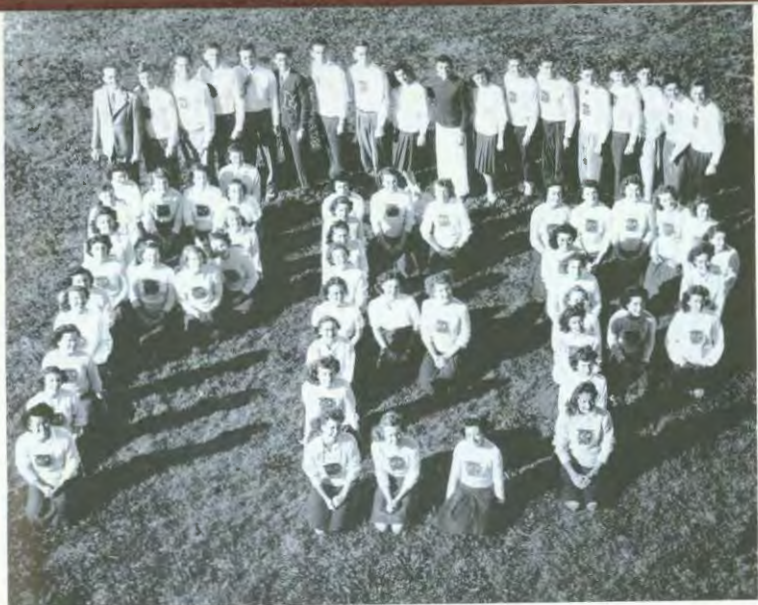
Meats . . . the thrills that are a part of any football game . . . all these helped to make our first year of football since 1942 a successful one.

College of Emporia was easy for McPherson with Cramer and McBroom spearheading the four touchdown attack. The highlight of the season came the following week as the Bulldogs out-passed, out-punted and outran their rivals from the North, Kansas Wesleyan, to win to a 28 to 0 and to climax the Homecoming activities. Ottawa caught McPherson on an off night



