Rodney Eisenbise, sophomore from Garden City, Kans., will be playing the role of Charlie Dalrymple. Meg Brockie will be characterized by Connie Andes, sophomore from Mound City, Mo. Sharon Keith, junior from Chicago, Ill., will be Connie's understudy.

Non-Singing Roles

Most of the non-singing roles have not been assigned yet. Mike Begole, junior from McPherson, has been selected to play the part of Jeff Douglas, but non-singing parts for seven men and three women are still available. Final tryouts for these ten roles will be held tonight at 7 p.m. in Mohler 227.

Most of the rehearsals for "Brigadoon" will be held in the late afternoons although evening practices are scheduled for the last two or three weeks. Ed Mohler, junior from McPherson, has been chosen as stage manager for the production.

Costumes Borrowed

Forty costumes have been borrowed from the drama department of the University of Arizona for use in this production. These costumes include the traditional, colorful plaids of the Scottish people.

Even with these forty costumes, twenty additional outfits are still needed to complete the costuming.

Scottish Highlands

"Brigadoon" has its setting in the highlands of Scotland. The musical brings to life a legendary village steeped in romance and adventure.

The production will be staged March 9 and 10 in Brown Auditorium. One of the two performances will be given for the Regional Youth Conference. One hundred students are involved in this production.

Evening Courses To Be Given Next Semester

Several evening school and television courses will be offered in the spring semester at MacCollege. The courses include first and second year Russian, music in the elementary school, introduction to education, and psychology of adolescence.

Television courses in structure and function of American government and introduction to modern biology will be offered with Dr. Raymond Flory, professor of history and political science, as local coordinator of the government course and Dr. John Burkholder, professor of biology, as local coordinator of the biology course.

Enrollment for night courses will be held the first 30 minutes of the first class session and during regular office hours at the registrar's office. No enrollment will be approved after the second session of the class.

A three hour renaissance literature course has been added to the night courses for next semester. The time when classes will meet has not been determined. Other classes may be offered if six or more persons petition it.

Tuition fees are \$21 per semester hour for the regular night courses and \$15 per hour for the television courses. Enrollment in the television courses may be made in the registrar's office or by mail.

Volunteers Give Assistance In West Pakistan Project

Peace Corps volunteers working in West Pakistan will work in agriculture, education, and community development. They will serve as junior instructors in Pakistan colleges, teach new farming methods, and implement care, organize youth clubs, and work in hospitals.

College degrees and even graduate work were considered essential for some assignments. For others, persons with trade or high school vocational training and working experience were accepted.

Training For West Pakistan

Training for work in West Pakistan will be taken at Colorado State University, Peace Corps Field Training Camp in Puerto Rico, and Peshawar Academy in West Pakistan.

At the Colorado University, language, linguistics, instruction in American studies, international affairs, health care, and technical subjects will be studied.

Field work in community development, physical conditioning, further work in American studies, world affairs, and problems of cross cultural adaptation will be taken up in Puerto Rico.

Study Includes Languages
Study in West Pakistan will include further language and area study, visits to Pakistani villages, and orientation lectures by Pakistani officials.

Volunteers will be divided into two teams: one educational and the other multi-purpose.

Brown Accepts Position With Bethany Seminary

Dale Brown, director of religious life and assistant professor of philosophy and religion, has accepted a position at Bethany Biblical Seminary beginning with the school year 1962-1963. He will be associate professor of theology, teaching theology and historical theology at the Chicago, Ill., Seminary.

A 1946 McPherson College graduate, Professor Brown was pastor of the Stover Memorial Church of the Brethren in Des Moines, Iowa, for seven years. Following this he did graduate work at Northwestern University and worked as director of field work

at Bethany. This is his fourth year at McPherson.

Professor Brown and his family will either buy or build on the new seminary property which is west of Chicago in York Center. Until the completion of the new buildings, he will be commuting approximately twenty miles to the present seminary campus.

Other Seminaries

An Evangelical United Brethren Seminary and a Baptist College and Seminary are located close to the new Brethren seminary site, so faculties and buildings will be used jointly by the three institutions. Bethany is the only theological seminary of the Church of the Brethren.

Besides adding Professor Brown to their faculty, Bethany has also engaged Donald Durnbaugh, professor of history of Juniata College, to join their institution in the fall.

Doctoral Dissertation

Professor Brown is presently working on his doctoral dissertation entitled, "The Problem of Subjectivism in Pietism with Special Reference to the Theology of Spener and Francke."

Most of the reference material for the dissertation is written in German.

His major field is in church history with minors in theology and secular history.

Three Children

Professor Brown and his wife, also a MacCollege graduate, have three children, Deanna Gae, Dennis, and Kevin Ken.

