Faculty Support Community Chest

McPherson College faculty members are cooperating with the city of McPherson in the second United Community Chest campaign which started Monday, Oct. 17.

Prof. Guy Hayes is in charge of the solicitation of the faculty. Pledge cards have been placed in faculty boxes by Professor Hayes, and faculty members make their donations and return the cards to him.

The drive is to raise \$20,000 for the 1956 budgets of eight cooperating organizations. Largest single budget for the drive is that of the Red Cross, \$10,000.

Other organizations and their budgets are: YMCA, \$7,995; Boy Scouts, \$3,750; Girl Scouts, \$1,700; Kansas Children's Service League, \$1,000; American Legion, \$1,000, and Board of Logopedia, \$2,000.

In addition, \$2,025 has been set aside for expenses and "shrinkage," or unpaid pledges.

This year's goal is \$3,000 above that of 1954.

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DeCoursey Tests Soils; Also Analyzes Intoximeters

The private laboratory of Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, head of the Chemistry Department, houses many interesting things. To one not well versed in the field of chemistry, one look into the lab does not reveal very much. But after a few minutes of explanation,

much of the formerly uninteresting equipment takes on a new light.

One part that takes up quite a bit of space is the soil testing equipment. Dr. DeCoursey works with McPherson County Agent, Elgin R. Button, in running soil analysis tests.

Now in the third year of soil testing, nearly one thousand samples have been tested. From the results of these tests, the County Agent can advise the farmer what type of fertilizer would be most practical for the crop to be planted in this field.

The soil is tested for the amount of potash, phosphates, and organic matter present. None of the soil samples from this area have shown a lack of potash, therefore, any farmer who uses a complete fertilizer is putting some unnecessary compounds into the soil.

Also the soil is tested for the acidity to determine how much, if any, lime is needed to make the soil chemically neutral.

The farmers bring the soil sample to the County Agent. The soil is first washed well then ground into a fine powder. From this powder Dr. DeCoursey runs the analysis of the soil.

Dr. DeCoursey has brought different types of soils back to McPherson from various parts of the country. He has noticed from the tests of these soils that the amount of fertilizer needed and the length of time that the land has been farmed go hand in hand.

The lab work is not entirely devoted to work with soils, however. Dr. DeCoursey also analyzes intoximeters for McPherson and Rice counties and the cities of McPherson and Lyons when necessary.

Other odds and ends are also brought into the lab from time to time such as water samples, milk samples, and boiler rust samples.

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Bulldogs Meet Coyotes At KWU Tomorrow Night

McPherson College Bulldogs tackle Kansas Wesleyan University in a conference battle at KWU tomorrow night at 7:30 p.m.

Ends were J. Hardesty, senior, and Gerald Frazell, junior. Harry Stromgren, senior, and Ron Ebbers, senior, were guards. Playing center was Keith Blide, a freshman. Tackles were Bill Danenhauer, senior, and Tony Snider, a senior.

Mace's Line-up

In McPherson's starting line-up were fullback Merle Rolfs, halfbacks Galen Stucky and Ron Sams, and quarterback Ed Wolf. Playing center was Louis Roberts.

Those yards was clipped off by Charlie Jones for a first down on the first play, then Fred Washington went 13 more to reach the McPherson 30 and a first down.

The visitors reached the one-foot line in seven more plays, then, on the next play, Jim Ortiz smashed over the line to score. Extra point was kicked by John Fehr.

Wolf Takes Kickoff

Emporia's kickoff was taken by Wolf and returned to the McPherson 26. Ron Sams got away for a 23-yard gain and a first down for McPherson. A Bulldog pass was intercepted by Washington on his own 48. A lateral from Elm to Ortiz was good for nine yards, then Elmer Stucky made two first downs in a row, reaching the Bulldogs 24. Washington went over three plays later to score. An attempt for the extra point failed.