the following week and won 37 to 0. 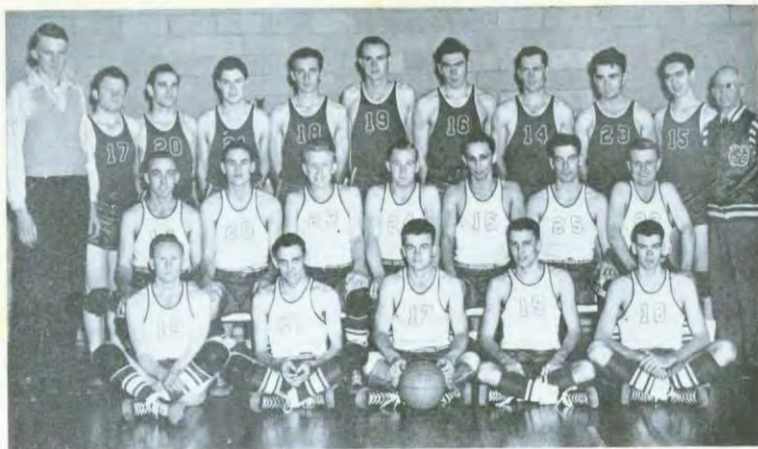

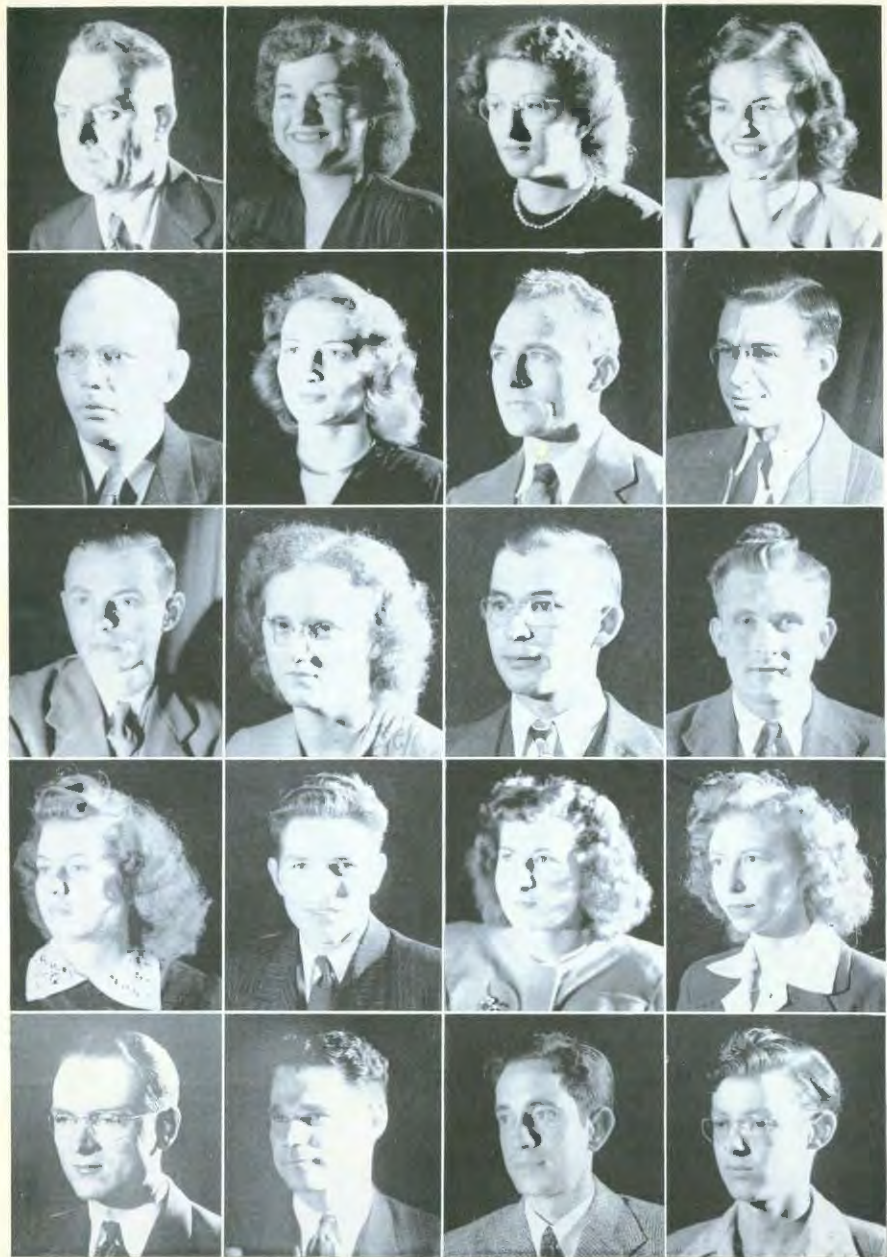

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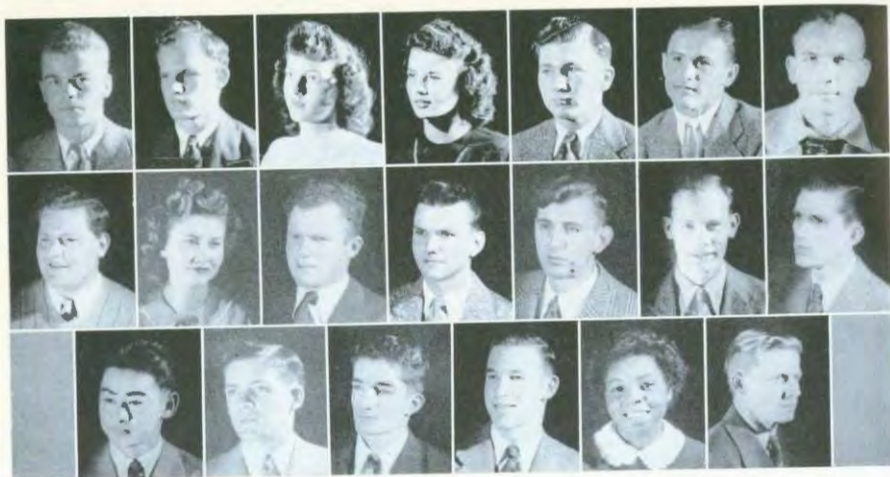
