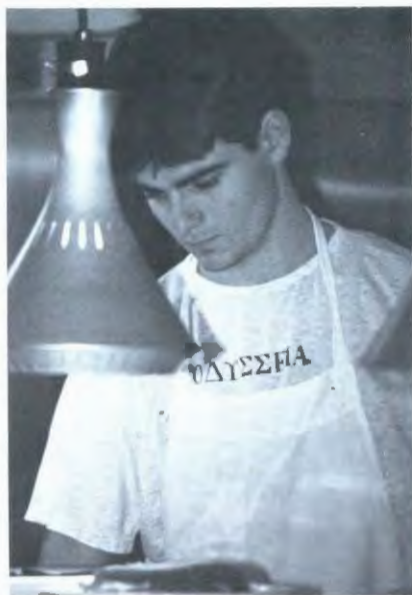

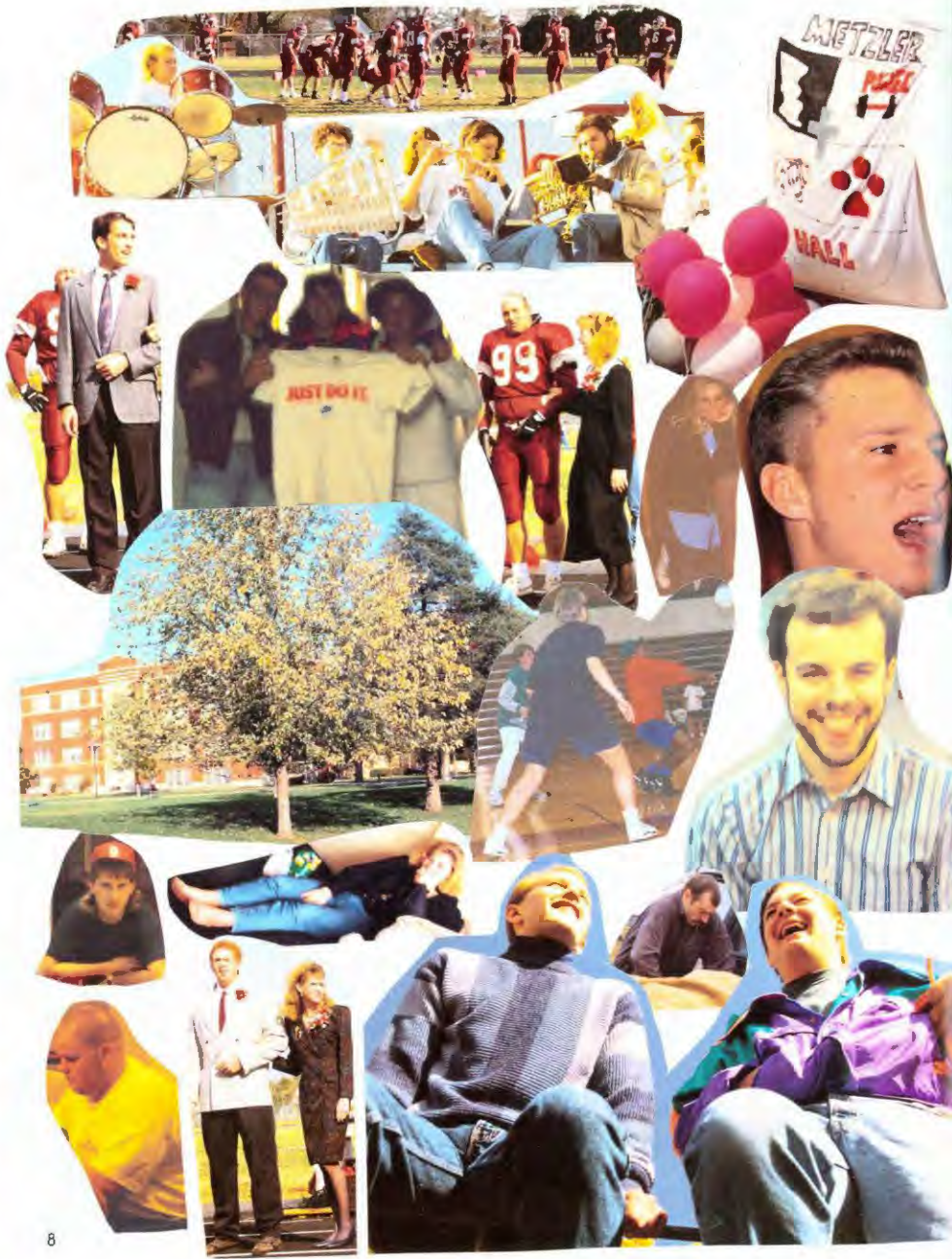

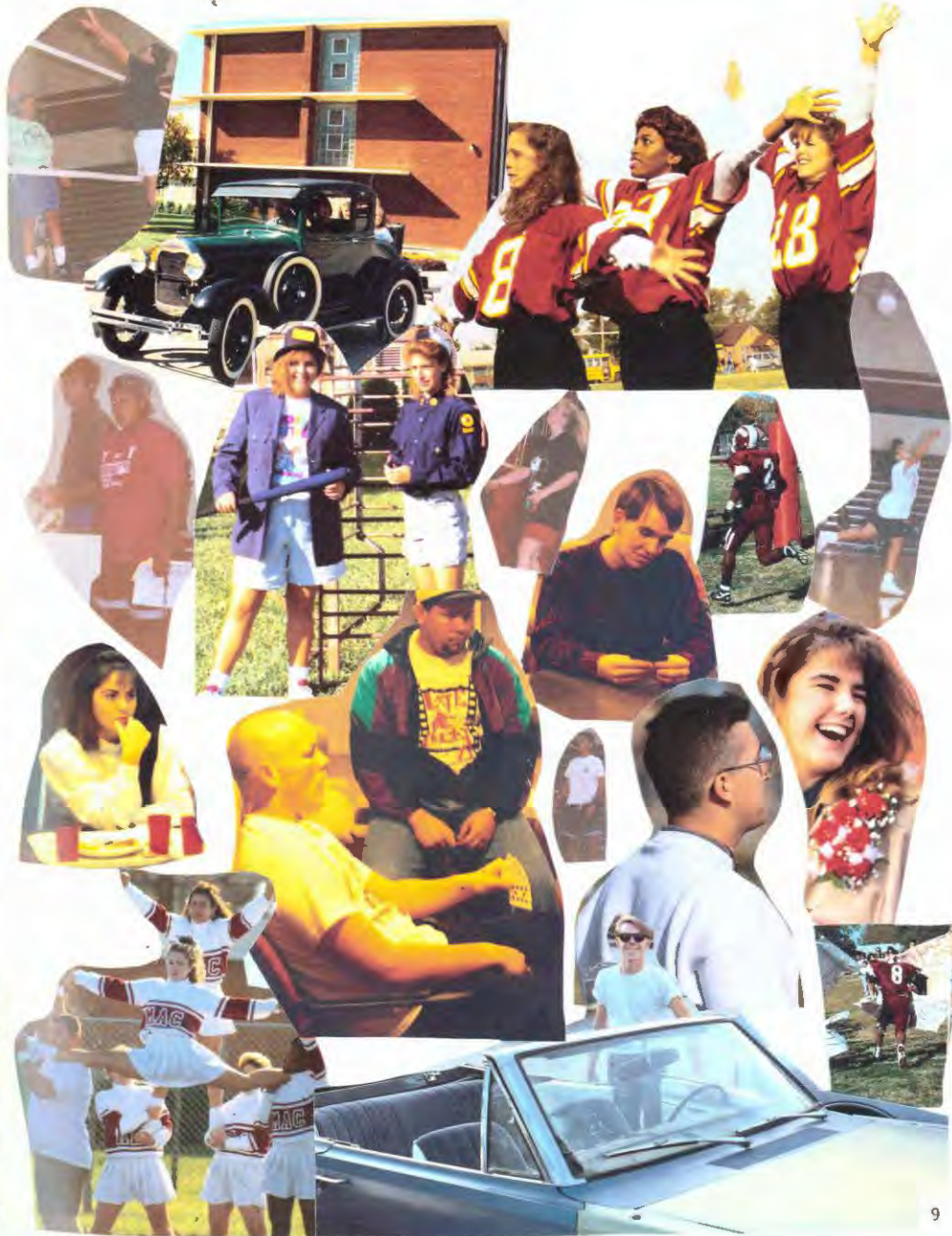

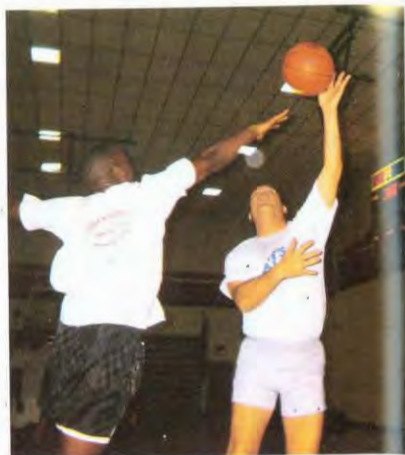

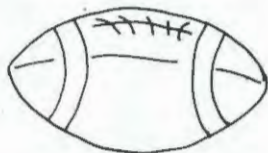

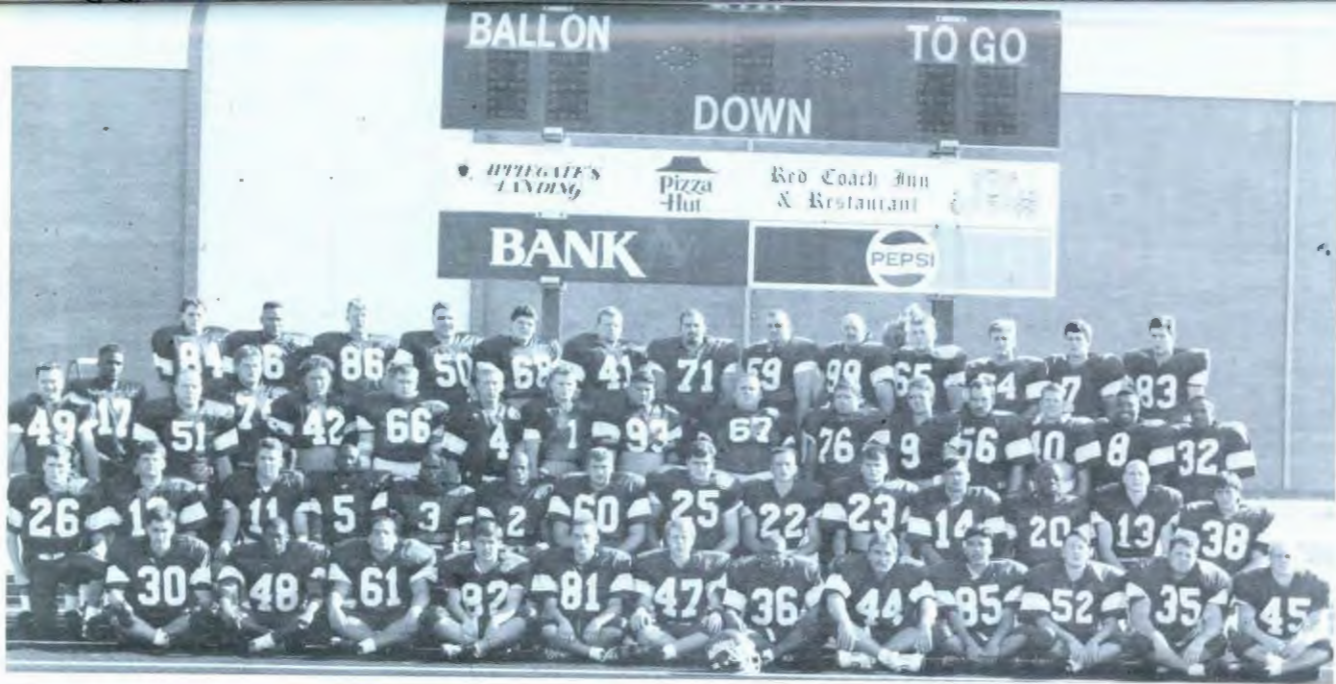

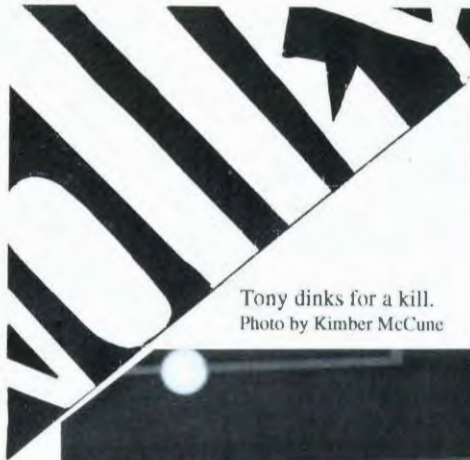

The Auto Restoration technology program is a two-year program which leads to an Associate in Technology (A.T.) degree. The