

College to Sponsor Summer Abroad

McPherson College will sponsor a tour abroad this summer for alumni, parents, and friends of the College. The 22-day trip will be under the guidance of a professional travel agency, and informed hosts will be with the group to answer questions and give directions.

The tour will leave New York by jet July 12 and will arrive in Paris that evening. From Paris the tour will go to Lucerne, Como, Florence, Rome, Riccione, Venice, Innsbruck, Heidelberg, Coblenz, Amsterdam, Copenhagen, London, and then back to New York.

There will be time during each of these stops to allow

tour participants to sight-see on their own or visit friends.

In most cases two days will be spent at each of the above cities with trips to cathedrals, folklore gatherings and widely known points of interest.

Some of the tour features will be shopping time in Florence, exploring the "Eternal City" of Rome, spending a night in the Italian Lake Country, Cruising the canals of Amsterdam, and visiting Tivoli Gardens in Copenhagen.

Cost of the trip, which lasts from July 12 until Aug. 2, is \$395. This fee, minus the \$100 registration deposit, will be due about six weeks before departure.

Easterling Assumes Role As President of ACCK

Dr. Verlin Robert Easterling has taken office as president of the Associated Colleges of Central Kansas, an organization which was incorporated last May. Dr. Easterling's office is located at 200 East Kansas in McPherson, a central location for the six member colleges.

Prior to his present position, Dr. Easterling was vice president of operations at Wichita State University. Before that he was president of Northern Oklahoma Junior College, Tonkawa, for twelve years.

The six church-related colleges forming the Associated Colleges of Central Kansas are Bethel at Newton, Bethany at Lindsborg, Kansas Wesleyan at

Salina, McPherson, Sterling, and Tabor at Hillsboro.

Joint planning sessions have been held with various departments wherein members of the ACCK have been studying means by which better education facilities may be presented by each member college.

All the member colleges are located within a radius of 35 miles in Central Kansas, with McPherson being near the center.

The employment of a director to co-ordinate activities and the opening of a headquarters office is expected to greatly facilitate co-operative efforts among the colleges.

College Offers Evening Classes

Evening courses are again being offered this semester with enrollment taking place in the Registrar's Office up until the third session of each course.

Thursday evening classes are as follows: The Short Story; Principles of Feeding; Christian Education of Youth and Adults; Science in the Elementary School; International Relations; and History and Philosophy of Education.

Monday evening courses are Machine Tool Operation; Seminar on Africa, and The Teaching of Reading in the Junior and Senior High Schools.

Introduction to Ceramics and Advanced Ceramics are offered on Tuesday evening.

All courses are open to adults.

Interviews for teaching positions at Wichita or North Kansas City, and for Civil Service positions, will be held next week.

Students who are interested in teaching may apply to Wichita schools on Jan. 30, 9-11:30 a.m., or to North Kansas City schools on Jan. 31, 9-12 noon.

Dr. Miller Appointed Dean at Elizabethtown

Dr. Wayne L. Miller, associate professor of speech, philosophy and religion, and director of religious life, has been appointed Dean of Faculty at Elizabethtown College in Pennsylvania and will assume his duties there on July 1, 1967.

Elizabethtown College, affiliated with the Church of the Brethren, is a liberal arts college whose enrollment exceeds that of McPherson by approximately 500 students.

In explanation of his decision to go into administrative work, Dr. Miller said, "I have served on the Administrative Committee for the past three years. As a result of that experience, more than anything else, I decided to 'try my hand' at administration."

For the past three years, McPherson faculty has been allowed to select one person to represent them on the Administrative Committee. Each year, they awarded Dr. Miller that honor.

Dr. Miller is also chairman, Religious Life Committee; chairman, Board of Administration, McPherson Church of the Brethren; and president, McPherson chapter, American Association of University Professors.

Seven Parts To Be Cast At Auditions

Auditions for Neil Simon's comedy, "Come Blow Your Horn," will be held Jan. 26 at 7:30 in Brown Auditorium. This will be the final stage production of the season.

"There are seven parts to be cast," said Loren D. Reyher, assistant professor in English and theater, "and we hope that many persons will audition for this play."

"Come Blow Your Horn," one of the hits of the 1961 Broadway season, is the story of a playboy whose numerous amours have kept him from realizing his ambitions in the waxed-fruit business.

Complications occur when his younger brother comes to live with him and begins to sow a few wild oats of his own. The apartment abounds with beautiful women, and the comedy is intensified by the arrival of the boys' long-suffering mother and irate father.

The cast will be announced on Jan. 30 and rehearsals will begin that evening. Production dates are March 8-11.

"Bishop G. Oxnham," is soon to be released.

Based on Dr. Miller's doctoral dissertation, the book is the story of the controversial Methodist bishop and World Council of Churches president whose opinions concerning the radical right in America prompted his appearance before the House Un-American Activities Subcommittee.

Dr. Miller came to McPherson College in 1963 from Dixon, Ill., where he was pastor of the Dixon Church of the Brethren.

After graduating from Manchester College, North Manchester, Ind., Dr. Miller earned his M. S. degree from Purdue University, a B. D. degree from Bethany Biblical Seminary, and his Ph. D. from the University of Southern California.

