

## Anderson, Vaupel Receive U. S. Academy Appointments

Two McPherson College freshmen, Gary Anderson and Ben Vaupel, have received major appointments to military academies for the coming year.

Gary Anderson, Mac freshman class president from Grand Junction, Colo., has received the principal appointment to the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colo.

Then on Jan. 18, 1960, Gary was notified that he was to be the principal Air Force appointee from Colorado by virtue of his, the highest score on the July civil service test.

Gary spent Feb. 15, 16, and 17 at Offutt Air Force Base, Omaha, Neb., taking a series of physical, mental and medical examinations. These tests are necessary to qualify for the flying program.

(Offutt Air Force Base is the world headquarters of the Strategic Air Command.)

A high school honor student and outstanding football guard, Gary was a member of the Mac football squad and on the honor roll the first semester.

While attending the 1958 Political Youth Seminar sponsored by the Church of the Brethren, Gary met Colorado's Fourth District Congressman, Wayne Aspinall. Congressman Aspinall interested Gary in the Air Force appointment when he spoke to the Grand Junction High School in January 1959.

### Letter of Application

A letter of application for nomination was written to Congressman Aspinall and Gary received permission to begin the preliminary testing program.

July 13, 1959, Anderson took a civil service examination especially designed for the various academy applicants.

March 12, Anderson will go to Salina to take the College Entrance Examination Board tests, the last exams of the series.

### Enter July 1

On July 1, 1960, Gary will enter the Air Force Academy north of Colorado Springs, Colorado, for a four year humanities, science, and airmanship program. Upon completion, Gary will be a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force.

**The Trustees**

This week-end the Board of Trustees of McPherson College is meeting at the college for its annual winter meeting. The trustees come from long distances, some of them more than a thousand miles. They come with dedicated purpose, because they believe the work which they have to do in the two or three days they are here is very directional and very important. Consequently, we welcome to McPherson College the Trustees of our College, and of their College.

Some of these trustees represent the different church districts of the Church of the Brethren in this central area of the United States. Two trustees are elected by the alumni, or by alumni groups. A few of the trustees are elected by the trustee body themselves, and become trustees-at-large. This is done in order that a number of trustees might be located in the general McPherson area, so that they can function in the interim when the larger trustee body cannot meet together because of the distance involved.

This trustee body has now been in existence for nearly 75 years. In 1962, McPherson College will celebrate with appropriate ceremonies its 75th anniversary. During this long period of years, the trustees have determined the general, over-all, policies of the college. They have planned for and sought to undergird the finances of the college. They have laid out long-term plans for the college. They have carried the interests of the college on their hearts.



The trustees pray together, work together, plan together. As faculty and students let us stand ready to give them all the help we can.

**Next Wednesday Marks Beginning Of Lenten Season**

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent which is a six week period when men prepare themselves spiritually for the festival of Easter. The lenten season this year begins March 7.

Lent, meaning spring, is a fast of forty days, excluding Sundays and ending on the Saturday before Easter. This special observance is a symbol of Christ's 40-day fasting before His temptation with Satan.

Originally the fast was short and severe. The people did not consume anything for 40 hours between the afternoon of Good Friday and the morning of Easter.

As centuries passed the lenten period was celebrated longer and the rules became less strict. But even today people in some parts of the world avoid eating meat, milk products, and eggs.

Three Sundays preceding Lent carnival celebrations are held. The primary reason for carnivals was the feasting and rejoicing before the solemn season of fasting began.

By winning their final game the Bulldogs assured themselves of fourth place in the Kansas Conference and possibly third depending on how College of Emporia comes out against Baker tomorrow night in the final Kansas Conference game for the year.

**Bethany Wins Title**  
The Bethany College Swedes clinched the Kansas Conference basketball championship Monday night and gained the right to meet Pittsburg State, CIC tillet for the Kansas berth in the NIAA tournament in Kansas City, March 7-12.

Bethany knocked off Southwestern 73-59 at Lindsborg for their first conference crown since 1941.

The Kansas NIAA playoffs, a best of three affair, will begin Monday night, Feb. 29. The teams play at Bethany Monday and then move to Pittsburg for the final two games if both are needed.

Bethany finished with a 14-4 conference record, including 10 victories and no losses at home.

**Wind Second Game**  
In other games last week Friends downed Sterling 91-82 with Hay hitting 31 points for Friends as they won their second conference game of the season.

Bethany downed Ottawa 71-60 after trailing 33-31 at halftime. Bethel scored 14 points in the last seven minutes to defeat Kansas Wesleyan 81-75 and Baker broke an 81-81 tie with three minutes left to beat Mac 91-83.

In weekend games Bethel downed Southwestern 59-50, Ottawa whipped Friends 73-60, College of Emporia upset Bethany 74-66 by scoring 17 straight points after they had trailed 54-52 in the last half.

Mac blasted Kansas Wesleyan 108-86 and Sterling beat Baker 87-75.

ed to its present ultra-modern facilities in September 1958. The Academy is located ten miles north of Colorado Springs in the foothills of the mountains. Formerly the Academy was situated at Lowry Air Force Base in Denver, Colorado.

**Ben Vaupel**

Ben Vaupel, son of Mrs. Martha Vaupel of Ellsworth, has received a second alternate appointment to the Annapolis, Maryland Naval Academy beginning this coming year.

**Honor Student**

An honor roll student debater and a football letterman, Vaupel is a Macollege freshman who plans for the role of naval officer as a career.

**Kansas Senator, Frank W. Carlson**, made one principal and five alternate Kansas Congressional appointments for the academy this coming year.

If the class roster does not fill out, the secretary of the Navy chooses from the alternate appointees to complete the class at Annapolis.

An Ellsworth lawyer talked with Ben about the appointment and recommended him to Sen Carlson. Since then, a personal correspondence has been carried on between Ben and Sen Carlson.

**Civil Service Exam**

A civil service examination was the qualifying round of competition in Salina November 7.

Then came a scholastic test at Hays on Dec. 1, a physical examination in Kansas City, Kas., on Feb. 4, and finally the appointment.

March 12, Ben will take the College Entrance Examination Board Examination and another physical exam on March 15 to qualify for entrance to the officer training program.

When all these tests have been scored, a Kansas examining board will go over all past school records and test results before passing on the candidate and approving him for the appointment. Their report will be made later in the spring.

**NROTC Program**

If the alternate appointment is not used, Ben will enter the National Reserve Officer Training Corps program next fall, probably at Kansas University.

Scores on previous tests and school records are weighed by the Department of the Navy before a candidate is recommended for the NROTC program.

The four year NROTC program is nearly identical to the training program at Annapolis. Upon graduation, both schools confer the same commission, namely appointment as an ensign in the United States Navy.
