

to Dr. Maurice A. Hess

Thirty-three years ago Dr. Maurice A. Hess, then a teacher in the Academy, hung his hat in a McPherson College hallway and began a career which has endeared him to more than 3000 students.

Beginning with Latin and algebra, Dr. Hess has taught everything in the curriculum except music and home economics, has served as a class sponsor, has been advisor to the Spectator, and has coached public speaking and debate.


Forensics, however, has been of primary interest to Dr. Hess, and it was under his watchful eye that McPherson College debate teams won nine state championships. Dr. Hess is a member of Pi Kappa Delta, honorary forensic organization, and holds the distinction of being the only person to serve for five years as governor of the Province of the Plains.

Dr. Hess is recognized as a distinguished Christian educator, not only in McPherson, but also outside our immediate college area. His name appears in *Who's Who in American Education*, the *Directory of American Scholars*, and *Who's Who in the Mid-West*. His subtle wit has made him well-known as a public speaker, and his scholarly writings have appeared before state conventions.

He is best known, however, for his incomparable classes in freshman English. After students have graduated, they look back and find much of the glitter of college days faded, subjects forgotten, and little perplexities which were paramount in under-graduate years shrunk into trivialities. Invariably one memory remains. It is of the man behind the desk in room 30, Sharp Hall.

It is doubtful whether the Crusaders ever found a more willing, energetic, and persistent champion of their cause than has McPherson College in the modest genius from Pennsylvania. Intellectual, punctual, and humorous, Dr. Hess has devoted the major portion of his life to the attainment and maintenance of high academic standards, moral integrity, and Christian fellowship.

We students of McPherson College recognize although inadequately, the immeasurable values which we have received from having known the man and having studied under his tutelage and influence. In appreciation for his devoted service and challenging spirit, we dedicate the 1952 Quadrangle to Dr. Maurice A. Hess.

McPherson College, a dream which became a reality! From a campus containing a single structure, that of "old Fahnestock Hall, to one accommodating nine buildings; from an enrollment of seventy in its first year to one several times that number—these are two visible advancements of our college.

But little do we realize the strivings, endeavors and the true pioneer spirit of our forefathers whose ambitious labor and genuine foresight recognized the need of a Brethren college west of the Mississippi, and, in 1883, began working on such a project.


Many problems arose complicating the progress of such a project—among these was the difficulty in selecting a site for the college. McPherson, a town situated on broad Kansas plains, was finally selected. "McPherson College and Industrial Institute" opened its doors for the first time on September 5, 1888. One milestone was passed on February 12, 1889, when the name "McPherson College" was definitely adopted.

As mentioned before, our campus has been enlarged; our enrollment increased. As the college originators had hoped, McPherson College has provided Christian education for its young people, particularly those of the region west of the Mississippi, although students from all over the United States as well as those of far-away countries have been under its influence. It is hoped that our college will continue able training of its young people; that its students will always prove their usefulness to society in their future life after the experiences and influences of our college. Although McPherson College enrolled only seventy its first year, many of these seventy later became prominent names in the church. Through the years, McPherson College has been noted for the number of its graduates who become active workers in the church. This, too, we hope is a continual and perpetual characteristic of our college.

In a world which, from all indication, is in constant chaos, bitter dispute, confusion and unrest, the Christian college is vitally needed. It strives to teach an individual not only to get along with those around him, but attempts to show him the importance of loving our supposed enemies. It teaches, not only the set laws of science, but the influences our Creator plays on every part of nature. It teaches a girl to be a good homemaker; a boy, the arts of his chosen work. It teaches them to build homes of a Christian nature, to raise their children with religious ideals. Our college emphasizes the fact that each individual is responsible to the world for its success and eventual peace.

Yes, the world is in distress, and the Christian college, and, specifically, McPherson College, stands as a beam of light and essence of hope to its eventual untangling and a full realization of "peace on earth, good will to all men."


SHARP HALL



Sharp Hall, affectionately called the "Ad building" by many, houses the offices for Macollege administrators. The chapel, a place for programs of spiritual stimulation or enriching entertainment, the SAR, in which the Players' Club performs, the SUR and Doghouse which furnish relaxation and refreshment, and classrooms comprise Sharp Hall's contribution to the college.

