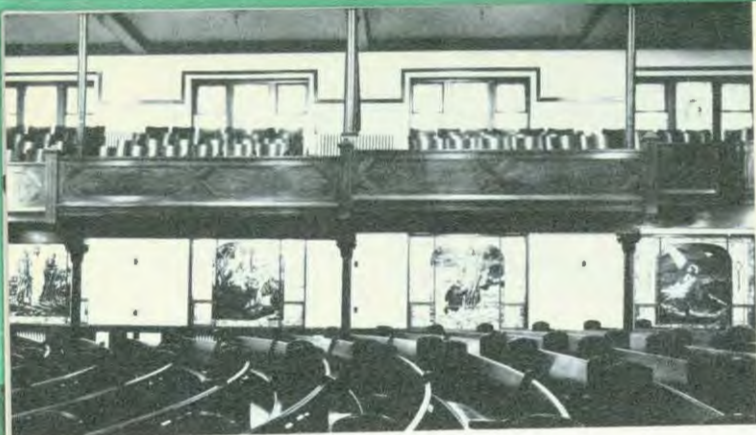
Arnold Hall

Moving two rings upward in the Kansas Conference and developing the largest popular following in years, Coach Chalmers E. Woodard's Bulldogs easily handled the first test of McPherson College's athletic rehabilitation program. Operating with a squad composed of 55 per cent freshmen, Coach Woodard and his assistants had a team that improved rapidly and finished the season with top-sided wins over Bethany and Friends.

The Bulldogs opened the season by smashing their 19-game winless record in the Kansas Conference by edging Bethel 20-19, and while they lost their next four conference games, it was largely through inexperience. They gave the champion Ottawa Braves their closest game of the season and lost the other games by one touchdown or less.

The team was led by co-captains Bob Kerr and Joe Pate. Pate was elected all-conference tackle by the coaches of the Kansas Conference at the end of the season. Kerr, a second team choice along with guard George Goff, was the principal record-breaker on a team that broke or tied 15 all-time McPherson College records.

Kerr, who averaged 6.28 yards per carry in gaining 728 yards during the season, set red 73 points to break a record established 29 years ago. Two freshmen, Wayne Bickenstaff and Tommy O'Dell, also added their names to the record book.

Coach Woodard substituted frequently, and it was difficult to pick any individuals for special mention. Freshmen John Robinson, Gene Smith, and Dwight McSpadden were consistent ground-gainers, and another freshman, Don Hoch, performed ably at quarterback when Bickenstaff was injured early in the season. In the line Petefish, Bechtel, Metzler, Powell, Peel, Kern, Slabach, Scruggs, Pauls, Pritchett, Ferguson, Stevens, and Irons assisted the more publicized Pate and Goff.

But the Bulldogs' greatest advances were not newspaper achievements. There was a new aura of hope and enthusiasm from Main Street and the entire area. When the season closed there was little doubt that despite the new brain and inexperience, the Bulldogs were the second best team in the conference.

With 11 wins and 9 losses for the season and a fourth place Kansas Conference finish, the Bulldogs experienced their best season since 1947. General inexperience—eleven men of the twenty-man squad were freshmen and Earl Grindle was the only senior—and lack of height kept the Bulldogs from going higher in the conference.

As it was, Coach Woodard's squad came closer to catching the popular imagination of the area's sports fans than any Bulldog five in a decade. They knocked defending champion Kansas Wesleyan out of the race with a resounding 10-point win and nipped traditional rival Bethany on the Swede's own court. The conference record also included two wins over C. of E. and a 16-point victory over Baker in the season's finale.

In non-conference play the Bulldog's record was their best in 20 years. The five won, 2 lost non-conference record was compiled despite such opposition as St. Louis, St. Benedicts, Manchester, and Illinois Wesleyan. The latter two teams were played in an 1800-mile pre-Christmas trip to Indiana.

The Bulldog's principal scoring punch was supplied by the Idaho brothers, Loren and Wayne Blickenstaff. The bounding, red-haired Loren dominated the team statistics, leading the club in scoring, rebounding, assists, and time played. His 290 points for the season fell two short of Melvin Miller's school record set in 1928.

The other Blickenstaff, Wayne, contributed 242 points during the season, including a 28-point barrage against a national power, St. Louis University, in his very first collegiate game. But the Blickenstaffs were hardly the whole story. Bob Bechtel, Frank Hanaganne, Gene Smith, and Earl Grindle were all fine floormen, good feeders, and adequate scorers. Dale Carpenter, Tommy O'Dell, and Duane Jamison also performed well. Barring international complications all these men except Grindle will be back next year along with several men from a B-squad that won 11, lost 6.

With several lettermen slumping and freshmen failing to fill the slack, Coach Dick Wareham's baseballers were unable to approximate their fine 1949 record. The Bulldogs finished with a four won, twelve lost record and were eliminated in the first round of the Kansas Conference tournament played in McPherson May 17.

The squad did successfully defend their city championship against Central for the fourth consecutive year and upset Emporia State, one of the top teams in the state, besides winning games from Sterling and Tabor.

The team was not particularly strong in any department, although shortstop Charlie Petefish hit .361 for the season. Petefish led the club in nearly every offensive department—hits, 22; runs, 13; homers, 2; runs batted in, 12; stolen bases, 8; and total bases, 35. Second baseman Earl Grindle hit .293 and tied Petefish with 12 runs batted in.

The pitching was generally ineffective although Bill Tolle had a 2-3 record and Bill Moore pitched well in the Emporia State upset.
