

National Defense Program Loans To Mac Students

Because many deserving youth find financial need a prime obstacle against their college education, many institutions of higher learning, including Mc-Pherson College, provide assistance through the National Defense Student Loan Program.

This is the second year that. The government charges no in-McPherson College has been a terest on the loan until one year member of the National Defense after completion of the course of Student Loan Program. Under study. The student is then given this plan Congress appropriates ten years to repay the loan government funds to member colleges for loans to worthy stu-dents. For every \$9 the government provides, the college must add \$1.

The average loan to a student is approximately \$500. The amount can vary, however, from a minimum of \$150 to a maxi-

Fifty-seven students on the Mc-Pherson College campus are now benefitting from these loans.

In order to maintain the loan good scholastic standing is a prerequisite, a minimum average of "C" required.
