#### Ziegler To Be Speaker During Religious Emphasis

Religious Emphasis Week activities will begin on campus on Sunday, March 18, and continue through Thursday, March 22.

Spiritual director for the activities will be Dr. Jesse R. Ziegler, present professor of psychology and Christian education at Bethany Biblical Seminary in Chicago.

General theme for the conference is "Jesus and Man". The topic for the first address to be given on Sunday, March 18, is "There's Good News For You."

It will be followed that evening by "The Greeks: Without Benefit of Clergy."

Other topics in the order of their presentation are "Consider the Church," "Pilate: Integrity Meets Waterloo," "God and the Persons — Things Dilemma," "James and John: How To Get Ahead," "Will You Be A Witness?" "With Love's True Instinct," and "Mary Did He Rise For You?"

Services will be held each morning at 9:35 and each evening at 7:30 through Thursday, Monday

classes will be telescoped to permit a third chapel for that week and Friday's chapel will be on Wednesday.

An opportunity for individual conferences will be open to all students on every afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock. A list will be posted on the bulletin board in Sharp. Students may sign their names for one-half hour conference periods.

Besides the afternoon conferences times will be scheduled from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. on Thursday. Each morning of the first four school days, Dr. Ziegler will lead discussion groups in the SUR from 10:30-11:20. These will be open to everyone.

Students will also have an opportunity to eat in informal fellowship with Dr. Ziegler during the noon hour on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday.

Besides the services each evening, night group discussions will be held in each of the three dormitories for students and faculty members on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday.

These discussions will be immediately following the message of the evening at approximately 8:45-9:30 p.m. They will be under the combined leadership of students and faculty.

Mrs. Ruth Gagliardo, a staff member of the Kansas State Teachers Association is to be in McPherson March 13-15.

#### Meetings Continue Through Week-end

College Hill residents offered the high school students and leaders a welcome as they arrived on campus to attend the Western Region Youth Conference which commenced yesterday and will continue through Sunday.

After the supper hour attending "Operation Hamburger" at the church last night, recreation in the gym provided the first opportunity for many of the youth to get together. A worship service was conducted by the S. W. Kansas group.

This afternoon at 2 p.m., Dr. Roger Fredrickson, minister of the First Baptist Church of Ottawa, Kan., and professor at Ottawa University will speak on "Taking Hold in Faith." Dr. Fredrickson will be the main speaker of the conference.

Eula Mae Murray, who spent last year in Belgium as a farm youth exchange student, will tell the guests about "Student Peacemakers" in the chapel following Fredrickson's talk in the church.

Rec Council members will manage recreation groups in the gym at 4 p.m.

The Regional Cabinet will meet this afternoon in the church at 4:30. It includes two representatives from each district, one youth and one counselor, the executive committee, composed of five program area chairmen for citizenship, fellowship, faith, outreach, and witness; a regional counselor, a regional youth director, and executive secretary, and the district field representative.

There are two meetings of this group a year. The first and most important one in November, just before the Regional Conference and the second one at the Regional Youth Conference.

## Kinzie Finds Copper Mine

Prof. Kenneth Kinzie, Maccollege art and ceramics instructor, has found a copper mine on Maccampus. He does not have to dig the copper out of the ground though; it is much handier that that.

This copper comes from the printer's cuts of old Quadrangle and Spectator pictures. Over a period of several years, which are wooden blocks with etched copper plates mounted on them, have been collected by the Quadrangle and Spectator staffs. Most of them are no longer of any use to these publications.

The art department has purchased the cuts from the Student Council.

Professor Kinzie has found that the copper plates from these cuts can be used in the enameling process he teaches in connection with his enameling class.

The copper plate of a cut is quickly away from its block of wood and then heated in the ceramic department's kiln. This turns the old dried ink that is still on the plate; and when the plate is taken out of the kiln, the ink can easily be scraped off.

The copper plates are further cleaned with acid or steel wool. Then they are cut into various shapes or left in a rectangular shape. After the copper is cut to the desired shape, it is ready to be coated with enamel.

Many colors of enamel are available, and any type of design can be made on a copper plate by using the different colors.

The enamel is available in several different forms and is ap-

## McPherson College Accepted As Member Of AACTE At Chicago

It has been announced that McPherson College, along with 29 other colleges was accepted as a member of the AACTE at a three-day annual meeting. Prof. Merrill Frantz, assistant professor of education and psychology, attended the meeting in Chicago.

AACTE is a national teachers' professional organization known as the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. Its work is to improve instruction, especially in the field of teacher education, and to encourage and carry on new educational research programs.

A committee that is primarily interested in teacher education could have sent a representative. Every state and the Philippines and Hawaii were represented at the meeting.

The meeting began with the reading of a telegram from President Dwight D. Eisenhower, reminding the people who were present of the roles that education and educators have in shaping the future.

A plea for colleges and high

schools to have community members do part-time teaching in a teacher shortage was made. There are many persons who would not have time to teach a full schedule but could be of help in teaching a few classes.

