Macollege To Install New Campus Switchboard

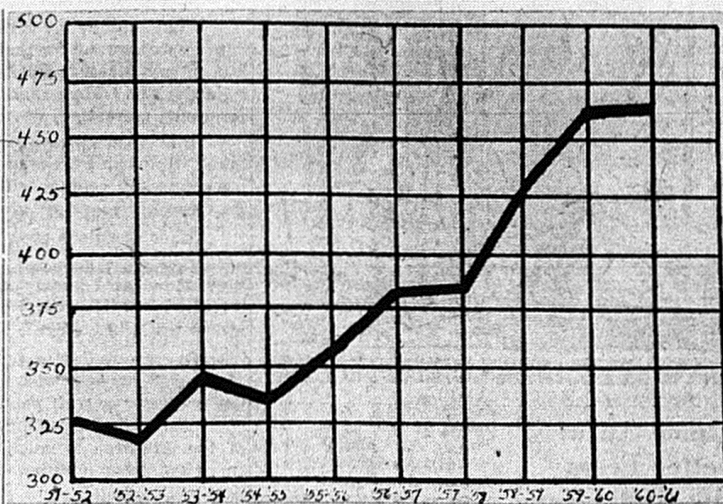
Soon calls between campus points can be made without dimes and less effort, because one will only need to dial two numbers instead of seven, when the new switchboard is installed in the Alumni office.

Located In Alumni

The main board will be located in the Alumni office, with operation from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and the auxiliary unit in Dotzour will operate after 5 p.m. and in early morning, if needed.

McPherson College's enrollment for the last ten years has experienced up and downs. Enrollments for this year is up only three students compared to last year's enrollment. Biggest increase in enrollment was in the fall of 1958 when it jumped 43 students.

College Enrollment Jumps 43 Per Cent In Ten Years

The expanding enrollment of McPherson College has jumped 43 per cent in the last ten years, according to figures released by Alice B. Martin, registrar of the college.

Mrs. Martin revealed that the current student body numbers 468 regular students, an increase of 141 over the 327 students enrolled for the 1951-1952 academic year.

Growth Uneven
Growth of the student body has been uneven. The biggest increase took place in the fall of 1958 when the enrollment jumped from 386 to 429, an increase of 43 students.

The smallest increase—1 student— took place prior to the start of the 1956-1957 year. The average increase over the last ten years has been slightly under 15 students.

Enrollment Down
Two years the enrollment didn't increase and even dropped. This was in 1952 when enrollment dropped to 319 from 327 enrolled in the fall of 1951. Also in 1954 when enrollment dropped from 348 to

333 over the previous year. Enrollment for this year is only up 3 students over last year. There is some belief that increased costs held down Macollege's enrollment this year.

Men Outnumber Women
Regular men students outnumber the women students by a big margin this year. There are 289 men students compared to 179 women students. Every year men have held a big majority over women students but this year's enrollment has the largest number of both men and women students.

Coming to McPherson College and Community soon is the Don Cossack Chorus.

Founded in 1927 by White Russian refugees, this group of men has acquired an enviable artistic reputation on five continents and has performed in 67 different countries.

First In Series

The Don Cossack Chorus will be the first in a series of cultural programs presented under the auspices of McPherson College and community.

Their presentation will be given October 21, 1960, at 8:15 p.m. in the College's new Brown Auditorium. High school students of the McPherson area will be invited to attend the matinee the same afternoon.

Tickets For Concert

Tickets for McPherson College students will go on sale within

the next two or three weeks. Announcement of the time of these sales will be in next week's SPECTATOR.

The membership of the chorus has always comprised the best vocal talent and dancers obtainable among the White Russian emigrants who were unwelcome in their homeland because of their opposition to Communism.

Coming first to the United States on January 3, 1939, the Cossack Chorus has given more than 7,000 concerts, 3,000 of which were rendered in the United States.

Plans For Mock Election Underway

The mock election is being held to create interest in the real, upcoming election and give students an idea of what they need to do before being able to vote. Plans for the election are being handled by the Student Council and The Spectator.

