Personally I should like to think of these days as full of opportunities for clear, constructive thinking and abundant in opportunities for service to the end of human betterment.

You who are in college this year are highly fortunate and in the years ahead you will be increasingly appreciative of the fact that you will be in a better position to make a more valuable contribution to social improvement in a needy world

McPherson College is an intellectual, social and spiritual environment in which the student may continue his intellectual, social and spiritiual growth.

The year 1943-1944 at McPherson College will be different in many ways. Probably it will be the first in the history of the college when there were more women than men in the regular four year program. It is the first time that the year opened with eight good buildings. It is the time at which, probably, the college never had a better time to prove herself worthy of her alumni and many other friends including the churches which so generously support her. It is the first time that the General Conference of the Church of the Brethren has voted to supply funds to aid the college in meeting her budget. It is the first year in many in which we are unable to have a football schedule. We will have basketball, however, and an enlarged program of play and recreational activities.

May I repeat, by saying that the year ahead offers students and faculty opportunities never excelled in the appeal for the expression and growth of the best potentialities they possess.