Professor Frantz was impressed with the down-to-earth approach in the student-teaching programs to develop better and more direct experience in working with children prior to teaching. It is important in introductory education courses that students have opportunity to work with children in order to discover whether or not they actually enjoy working with children and students.

Another topic for discussion was that all teachers should take a course in international relations and ought to have an opportunity to live with a different race of people.

Maccollege's becoming a member of the AACTE is a first step in a long-range plan to improve the teacher education program and for recognition from national accrediting associations.

## Dr. Maurice A. Hess Returns For Career Of 37 Years At Mac

Dr. Maurice A. Hess, professor of English and Latin, will teach again next fall making a teaching career of 37 years at McPherson College. Upon being asked if he would return, Dr. Hess stated, "Return! I have been here for 36 years and plan to continue on the faculty."

In being interviewed, Dr. Hess stated that he has instructed approximately 3,500 students here at McPherson College.

Many changes of the college have been seen by Dr. Hess, who has served under four of the college ten presidents.

The first year Dr. Hess taught, the new wing of Kline Hall was completed. Other buildings that have been built on the campus are the college church, Dotzour Hall, Harnly Hall, and Frantz Hall. Two new stadiums have been built and two sets of college courts have been constructed.

Fahnestock Hall, the physical education building, and the Forney plane have been built to replace similar buildings.

Beeghly Library has been made larger and Arnold Hall was converted from a women's dormitory to a men's dormitory.

Dr. Hess was born and reared in the western part of the United States. He received his higher education at Cumberland Valley Normal, Ursinus College, University of Chicago.

Prior to his coming to McPherson, Dr. Hess had taught at the Mt. Alto Grammar School for one year. He taught two years at both the Dry Run High School and Tamaqua High School. In the summer of 1917 and five weeks of the fall term, he instructed at Swarthmore Prep - School. These schools are in the state of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Maurice A. Hess's name appears in such books as Who's Who in American Education, the Dictionary of American Scholars, and Who's Who in the Mid-West.

Music and home economics are the only two courses on the curriculum which Dr. Hess has not

taught. Forensics, however, has been of primary interest to him.

He is a charter member of the local Pi Kappa Delta and is the only person who has served for five consecutive years as governor of the Province of the Plains.

#### Eighteen Complete First Aid Course

Eighteen McPherson students under the instruction of Prof. Dick Wareham have just been certified by the Red Cross to teach first aid courses anywhere in the United States in the world.

These students have completed the first Red Cross Instructor's course, to be offered at McPherson College. The instructor, Prof. Dick Wareham is one of the few persons in the western region of the Red Cross accredited to teach such a course.

The class met at various times from Feb. 6 to 20. Each student that took the course was required to have at least 18 hours of instruction in standard and 12 hours work in advanced first aid courses.

They spent about 15 hours work in the instructor's course for which they will receive one semester hour of credit.

The students learned how to give first aid instruction in the practical problems of first aid such as, stopping bleeding, artificial respiration, bandaging, transportation and other means of first aid.

The Regional Representative of the Red Cross first aid, Gilbert Gribble, from whom Dick Wareham received his training was here from St. Louis for one day and met with the class and each

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## Kenneth Sheaffer Saw Austrian Refugee Problem

Kenneth Sheaffer, Macalester junior, is another Mac student who has spent a period of time in Europe.

Hitchhiking home from Pennsylvania following two years of alternative service in Austria, Kenneth Sheaffer got a ride with a Mr. Bev Besson of Tecumseh, Mich.

Mr. Besson, on his way to Tonawanda, Iowa, learning of Sheaffer's work, traveled 60 miles out of his way to help him.

Kenneth worked in Austria near the Yugoslav-Hungarian border. His work consisted of working with a group of refugees in a project of draining swamp land.

Included in his assignment was to visit the farms in that area and to assist where help was needed.

Sheaffer stated, "Following World War II, Austria is returning to its farm land and industry. Russia, who had military forces stationed in this country have evacuated thus restoring a closer pre-war

type living standard."

He continued, "Refugees coming from Communist zones enter the country without any passport which makes their entrance illegal."

With this type of entrance, the refugees are arrested and by law must be sentenced to a year's punishment."

The sentence is served in one of two possible ways. One was to serve a year in jail. The second solution was working on a farm for a year. Through the latter plan the refugees came to work on the drainage project.

Another Brethren Volunteer from Pennsylvania also helped in conducting this program sponsored by the Brethren Service Commission in cooperation with the Austrian Government.

**Smith Wins Scoring Race**

Bill Smith, the Bulldogs' high-scoring post man, has been selected as one of the ten best men on the coaches all - Kansas Conference basketball squad for the 1955-56 season. He is the only MacPherson player to receive special recognition.

The eight conference coaches selected a 10-man squad when they could have five on a five - man team. The coaches could not vote for any of their own men.

Three members of the Bethel team head the all-star squad. The Graymaroons just won their first conference championship in history with a 22-2 record. In all, five of the Bethelites received special recognition.

Baker, finishing in seventh place in the conference was the only other team to place more than one player on the all-star team.

Sixth - place Bethany is the only conference team not represented in the top 10 players; however, they placed three men on the honorable mention list.