More details will be published next week.

Registrar To Compile Five Weeks Grades

Five weeks grades will be turned in to the registrar's office on Friday of the fifth week of school. Within a few days the grades will be compiled.

National Defense Program Loans To Mac Students

Because many deserving youth find financial need a prime obstacle against their college education, many institutions of higher learning, including McPherson College, provide assistance through the National Defense Student Loan Program.

This is the second year that McPherson College has been a member of the National Defense Student Loan Program. Under this plan Congress appropriates government funds to member colleges for loans to worthy students. For every \$9 the government provides, the college must add \$1.

Eligibility

In order to be eligible for the loan, the student must be in need of financial assistance and must be in good scholastic standing. Special consideration is given to potential school teachers and to students majoring in science, mathematics, engineering, and modern foreign languages, respectively.

Applications for these student loans may be submitted to the Treasurer's office any time. These are then acted upon by the committee consisting of Dr. Flory, chairman, Mr. Mullen, Dr. Geisert, Dr. Bittinger, and Mr. Yoder.

The government charges no interest on the loan until one year after completion of the course of study. The student is then given ten years to repay the loan.

Cancellation of a loan, at 10 per cent a year is provided for students who enter the public school teaching, with a maximum cancellation of 50 per cent.

\$21,800 in government and college funds was available to McPherson College at the beginning of the 1960-1961 school year.

The loans are renewable in every case, but new applications must be submitted each year.

Average Loan Is \$500

The average loan to a student is approximately \$500. The amount can vary, however, from a minimum of \$150 to a maximum of \$1000.

Fifty-seven students on the McPherson College campus are now benefitting from these loans.

In order to maintain the loan good scholastic standing is a prerequisite, a minimum average of "C" required.

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Mac Meets Southwestern In KCAC Clash

New Conference Comer Has Perfect 2-0 Record

On Saturday evening at 7:30, the McPherson College football team plays host to Southwestern University at the college stadium.

Even though this is the first year that Southwestern has participated in the football division of the KCAC, they are presently tied for first place in conference standings.

Southwestern possess a record of 2 wins, 0 losses, and 0 ties; and have scored 41 points against their opponents, while allowing their oppositions to score only 7 points against them.

Exemplifying the form that has earned for them the status of first place in conference competition, Southwestern downed Friends University of Wichita 13-0 last Saturday evening.

Jimmy Glenn, a half-back for Southwestern, contributed six points to the score by racing 52 yards for a touchdown.

McPherson College is ranked in third place in KCAC competition and holds a record of 1 loss, 1 tie, and 0 wins. The Bulldogs have scored a total of 13 points as compared to 26 points having been scored by Mac opposition.

McPherson and Kansas Wesleyan struggled to a 13-13 tie. Mac's Garth Werner grabbed a fumble out of the air and lumbered 30 yards to put Mac ahead in the last period.

Wesleyan tied the score with three minutes left as Check Clark drove seven yards for his second touchdown. The try for the winning point failed.

Friends Lose
In the other KCAC game Friends University put up a strong battle before losing to powerful Southwestern. The Mountbuilders crashed across from the 1 yard line for their first touchdown by Rick Urban. The score capped a 53 yard drive.

In the fourth quarter Jim Glenn scampered 52 yards around left end.

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Maccollege, Wesleyan Battle To A 13-13 Gridiron Tie

Saturday night in Salina at the Kansas Wesleyan University athletic stadium, the McPherson Bulldogs battled the Coyotes on a muddy field to a 13-13 deadlock.

Even though the score was tied, the game produced three penalties against the Coyotes and two against the Bulldogs. The Bulldogs also achieved twelve first downs as compared to the Coyotes having achieved only nine.

Seven Fumbles
Seven fumbles occurred during the game. The Bulldogs made four, and recovered one of these. The Coyotes made three fumbles.

The Bulldogs proved that they were on the ball by recovering every fumble that the Coyotes made.

