Kansas history teachers will meet on campus

Dr. Raymond Flory, professor of history and political science, announced that plans are well underway for the annual meeting of the Kansas History Teachers Association, which will be held on the McPherson campus March 21 and 22.

This is the major organization at the state level for history professors of all colleges and universities in Kansas.

Dr. Flory is president of the Association for the current year, and the annual meeting is customarily held on the campus where the president is employed.

Student looks at Mac College as similar to 9 years ago

Dear Editor:

It has been with a great deal of interest that I have read the letters you receive each week. It has also been interesting to note the number of letters you receive.

It is interesting because I have nine years to look back on since I was last here at this College.

Nine years ago, the students didn't have as much concern, openly, with the institution they were attending. I feel that now the College conducts its business very much as it did then.

It would seem that I'm saying that no changes have occurred in the past nine years, and almost immediately someone would point to the new rule that allows smoking on campus.

Well, it's great, but typical of this campus. While it's a step in the right direction, it points out the attitudes prevalent here.

It took nine years to institute this small change, all the while ignoring the rest of the

world and its facts, hoping that by ignoring it, it would all go away.

Thanks to Ted Livingston (and this is not a testimonial) and others, for the first time the students on this campus at least have the right to participate in affairs of this College in a faculty-student relationship. But more needs to be done.

The College itself needs to examine its archaic grading structure and its manner of educational standards. True, it may be on the "drawing board" or it may be being "studied," but the stress needs to be on action.

I would like to see this College enter into more dialogue with its students, to give them a more open forum on more subjects, and to respect mutual wishes where possible.

I would like to see more intelligent responses from faculty and students to events on the campus and outside the confines of the campus.

I would like to see more

responses to matters that mutually concern both. In short, I would like to see the students have an equal voice in the matters that concern them in such a vital manner.

On many other campuses, these changes are 99 per cent effective. I should like to see this school join those brave few that have instituted these necessary changes without waiting for another nine years to pass.

McPherson College Bulldogs ranked seventh in the McPherson Jaycee Invitational Basketball Tournament held Nov. 25-27 at the McPherson High School Roundhouse.

St. Mary of the Plains at Dodge City captured the trophy by defeating Peru State, Peru, Neb., 104-75. Baker University grabbed third prize by downing Kansas Wesleyan University at Salina 79-70.

Sacred Heart College of Wichita earned fifth place by defeating Sterling College 91-84. McPherson Bulldogs ranked seventh by romping Bethany College 106-80.

McPherson had the highest team score in the tourney.

In the first round of tournament play, Baker defeated the Bulldogs 73-64. Both teams played a close game for most of

the first half with the lead changing hands a few times.

Late in the period, Baker started hitting and gained a ten point margin at the half to lead 33-28. In the last half, the Dogs outscored Baker 36-35, but it was not enough. John Smith was high man for the Dogs with 21 points.

Dormitories close Dec. 20

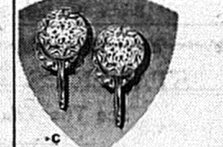
The resident dormitories on campus will close for the Christmas vacation Dec. 20 and will reopen Jan. 5 for the beginning of interterm and second semester.

Loan established for Peace Corp Volunteers

Establishment of a higher education loan fund for returned Peace Corps Volunteers was announced by Peace Corps Director Jack Vaughn.

The fund, started with private money raised by members of the Peace Corps' National Advisory Council, makes a half million dollars available in loans to former Volunteers. Each may borrow up to \$7,500.

Two in every five of the more than 25,000 returned Volunteers continue their education after Peace Corps service, most of them on the graduate level, Vaughn says.

"Volunteers come home enriched by their overseas experiences, with the potential to make positive, substantive contributions to our institutions of higher learning," says Vaughn. "Their insights gained from living deeply in other cultures should be shared with all Americans, which is one of the goals of the Peace Corps, and the fund's purpose is to provide more former Peace Corps Volunteers that opportunity."
