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















"We are excited about the prospects for next year. Our goal is to win the conference," Malone said.











Glen Snell came to McPherson College in 1990 as director of financial aid. Mr. Snell became assistant professor


of accounting three years later and currently serves as a freshman advisor as well as the chair of the MAC faculty. Mr. Snell leaves McPherson College to pursue a private business.

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