The Coyotes scored 7 of its 13 points early in the second quarter by plunging over the Bulldogs five yard line and on to the goal line. The kicking of the extra point by the Coyotes gave them a lead of 7-0 over the Bulldogs.

Bulldogs Threaten
The Bulldogs threatened to score during the last minutes of the third quarter by advancing to the Coyotes three yard line. After play resumed for the beginning of the fourth quarter the Bulldogs completed their struggle to score with Tim Wesselowski scoring the Bulldogs first touchdown of the game and season.

Hoch To Richards
A pass completed from quarterback Art Hoch to Tom Richards, halfback, to the west side-line, gave the Bulldogs a score of 13 points to the Coyotes 6 points. The Coyotes, picking small holes in the Bulldogs line of defense, advanced from Mac's six yard line with only minutes to go, to

Mac's goal line to tie the score 13-13.

Both teams tried desperately in the last minute and a half to break the deadlock 13 all. However, even with maddening cheers and shouts from spectators, neither team was able to produce a score.

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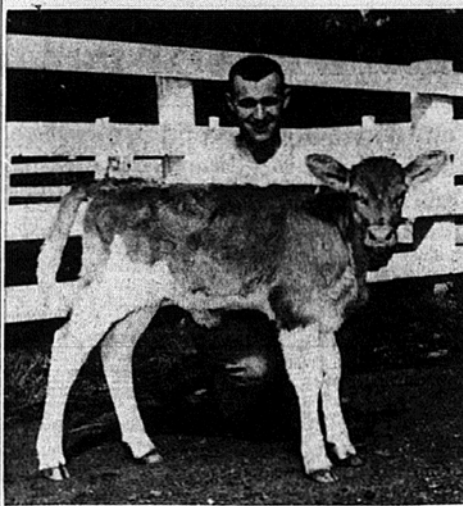

Mac Operates Local Farm; Owns Others In 3 States

Located three miles west of the College on first Street is what is known as the McPherson College farm, and one of the many owned by the college. The manager for this farm is Prof John Ward, assistant professor of rural life and the herdsman of the farm is Mr. Donald Pauley.

Mr. Pauley is in his second year on test in McPherson County.

Cattle Donated

Some of the cattle in the herd have been given by individuals interested in the college herd. At the present time cattle are the only livestock but plans for the future include rebuilding the swine herd that was disposed of several years ago.

When it comes to crops, the college farm is a little different than the average farmer in this area. Its main crops in the order of acres grown are alfalfa, silage type crops, grain sorghum, and wheat.

Irrigation System

To help out in time of dry weather the college has a 1000 gallon per minute capacity irrigating summer pasture and silage crops.

Other Farms

Besides the farm known as the college farm, MacCollege holds many other farms located in Kansas, Nebraska, and Texas.

Some of these farms are owned by the endowment fund of the college. This fund, consists of farms and money given by donors to the college to be invested so they will bear money. The principal amount of the farm or the money may be spent and reinvested in something, but never used up.

All the income from the farms and money goes into the general fund of the college and is used as a supplement to offset tuition rates, etc.

Tenant Farms

All of the farms are on tenant relationships and the college owns 1190 acres of farmland in McPherson, Sumner, Cheyenne, and Seaward Counties in Kansas.

The college owns two farms totalling 620 acres in Carson County, Texas, and a 7½ acre citrus farm in Hidalgo County, Texas. The citrus farm is located in the Rio Grande Valley and is in the process of rebuilding its orchards after a killing frost several years ago.

and money in its annuity fund. This fund is where the donor deeds the farm or gives the money to the college for use.

Specified Return

In this type of fund the college pays the donor a specified return each year for his donation. The older the donor gets the higher the return gets and is good until the death of the donor. At this time the college becomes the sole owner of the property and may use it at the discretion of the board of trustees.

Farms in this fund are a 160 acre farm in Webster County, Neb., and five farms totalling 1616 acres located in Clarke, Dickinson, Geary, and Harvey Counties in Kansas.

Mr. J. H. Fries, of McPherson and former business manager of the college, is the manager and overseer for all the farms in the two areas.

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
