

"Mary, I see where one college professor is suggesting that girls not be allowed to go to college. "Goodness, what does he give as his reason?"

"Well, he has been reading the papers, and he has come to believe that college enrollments are rapidly rising everywhere and that there will soon be many youth who will not be allowed to go to college because there will be no space for them."

"He thinks, therefore, a regu lation ought to be made that girls be the ones who cannot go to college. Mary, is there any truth in these figures about rapidly rising enrollments?"

"Yes, Jane. It is true particularly in the East and in the Far West. It is not true in the middle part of the United States. But even in the East and the West it is not nearly as rapid-a rise as statistics seem to indicate.
