5. Preliminary plans for the 65th Anniversary of the College's beginning, with the possible date set for commencement time.

The trustees will be in charge of the chapel program Wednesday, Feb. 20. They plan to have their meetings over by that afternoon.

## UMT or Americanism

"Avoid the necessity of those overgrown military establishments which, under any form of government, are inauspicious to liberty."

These are the words of George Washington.

"We stand for compulsory military service for every man. If a state is not worth that, then away with it."

These are the words of Adolf Hitler. (In Mein Kampf).

Here we read the words of two great men. One a famous leader of the United States, and the other a notorious leader of Germany.

Yet in the year 1952 the United States has proposed legislation before congress in an effort to fasten upon the people of the United States a Universal Military Training Bill.

We Americans have always prided ourselves in the democratic belief that man was not made for the state, but that the state was made to serve its citizens.

If the UMT law were to pass it would weaken our nation in the field of education, in the ranks of labor, in the health of our people, in the efficiency of the government, and in the strength of our nation, child welfare.

Contrary to public thought, the UMT bill has not yet passed congress. It was up in congress last November, and passed the senate, but it did not pass the house.

What actually happened was this—The house got ahead of the senate in its agenda, therefore it dismissed and went home. The people then spoke to the Representatives and turned the tide against it. (This can be done again).

The thing that aroused many people to thinking was the way in which it was presented to congress. This was done by trying to make it part of Public Law 51 which was the Selective Service Act.

Again it is coming up under shadows in hopes that it might go through. It is coming up under "privileged legislation," and also under the name of National Security Training Act in an effort to pass it by the public.

Two things should be noted about this bill. One is that if the legislation did pass, the bill could not go into effect until the present Selective Service bill terminates. The other is the fact that it is a permanent peacetime conscription, and has no termination date.

There are also two proposals before congress which have some effect on this bill. One is a bill presented by Honorable Carl M. Vinson, who is the man who brought the bill back to congress after it had been buried the last session. He now proposes that a purely volunteer program be set up in which sixty thousand men be instituted on a trial basis. The other proposal is that offered by three Indiana Representatives which would provide two years of ROTC type training the last two years of high school, followed by six weeks at summer camp. Neither of these would solve the basic evil.

The thinking people of America are against it. The labor movement, the churches, and the farm bureau have definitely thrown their weight against it.

Here is a statement made on January 21 by Honorable Andrew F. Schoeppel, a senator from Kansas. "I have checked carefully into this new UMT bill and looked at it in detail from all angles. In some ways it is more objectionable and fundamentally wrong than was the UMT measure last year which I voted against—you will recall that I was one of only five senators who voted "NO" to it last session. Therefore, I want to tell you honestly and frankly that unless this bill is drastically changed, which I doubt it will be, either in Committee or on the floor of the senate, it is going to be my purpose and intent not to support it but to work against it and I shall vote against it."

The history of America is against UMT. The hope of America is against UMT. The spirit of America is against UMT. The dream of America is against UMT. Are you against UMT? If so, below are the names, addresses, and the standing of your senators and representatives. It is your duty to write them and let them know how you feel. Let us hold high the heritage that has made America great, and go thumbs down on UMT.

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## Letter To The Editor

Sunday morning in Sunday school class, the sophomore and the junior-senior classes met together. Toward the end of the class time, Prof. Jack Kough was trying to compare some of our uncertainties with those of Nicodemus. He tried to pull out of the class some of the activities on campus which we thought had the position of uncertainty in the minds of students as to right or wrong.

For reasons such as a minority feeling several were hesitant about marking any approved campus activity. However, feeling a sense of guilt, I am prompted to write this article.

One of these activities in question, among others, is "folk-gambling." In my mind it is not a controversial issue, but with some it is. In the first place it is a form of dancing which as yet has not been approved of in many of our mid-western rural areas. This form of recreation would not be accepted in our original Brethren doctrine.

The second thing that comes to my mind is the fact that it does not belong in a Christian society. Many of these "games" come from pagan religious ceremonies or from pagan or semi-pagan societies.

This does not say that many of our other activities and symbols do not have a pagan origin, but can we put two more wrongs together to make a right? We should realize that which Rev. Zeller pointed out Sunday evening, Jan. 13, "that which is not best in us is mixed with that which is not best in others and becomes a lower common denominator."

From this we may assume that rationalization comes easy.

Then as another point of conjecture through observation is that we students ought to grow up in our own thinking. Why is it necessary that we require so much recreation? Why can we not sit for a hour thinking or talking about the greater accomplishments of life without getting the jitters? Our parents and our teachers help guide us up to a certain point, after which, we, ourselves must take care of our lives with God in command.

It is my sincere concern, that we, as Christian young people (if we are) should weed out as many activities as possible which do not enhance our Christian personalities. In order to become Christians, we have the choice of one road to travel. I fail to see the value of that which does not make me a better Christian.

The spending budget proposed by our Federal Government for next year reveals that the price of Government is going up. Next year will cost to my family of four \$2294.00 if it were equally proportioned out across the country on a man, woman and child basis.

A price like that makes government our most expensive luxury. The cost of \$2294.00 for Federal Government we will need to pay the costs of local and state government. For that outlay we ought to have a very good government indeed!

Actually only 15¢ out of each dollar will be used for some of the things we badly need such as better medical care, old age benefits and better schools. Sixty cents will go directly into the military machine and at least 12¢ more will go into auxiliary military enterprises. The military is not designed to be a help-giving machine.

Wise people on both sides of inhibitory boundary lines ought to look at the rising costs of government.
