When the immense cloud of dust had settled after the 1953 football season, McPherson emerged second in the Kansas Conference. Suffering only one loss during the season, the team and students can rightly be proud of their first-year coach, Sid Smita, with the assistance of the great quarterbacking of Wayne Blickenstaff and Don Hoch.

According to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, McPherson ranked high in the small colleges of the United States. The combined power of the "crazy-legged-three," Gene Smith, Dwight McSpadden, and Sam Ball, the Bulldogs rushed for 3383 yards to place they first in the nation. Combining this power with quarterbacks Wayne Blickenstaff and Don Hoch, the Bulldogs ranked second in the nation with 4195 yards for total yards gained.

Gene Smith rated a tie for third in individual rushing with 1116, according to the N. A. I. A. Dwight McSpadden's "golden toe" led the small colleges of the nation in scoring with 109 points. Gene Smith ranked fifth with 84 points.

The club this year was well-balanced with the triple threat of Tommy O'Dell, Wayne Blickenstaff, and Gene Smith, who had an average respectively of 14.9, 14.7, and 14.4 points per game.

Two new basketball records were set for McPherson College by Tom O'Dell and Wayne Blickenstaff. O'Dell established the all time record for the most points in one year, 372. He also scored the most points in a single game this year, 30. Blickenstaff topped the previous four year scoring total with 1,121 points.

Five of the eleven squad members will be graduating, leaving Coach Smith a rebuilding job to do next year. These seniors will long be remembered for their spirited play.

The squad as a whole played an effective fast-break type of ball with each player trying to do his best for the team. The team this year showed excellent sportsmanship of which Coach Smith and the college family can be proud.

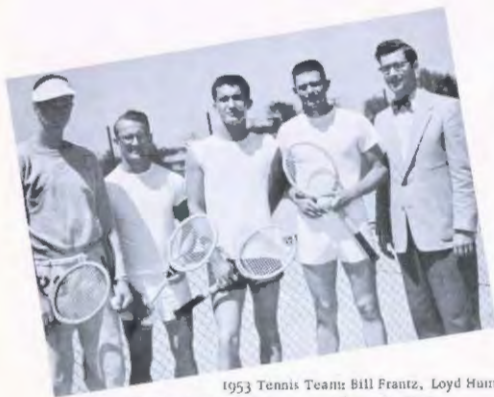

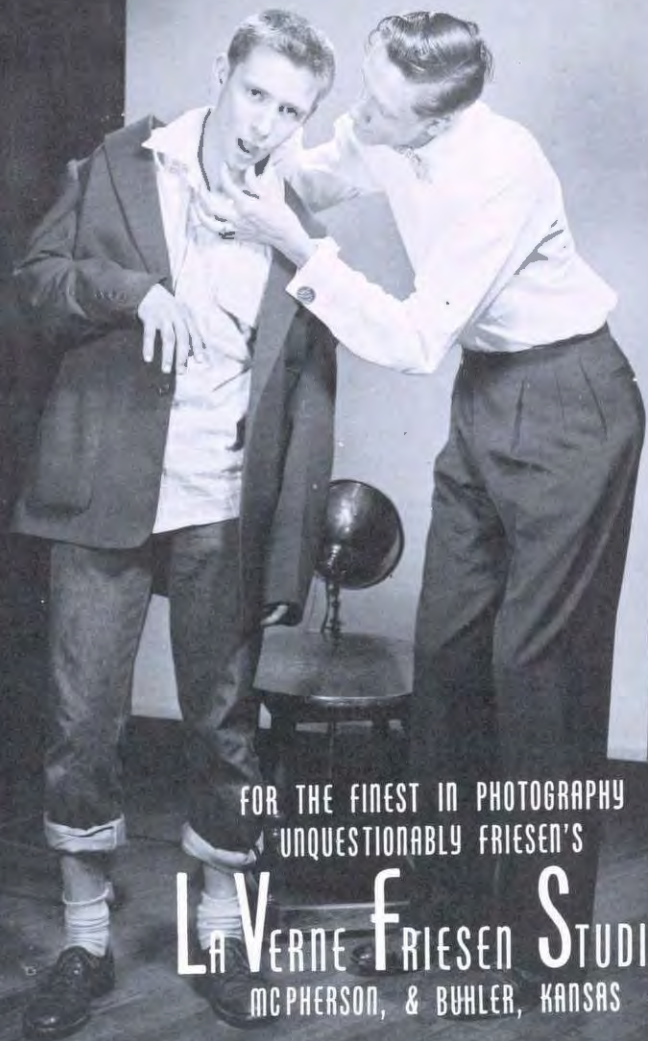
