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
Variety at McPherson

The excitement for the seniors really began at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday the 25th when commencement exercises began.


During the ceremonies, Kelly Thomas, Senior Class President, gave her address to the Class of 1986.





Finally, Computer Science and Mathematics are offered by the Department of Mathematical Sciences.


Courses in the Division of Natural Sciences range from Astronomy to Multivariate Mathematics to Swine Production.




Applied Arts and Sciences

Vice-President Tucker Resigns



As of June 30, 1986, Dr. Norma Tucker resigned from her position as Vice-President of Academic Services. Her resignation was handed to Dr. Paul Hoffman on March 21.

Dr. Tucker served the College for 15 years; for the last six, she served as Vice-President for Academic Services. She began her career at McPherson as Assistant Professor of English and Journalism and simultaneously serving as Director of Publicity. In 1976 she was appointed as Associate Dean of the College. Three years later she became Dean of the Faculty.

Academically, she received her baccalaureate degree from McPherson College in 1967; the M.L.S. from the University of Oklahoma, the Sp.E. from Wichita State University, and the Ed.D. degree from the University of Kansas.

While Vice-President, she also taught part-time and published various articles in different publications.

Dr. Tucker resigned her position in order to seek new directions in the years to come.


