College Holds 40th Annual Pre-Game Pajama Parade

The parade is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. and the pajama paraders will snake dance down the main street. The group will pause at every intersection and hold a brief pep rally.

As a finale to the festivities, everyone is invited to attend a special show for 50 cents.

Thirty-nine years ago Macollege held its first pajama parade and at that time it was called the nightshirt parade. From the Oct. 4 issue of the Spec in 1921, edited by Orville D. Poe, comes the following sidelights on the traditional event.

"The boys of McPherson College staged a rather unique Nightshirt parade last Tuesday evening in order to arouse interest among the business men of the city for the game with Fairmount which was waged last Saturday afternoon.

One hundred fifty students garbed in 'ghostly apparel' departed from the dorm about 8:30 and wended their way, single file, to Main Street where a snake dance was soon in its height of glory.

Both sides of the street were lined with great numbers of curious spectators. At the corner of Kansas Avenue and Main the zigzag procession was greeted by

a refrain from the college band. After numerous rousing college yells, the line of march was directed to the Tourney theater which surrendered to the invaders after a short siege.

The soothing quietness and peacefulness which reigned supreme then was suddenly broken by a half dozen peppy yells and cheers. After informing the theater-goers of the mission of such a motley army, the theater was quickly evacuated.

The long winding train then proceeded northward to the corners of Euclid and Main where halt was made.

Again the great crowd of curious onlookers was favored by several band selections sandwiched with plenty of college yells.

As the group disbanded the boys were picked up by good-natured business men and taken to the Hill."

Continued Construction Changes Macollege Campus

Buildings in many stages of construction are displayed on the disrupted campus of McPherson College.

With the beginning of school came the final chapter in the completion of Mohler Hall.

The day of moving was in late August when the administrative and the regional offices moved from Sharp Hall to the new building while the contract painters finished up their work.

The first floor of the building consists of one class room, bookstore, business office, promotion offices, and the administrative offices. On second floor are classrooms and professors' offices.

McPherson College will sponsor a community cultural series during the coming 1960 - 1961 school year. The cultural series will include four musical numbers and one lecture.

The four musical programs are definitely arranged, but the lecture program is yet to be selected. All five of the cultural programs will be presented in the new Brown Auditorium which has a seating capacity of 1200.

First Program
The first program will be in connection with Homecoming and the dedication of Mohler Hall and the auditorium. This program will feature the Don Cossack Chorus and Dancers, who are an internationally known group.

A matinee performance will be presented on Friday afternoon, Oct. 21 for the high school students of McPherson County. The evening performance for all college students, faculty, and the general public will begin at 8 p.m.

Westminster Choir
The second program in the series on Feb. 19 will feature the Westminster Choir of Westminister Choir College, Princeton, N. J. This Sunday afternoon program will begin at 2:30 p.m.

William Clauson, I.C. concert balladeer and guitarist will be featured in the third program to be given on March 3, at 8 p.m.

St. Louis Trio
The fourth musical program is scheduled for April 28 at 8 p.m. and will feature the St. Louis trio, consisting of a pianist, violinist, and cellist, all members of the St. Louis Symphony.

Season Ticket
The college will conduct a season ticket sale for the five programs in the series. Season tickets will be \$4.00 for college students, and \$7.00 for adults. Single program admission tickets will be sold for \$2.00.

Building Plans Complete; Bids To Be Let Soon

Final working plans for the three new buildings costing \$700,000 that are to be added to the Macollege facilities are complete and the government is now checking the final plans.

The twelve unit addition to the College Courts is already under construction with the foundation poured and the plumbing completed.

The new addition to Dotzour Hall and the new student union will be started as soon as the government approves the working plans for these two buildings.

Built At North End
The addition to Dotzour Hall, which will house 72 girls, will be built at the north end of the present building running at a northeast to southwest angle.

The new student union-cafeteria building will be located between Beeghly library and Dotzour.

Government Loan
In order to have money to build these buildings the college asked the government for a loan. Before the \$550,000 loan could be granted by the government the

college had to raise \$150,000 in the package plan.

In an interview with Dr. Bittlinger, he stated "The giving has been generous but we did not quite match the \$150,000 in cash that was needed. But with various pledges we were able to reach our goal. Until the pledges are paid, the college will borrow enough money to make the \$150,000 in cash available."

Checking Plans
In closing Dr. Bittlinger said, "Plans are moving along nicely and just as soon as the government offices in Ft. Worth, Tex., complete checking the plans the bids for the buildings will be let. The college is aiming for the addition to the College Courts to be finished by the beginning of the second semester, and the other two buildings to be completed for use next fall.