Before 1897, Sharp Hall had only a tar roof and many stories are told of how classes were managed when it rained!





OLD FAHNESTOCK HALL

Old Fahnestock Hall was the first building on campus, and, for a few years, served as dormitory, College, and library. A wagon known as the "dormitory carry-all" was kept in front of the building and used to convey anything and everything between the college and city. In construction from its three-fold purpose to its strict adherence to dormitory life, a number of alterations were made on the inside. Many stories and legends of Fahnestock Hall have grown out of the amusing tales told by early students of McPherson College. In 1941 the old building was replaced by "new" Fahnestock Hall.

HARNLY HALL





The Alumni Gymnasium, built in 1911 was replaced by the present Physical Education Building in 1935.






FRANTZ INDUSTRIAL ARTS and DELL LAB.

Coach Woodard again used the split T formation which proved very successful with tacklers, George Keim and Don Stevens, and guards Bob Powell and Marvin Ferguson paving the way with brilliant blocking. The sparkling running of Eddie Ball, Gene Smith, and co-captain Bob Kerr, and the field generalship of Wayne Blickenstaff were just too much for the opposition.

The defensive team played a great part in winning our games. With linebacker John Robison calling the defensive formations and Loren Blickenstaff, Bob Peel and backs Tommy O'Dell and Dwight McSpadden playing great defense. The old veteran, Chuck Petefish, held down the safety position. No one great player can be singled out because they all worked as a unit.

Four Bulldogs found berths on the All-Conference roster: George Keim, rampaging tackle from Idaho, and Bob Peel, hard-hitting end from McPherson on the offensive line-up and on the conference defensive team were Loren "Red" Blickenstaff, defensive tackle, and co-captain Chuck Petefish, the canine's pass defending ace.

The four horsemen of the Bulldog's offensive backfield, co-captain Bob Kerr, Gene Smith, Eddie Ball, and Wayne Blickenstaff were awarded honorable mention.

When the bats had stopped cracking at the end of the 1951 baseball season at McPherson College, statistics showed that Coach Wareham's baseball team had experienced a better season on the diamond than had been the case for a period of years. The Bulldogs won 10 games and lost only three.

Coach Wareham's team showed superiority to its opponents in all fields by out-hitting them 278 to 217 and out-fielding them 899 to 885.

The pitching staff on the Bulldog squad was superb. Glenn Gaver, local freshman righthander, dominated the pitching staff with five wins against one loss; Bill Moore, the fast-balling junior from Chicago won four pitching decisions.

For the second season in a row, Chuck Petefish, the slouch-stanced shortstop from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, led the club at bat. Chuck smashed a torrid .455 with 25 hits in 55 times at bat, and also was the club leader in triples, homers, total bases, and runs batted in.

Four of the regulars had batting averages better than .300: Petefish, Loren Blickenstaff at .341, Grindle at .327, and Gaver at .319. L. Blickenstaff was the club's base-running star, scoring 19 runs and stealing 13 bases. Grindle topped the team with six doubles and was runner-up to Petefish with 15 runs batted in.

The track men of McPherson College fairly ran with wings as the Bulldogs enjoyed their best season in the cinder sport. Records were broken with amazing regularity. They won five of the seven meets they entered and took second and a third in the other two.

Bob Bechtel broke the college record for the two mile run at the NAIB meet with a 9:51.5 run.

Flying Dale Carpenter broke the school records in the 110 and 220 yard low hurdles. Skimming the 110 yard low hurdles in 15.6 seconds flat and whirling off the 220 yard hurdles in an amazing 24.9 second sprint. The previous record for the 220 was 25 seconds, a record standing since 1923.

With Bob Kerr, Bob Wilson, Paul Heidebrecht, and Dave Metzler carrying the baton the mile relay team broke the old record with a 3:31.4 in the quadrangular meet held at Emporia.

The 440 yard relay team consisting of Dale Carpenter, Dave Metzler, Bob Kerr, and Merlin Miller burned the cinder track to bring home another school record with a 45.2 second run at the Wichita U Freshmen Relays. The same team raced to another school record in the 880 yard relay with a 45.24 second run.

The squad, made up mostly of underclassmen shows prospects of an experienced and well-balanced track squad and new records for the coming year.




