New faculty to greet students

Three new full-time faculty will be in classrooms in Mohler and Hamly Halls when classes begin Monday evening, Sept. 1, and Tues., Sept. 2.

Dr. Donald "Buzz" Hoagland replaces Dr. John Burkholder in the biology department. Dr. Hoagland, who has the Ph.D. from the University of Vermont, comes most recently from the University of Kansas where he has taught for the past several years. A special area of interest for Dr. Hoagland is the mongoose and its habitat in the Caribbean.

Dr. Robert Neufeld, whose Ph.D. is in mathematics from Iowa State University, will be new associate professor in mathematics and computer science with major responsibility for the academic computing facilities on campus. Dr. Neufeld has taught previously at Bethel College in Newton.

Mr. Douglas Weinbrenner joins the business and accounting

department as assistant professor of accounting. Mr. Weinbrenner has degrees from Wichita State and Texas Tech.

Returning to campus after sabbatical leaves are Professor Al Dutrow, agriculture, who took a year of doctoral study at Kansas State University, and Dr. Richard Zerger, physical science, who did postdoctoral research at the University of Connecticut during the spring semester.

Familiar faces that will be missing this fall due to sabbatica leaves include Susan Dodson, art, who is in doctoral studies at the University of Missouri; Dr. Herb Smith, philosophy and religion, who will be in Sapporo, Japan, as director of the Brethren Colleges Abroad site there; Dr. Leland Lengel, who will be studying the American automobile in Detroit and doing background research for his geography course as he travels through New Zealand and Australia;

Rowena Olsen, head librarian, who will be doing doctoral work at Southern Illinois University; Dan Hoffman, physical education, who is beginning doctoral studies at Kansas State; and Mary Flagg, mathematics and computer science, who is continuing work on a second master's degree in computer science at Wichita State.

Joining the faculty in adjunct positions to help fill these short-term vacancies will be Brad Hamill, computer science; Michelle Williams, art; and Louise Watson, history and political science. Watson is a 1988 graduate of McPherson College with the M.A. in history from Colorado State University.

In addition Deb Moore, head volleyball coach, will assume some new teaching responsibilities in physical education.

Standout student/athlete dies in automobile accident

Jonathan Sowell, sr., Columbus, Ohio, died in a one-car accident June 23 after he lost control of the car he was driving and hit a utility pole. Sowell, a standout the last two years on the Bulldog basketball team, was to graduate at the end of the summer. Three passengers in the car with Sowell were seriously injured but survived.

Sowell transferred to McPherson in the fall of 1989. As a student, he was known for his sense of humor and his dedication to school, basketball, and the youth in the community.

As a player, he was known for his relentless hustle and tremendous defensive play. He averaged nearly 16 points per game last season and was selected to the All-KCAC and All-District 10 teams. He started at point guard his junior year, but was moved inside this past season.

"Jonathan was an outstanding person and a fine asset to our school. He was a fine basketball

player. It's a terrible loss," said Roger Trimmell, Sowell's head coach for the past two years.

A memorial service for Sowell was held at the McPherson Church of the Brethren on Wed., June 26. Trimmell and President Paul Hoffman conducted the service. Several of Sowell's teammates shared their memories and impressions at the service.

Trimmell, President Hoffman, Sharon Knechel, vice president for student services, and Dan Hoffman, director of athletics, attended Sowell's funeral service in Columbus on behalf of the college.

Men's, women's soccer to debut in fall '91

Soccer teams wearing the maroon and white of McPherson College will take the field for the first time in the college's history this fall.

The men's team opens in Wichita against Kansas Newman on Sept. 9. The women also begin their season in Wichita, against Friends University Sept. 11.

Men's head coach Jerry Malone brings impressive credentials to the new program. Malone coached soccer at Central College in McPherson from 1975 to 1979 and 1981 to 1989. In a five year stretch from 1984-88, his teams won the Little College Athletic Association national championship twice, finished runnerup twice, and placed third once. He was named

national coach of the year two times and had a 12-3 record in the playoffs.

He holds an advanced national diploma through the National Soccer Coaches Association, the highest credential for soccer coaches. Malone will continue teaching psychology at Central College.

Kester Iyoha has been named head coach of the women's team. Iyoha, a former Tabor College soccer star, is one of the top players ever to come out

of the KCAC and is extremely knowledgeable of the game, ac-

ording to Malone. Iyoha has had coaching experience with Malone in community youth leagues.

Malone recognizes that this year must be a building year. Nevertheless, he remains guardedly optimistic about the men's chances. "We'll have five or six young men who can really play," Malone said.

The women can also be competitive in their first season, Malone believes. "Kester has several good players coming in. And because most of the women's

soccer programs have just been started in the past few years, they'll compete on a pretty even basis," Malone said.

Malone is concerned that he reach all new and returning students who are interested in playing but have not been contacted. Interested soccer players should call Malone at (316) 241-8137 or make contact with him upon arrival on campus.

Players should have a physical exam completed before arrival, said Malone. He also recommends that players purchase shoes and have them broken in before arrival.

"Pre-season conditioning is critical," stressed Malone. "With only one week to prepare for the first game, we have to hit the ground running," he said. "Practice will focus on team tactics rather than conditioning."

With only one week of practice before the first match, students planning on participating in McPherson College's soccer program need to arrive on campus in condition, stressed Coach Jerry Malone. Malone recommends this workout three times per week, Mon.-Wed.-Fri.

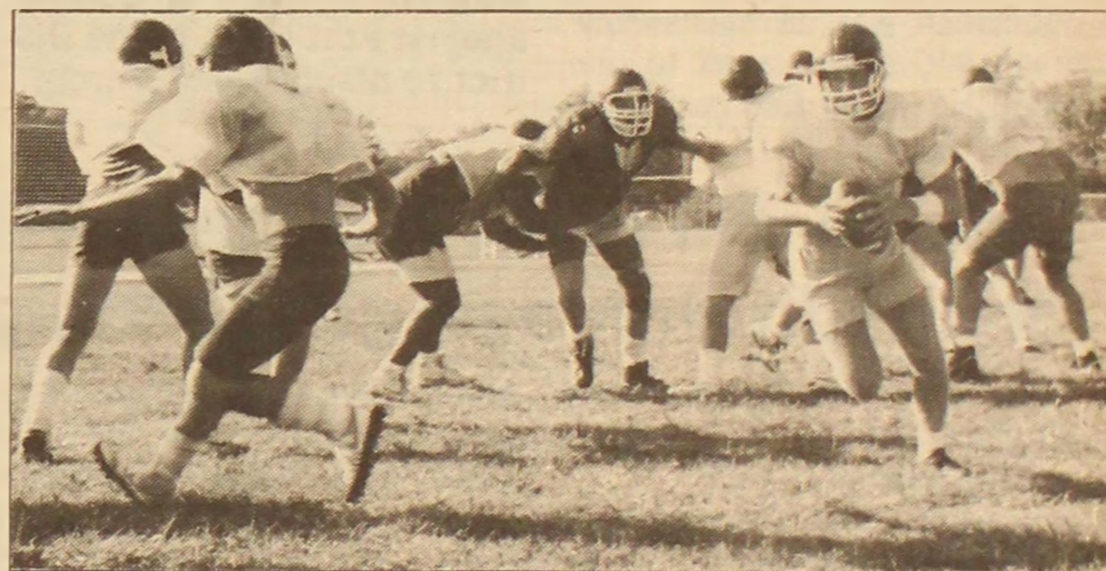
Head coaches from Bulldog basketball programs that qualified for the District 10 playoffs last season remain the same.