1959 KCAC Champions

Will Test Maccollege Line

Tomorrow night the McPherson College Bulldogs, with one of the strongest lines ever, meet the College of Emporia Presbies, 1959 Champions of the KCAC at 7:30 in the college stadium.

Annual football competition between Maccollege and the College of Emporia had its beginning in 1934. Since then, Mac and C. of E. have engaged in 23 contests of football might, out of which the Bulldogs have experienced 7 wins, 13 losses, and 3 ties.

C. of E. Wins '59 Game

In last year's game, the Presbies nosed out McPherson's team by a score of 14 to 7.

Under the floodlights of the athletic field on Monday night, the speed of the Bulldogs' backfield and the strength and stamina of their line was exemplified in scrimmage.

These 35 men, averaging 178 lbs. with a last season conference record of 4 wins and 5 losses, will be facing a much larger and experienced team.

Starting Line-Up

However, Coaches Sid Smith and Don Widrig have molded a team which will test their invulnerability. The starting line-up will be: Tim Wessolowski, 194 lbs., fullback; Tom Richards, 165 lbs., and Deryl Elmore, 162 lbs., halfbacks.

Byron Hayes, 135 lbs., quarterback; Gary Metsker, 178 lbs., and David Priddy, 185 lbs., ends; Ivan Prochaska, 207 lbs., and Garth Werner, 201 lbs., tackles; and Larry McPherson, 192 lbs., and Melvin Rolfs, 175 lbs., guards.

Players also expected to see action are: Larry Crumrine, 170 lbs., quarterback; Joe Looker, 156 lbs., guard; Cal Unruh, 178 lbs., halfback; and Don Prochaska, 179 lbs., fullback.

Baker University of Baldwin, picked to be the darkhorse in the conference race, will travel to Newton to take on Bethel in another loop opener. Baker has a lot of veterans back from last year's team and Bethel, with a large group of freshman and sophomores out, is in the building stages.

The Bethany College Swedes of Lindsborg will go to Sterling Saturday night to meet Sterling College for their opener.

The Swedes have plenty vacancies to fill but some new players have been added and they are expected to strengthen the 1960 team. Sterling has a new coach this season and they are in the rebuilding stages.

In the other conference opener Ottawa University of Ottawa will meet Friends University.

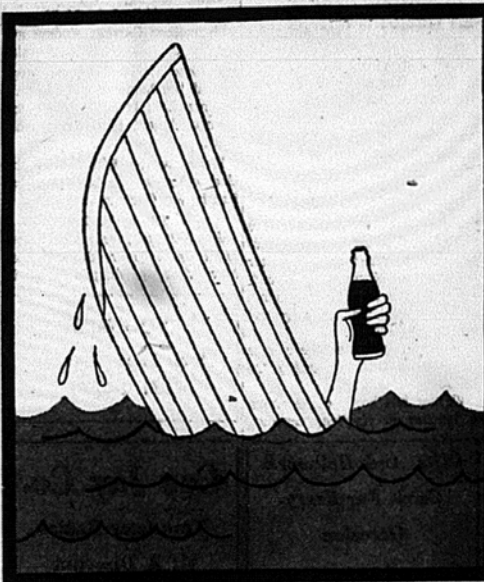

Kruse, German Exchangee Here; Nettleton Returns

Werner Kruse the second direct exchange student from Goettingen Teachers Training College and Jim Nettleton, McPherson's first direct exchange student to Goettingen are both now studying at Macollege.

Werner is a 23 year old senior student at Mac who comes from Lingen (Ems), Germany, where his parents and sister are living. Lingen is a city of 30,000 inhabitants which is located about ten miles from the Dutch border.

Father Is Surveyor

Werner's father is a surveyor and Werner's 18 year old sister has hopes of coming to America as an exchangee too.

Werner has attended the Goettingen Teachers Training College in Goettingen for five semesters and must attend it one more semester before he can graduate.

Enrollment of 800

The teachers college has an enrollment of 800 students. The school year at the college is composed of a four month semester beginning in November and ending in February and a three month semester beginning in May and ending in July.

Students who attend the college do practice teaching during the holidays.

Werner has hopes of becoming a teacher in English, German,

Biology, mathematics, and religion in a German Volksschule.

Werner left from the Netherlands on a freighter on Aug. 10, and arrive in Norfolk, Va. on Aug. 21.

All of these overseas assignments are for a two year period.