Dr. Miller's career has included pastorates in Indiana, Arizona, California and Illinois, and teaching positions at Manchester College, Purdue, University of Southern California and Los Angeles State College.

Test Given To Juniors

The McPherson county Soil Conservation District is offering five \$25 scholarships for McPherson county teachers to use this summer at McPherson College.

The scholarships were established in an effort to help children understand the need for conservation of natural resources.

The coffeehouse will be opened from 7:30 - 10:30 p.m. Sunday - Thursday and 7:30 p.m. - 1:00 a.m. Friday - Saturday.

The purpose of the McPherson College Coffeehouse, as stated by the coffeehouse committee, is to meet the social

needs and wants of the student body.

The coffeehouse will be a place where many types of creative recreation and entertainment may be enjoyed. Students will be encouraged to freely share their talents.

The informal off-campus atmosphere will be conducive to interaction and dialogue - exchange of ideas, opinions, and general conversation.

According to the rules and regulations governing the coffeehouse, there will be no drinking, no gambling and no promiscuous activities.

The rules also state: no one is to enter the premises if intoxicated; no destroying house furniture; no defacing house walls, and no obscene language.

The committee stated that any violation of these rules will be grounds for action by the Student Court.

Participation will be limited to students, alumni, faculty, administration and anyone immediately connected with the College.

All participants will have the privilege of bringing guests on to the premises. Each participant will be responsible for his guests.

All policy decisions that have to be immediately made in the coffeehouse will be done by the

manager in charge at the time. His decision will stand.

All social activities and organizations that wish to use the coffeehouse must schedule their activities with the chairman of the coffeehouse committee.

Anyone who feels he has been unjustly treated by any member on the coffeehouse staff may bring his grievance forward to the house chairman or his assistant.

Snavely stated that contracts for students to operate the coffeehouse will include the positions of assistant manager - who will not be paid - and waitresses and maintenance engineer who will be paid \$1.00 per hour.

The officers of the coffeehouse are: Snavely, chairman; Jones, treasurer; John Lane, soph, Piqua, Ohio, naming of the coffeehouse; Georgeanne Tomlinson, soph, Denver, Colo., secretary.

Other members of the staff are Dahlquist; Kathy Shank, jr., Fayetteville, W. Va.; Stan Goczowski, jr., Jersey City, N. J.; Jim Halderman, soph, Mannheim, Pa.; Shrock; Brubaker, and Thomas W. Deal, assistant professor of philosophy and religion.

All entertainment in the coffeehouse will be under the auspices of the appointed assistant manager.

Faculty members gave up a portion of their holiday to attend a retreat to prepare for classroom work. Student council leaders intensified their efforts toward realization of a student coffeehouse.

On Nov. 25, the Administrative Committee made available, rent free to the students, the College owned house—address mentioned above—to be developed into a coffeehouse.

It will also be a place where organizations can hold their meetings; where refreshments may be purchased—such as coffee, pop, doughnuts, cheese sandwiches and other small items.

To make this coffeehouse a positive project for the McPherson campus, each of us, as responsible students, must become involved. Let's "dig in" and make this a place, we, as a student body, will be proud to be a part of.

I would be a little naive to say that the Coffeehouse Committee does not need financial aid—we do. So give this some consideration when a coffeehouse representative stops in to see you.

Due to certain characteristics, I have heard some negative comments against the coffeehouse. I know, before the project had begun, that a place could not be constructed to appeal to everyone on campus.

However, I question some of the objectives attached to some of the negative statements. Am I to believe that man, in his decision making, would eliminate creative ideas toward obtaining positive goals just because he does not agree with one or two characteristics? How about giving it a try?

I hope the coffeehouse will not only benefit the members of the McPherson College Community this year, but will continue to be an asset to the college for many years.

There it is: ingenuity, atmosphere, creativity combined to make a successful coffeehouse, a place where college students—and their professors—want to go.

Your assistance and consideration will be greatly appreciated by the Student Council. Let's have an enjoyable time developing the coffeehouse. Thank you.

McPherson College cagers were busy during the holiday break, winning one game and losing three.

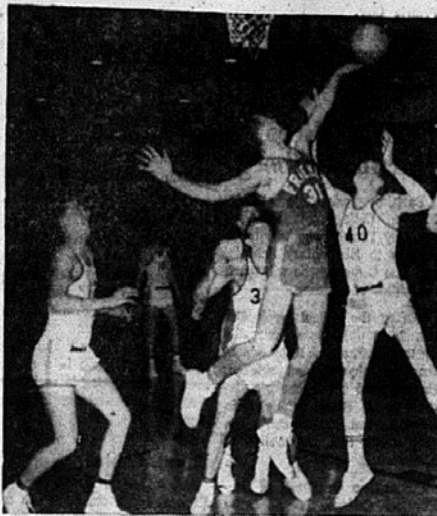

Center, Gene Phillips, was the high scorer for the Bulldogs with 17 points, while Wilkey was high for the Warriors with 19 points.

The Ottawa Braves defeated the Bulldogs on the Ottawa court, Jan. 7. The league-leading Braves were able to post only a 59-54 margin over the Bulldogs.