Concerning the change, Professor Brown said, "It will be a challenge to teach in a graduate school where all the students are college graduates, but there will be many things I will miss about the college campus."

Porter Attends Regional Foreign Student Conference

The National Association of Foreign Student Advisors and the Institute of International Education held a regional conference on Jan. 5 and 6 at the International House in Denver, Colo. Robert Porter, assistant professor of German and literature at McPherson College, attended this conference.

The conference was designed to bring together foreign student advisors, teachers of English as a foreign language, and people who coordinate and make a project of the entertainment of foreign students.

Bill Explained

A new Fulbright-Hays Bill was explained. It provides for the founding of a separate office in the Department of State to deal with foreign exchange and to facilitate government spending in this area.

People attending the conference shared opinions, methods, and experiences in working with foreign students in special English classes for these students. Ideas were discussed concerning textbooks.

In the area of the entertainment a new organization has been established to coordinate business and professional interests in the community to provide hospitality

and educational opportunities for foreign students and for themselves. Hospitality groups exist in ports of entry and will meet foreign students coming into the country.

Community Work

The Committee on Friendly Relations in New York City, headed by Mary Thompson, is an example of community work. In one incident, because of political problems in Kenya, a group of African students planning to study in the United States arrived in New York, and none had money to reach their individual destinations.

No one, not even the representatives of the Kenyan government, would or could do anything about the situation. This committee of volunteer labor took on the project, borrowed money from various sources, and sent the students to their respective

destinations, relying on the schools to replace the borrowed funds.

Conference Talks

Talks at the conference included a speech by the British Consul Sir John Fletcher-Cooke, Former Deputy Governor of Tanganyika. He spoke on the dim outlook in education of African students.

He stated that few Africans receiving a school education finish with a high school degree, and government feelings seem to be that those who do finish for the most part should complete their university education in Africa.

These graduates would be used immediately to train more high school students. In these areas African families need the youth for farming, and as yet they seldom feel the value of education enough to sacrifice farm help.

Evans Showed Slides

T. H. Evans of the College of Engineering of Colorado State University spoke and showed slides about the establishment of a graduate school of engineering in Thailand. This was done through funds provided by SEATO.

This conference which Professor Porter attended was held at the International House in Denver. This is a mansion bought by interested citizens of the community who pay dues to be members.

They have lectures, exhibitions, classes, and recreational activities to bring Americans and

foreign students together. The dining room is now a restaurant which serves members and their guests with excellent French cuisine.

Contemporary Art

A well-known exhibition of contemporary Spanish art was on display in all of the rooms of the house at that time. The price range was from \$275 to \$2000.

Also in the International House is an office of UNESCO run by volunteers with a large supply of information about their activities. They also operate a hospitality program for foreign students whereby they can visit and be entertained in various homes in the community.

In Germany the German Youth Plan provides for trips and excursions throughout Europe. In America this is done through volunteer work.

This conference brought out that one of the needs for study in America is in the area of Latin American affairs.

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Bulldogs Lose Three In Conference Competition

Basketball action has continued for the McPherson College Bulldogs with conference losses to Ottawa, C. of E., and Bethany, and competition in the ninth annual Holiday Tournament.

Ottawa broke a tie with two minutes to play by tallying seven points at the free throw line and dropping in one field goal to defeat the Bulldogs 76 to 61, Dec. 15. This victory left Ottawa with a conference of 3-1 and McPherson 1-3.

Mac outshot Ottawa by making 39 per cent of its shots from the field to Ottawa's 38 per cent, and 71 per cent of its free throws to Ottawa's 68 per cent.

John McAninch of Ottawa scored 17 points and Mike Brown scored 16, while Deryl Elmore scored 14 for Mac and John Heidebrecht tallied 14 points for the Bulldogs.

Sterling Wins Tourney

The Sterling College Warriors won the ninth annual McPherson Holiday Tournament by defeating Northwestern State of Alva, Okla., 77 to 65 in a close contest. The tournament's third place winner was College of Emporia, who defeated Tabor 89 to 71 in the final round.

On a free throw in the final second, Kansas Wesleyan won fifth place by defeating Phillips University of Enid, Okla., 52-51.

Bethel College defeated the McPherson Bulldogs 69 to 56 to take seventh place in the final tournament standings. Ralph Rindt was high scorer for the Bulldogs with 11 points.

The C. of E. Presbies rolled over the Bulldogs Jan. 5, 81 to 56, to win another KCAC contest. After a half time score of 47 to 27, the Presbies outscored the Bulldogs 34 to 29. Rathman led Emporia's scoring with 19 points.