program integrates theory and practical experience in auto restoration techniques as applied to antique and/or special interest vehicles as chosen by the faculty.

Classroom presentations are provided to ensure an overview of mechanical systems and restoration business and shop practices.

The major goal of the restoration program is to teach auto restoration at its best. The vehicle classifications and quality standards of national automobile clubs play a

special role in curriculum development and project selection. It is expected that both faculty and students share a common goal of striving for authentic restorations based upon extensive research, which is done through a variety of automobile literature sources and knowledgeable persons. 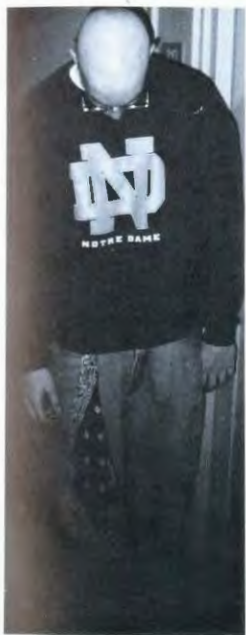

Student Council

All students are invited to participate in the council by becoming a member or attending the meetings. called for a decision concerning the disbursement of approximately \$10,000. This was solved by establishing an endowment fund, which will generate interest to be used to fund future Councils, and by purchasing an electronic bulletin board for the Student Union.

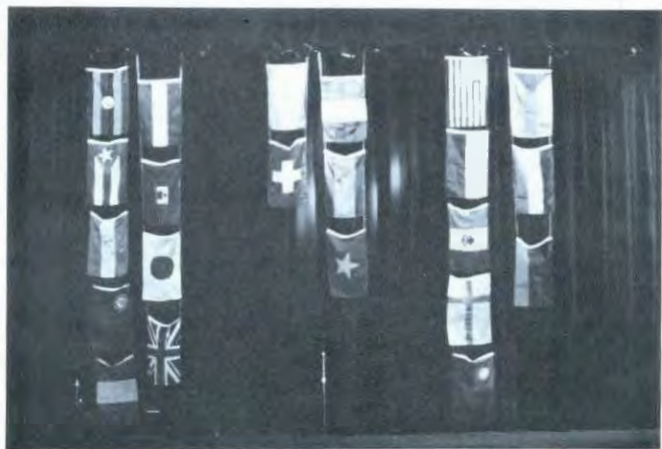
