Time Management




















HOMECOMING,



Battling Bulldogs





The spring season opened with the classic story of "Flowers for Algernon" by David Rogers, running Feb.

After the season was over, the




















Academics Humanities Division

The Division of Humanities offers courses generally considered to be the core of a liberal arts education. Majors are available in art, English, foreign languages, music, philosophy and religion, and speech and theatre.

This year the division has requested a \$300,000 matching humanities grant and hopes to implement their goal of developing interdisciplinary senior-level seminars for humanities majors. The division is also exploring humanities computer programs for possible use.

Highlights included the addition of a half-time position in the English department, Interterm trips to Mexico by Spanish students and to New York by drama students, and the selection by students of Dr. Corinne Hughbanks, professor of languages and chairperson of the Humanities Division, as professor of the year.

Although the national trend is downward for humanities majors, McPherson College's enrollment has increased in this area in the last two years. Strong junior year abroad programs and the European Choir Tour are representative of popular humanities offerings.













Academics Natural Sciences Division

The Division of Natural Sciences at McPherson College offers majors in biology, agriculture, chemistry, physics, computer science, and mathematics as well as the divisional majors of environmental science, medical technology, and health arts.

A strong component of the science major is the student research project, which involved ten students this, year. One student presented research findings at the Kansas Academy of Science, and six others shared their work at an ACCK Poster Seminar.

The poster sessions, a trend in presenting scientific research, are a good way to share research from many individuals in a limited time period, according to Dr. Gilford Ikenberry, professor of biology and chairperson of the Natural Science Division.

The computer program was strengthened by the installation of the Harris H800 in the ACCK Offices and terminals in the computer room in Harnly Hall. Computer students also used the new IBM PC's for word processing and graphics.

Academics Social Science Division

The goal of the Social Science Division is the study of collective human behavior with the scientific method and historical research. Majors are offered in business, accounting, psychology, sociology, administration of justice, and history.

Dr. Lowell Flory, associate professor of business and economics, joined the faculty as chairperson of the business and economics department. Changes are being made in curricula to prepare students for today's business world, including increased emphasis on accounting and preparation for the CPA exam. A major gift of desktop computers, which are located in Mohler Hall, is strengthening the program. A department highlight was the Interterm trip to Japan.

"Teaching in the Small College," a conference of small colleges in the Central Plains, was organized by the behavioral science department and held on our campus in April.

The chairperson of the Social Science Division is Dr. Leland Lengel, professor of history and political science.













Academics Applied Arts and Sciences Division

The Division of Applied Arts and Sciences includes majors in education, audio-visual communications, physical education, home economics, interior design, industrial education, and auto restoration technology.

The auto restoration program continued to receive national attention, being featured on the "Nightly Business Report" on PBS television and in a Christian Science Monitor article.

State program approval for teacher education was instituted this year, meaning stricter requirements and better programs for teacher certification. Enrollment in education here increased in quantity and quality, and the department proudly graduated nine music education majors.

The highlight of the year was the health, physical education, and recreation department moving into the new Sports Center in January after three semesters of being temporarily housed in Harnly Hall. "This gives us the facility for a much stronger academic program," said Dr. Dayton Rothrock, professor of education and psychology and chairperson of the Applied Arts and Sciences Division. Courses in racquetball and other life sports are now being offered. Campus morale rose as the Sports Center quickly became a popular place for faculty and student recreation.


















Seniors







thought unsatisfactory.


All in all we had a good year getting over our differences and working together as a unit — as a class: The class of 1986!


