Paul only recently switched from the backstage to performing aspect of Cowsill life, debuting as keyboard man on The Cowsills' second million-seller,

At the Admission Office, studen's should get an admission packet, other information concerning the College, and names of students from their own home town who have shown interest in McPherson College.

During vacation the M:Pheron student can become involved as an ambassador for the college in seeking new students who will build our campuss with the type of student body we can be proud of.

Students who return from vacation with an application and \$10 application fee for one or more new students will be invited to a recognition dinner off

The new student must be recommended by the McPherson student and be an acceptable student to the college (generally this is the student who is in the upper two-thirds of his class).

For those students who return with more than one new student's application and fee, further recognition of a gift will be given.

The Admission Office plans to use more students in the future in the admission process and some may be on a regular basis with pay.

The approved paper states that FSACCK "has become acutely aware of the need to reach the average student in the ACCK with identifiable benefits from the Federated Students. "This fact, along with the belief of the FSACCK Council that education remains the primary goal of the college experience, has led the organization to seek closer ties with the larger organization of the ACCK. . "The route selected would

place student representatives on the major ACCK committees with full voting privileges. As students are represented on major committees of the member colleges, it is felt that the larger organization would benefit from student representation on ACCK committees.
"The ACCK organization

serves the member and the colleges serve the students. Representation on ACCK committees would place students on the ground floor of decisions affecting them. It is the opinion of the FSACCK Council that this involvement would lead to more effective programming of ACCK services and activi-




