

Mac's 1971 Cross-Country team ended another great season, placing first in both the conference meet and the Southwestern Invitational. The team finished fifth in the District 10 competition enabling them to compete in the Nationals at Liberty, Mo. Team captain Ivan Torres paced McPherson by smashing the course record set by him in 1970.

There was a large turn out of enthusiastic track men during their successful 1970 track season. Victories at the Blue Jay, Ottawa, and ACCK Invitations were proof of the team's competence as they placed first in all three meets. In the over all Conference the Bulldog track men captured third place. Phil Stover broke the school record in the mile, Mark Lynch in the hammer-throw, and Ray Craft tied the record in the 100-yard dash.

Playing in eleven meets, the McPherson College golf team had an active and successful season.

energetic team holds promise

Track 1972 promised to be the best McPherson had had in the last four years. Three returning record holders plus an abundance of new and young talent contributed to their success.

D. Ray Craft is one of three record holders of the hundred-yard dash in McPherson's history. Jim Ulrich, Jim Anewalt, and Hector Morales, all potential record-breakers, also returned. 


The Women's Athletic Association provided a powder puff football game where the freshmen defeated the upperclassmen, during the fall, a volleyball season, and various individual and recreational sports.
