







## Dill begins new chapter in McPherson College history

Dr. Dill came to McPherson from Schreiner College, Kerrville, Tex., where he served as Senior Vice President. Before ever reaching Schreiner College, Dr. Dill undertook jobs such as being a pastor at two different Churches of the Brethren. According to Dill the reason he was first attracted to the position of president was because of the mission of the college.

"Teaching students how to take pencil and paper tests well is not education. Thoughtful participation in the life of a college is part of what being productive in life is all about," said Dill.





The Bulldogs had a record season with five wins and five losses. The team closed out the season by winning the last four games. This was the first season since 1988 which ended in consecutive wins.


With 1216 total rushing yards this season, Rudolph James broke a McPherson College rushing record set 46 years ago.

# Men's Basketball

## A Recap of the Season

After beginning the season as winners of nine out of their first twelve ball games, the McPherson College men's basketball team suffered through a discouraging second half of the season and failed to qualify for the conference tournament.

The Dogs finished the 1996-97 schedule with an 11-14 record, 4-12 in the Kansas Collegiate Athletic Conference.

Despite a semi-sluggish start, the Bulldogs won eight out of nine games during a stretch in the middle of the schedule. The team performed especially well following the Christmas break, out-playing opponents on both ends of the floor.

Following a lopsided win over Kansas Wesleyan in mid-January, the men were only able to notch one more conference victory the remainder of the season.

"The conference really turned into a big, physical inside game in just this past season," said head coach Roger Trimmell. "The guys are going to have to get in the weight room."

Nonetheless, the team was competitive and on most nights was in a position to win their games. "Many of the ball games we lost were close," Trimmell said.

Looking to next season, it appears that the majority of the team—including a good number of players who started at one point during the year—will return. Only two seniors—Brandon Rice and Jason Dingman—were on the roster this year, and hopes are high that the off-season will produce an immediate impact recruiting class, as well as contribute to the development of the current group.

Furthermore, the junior varsity squad, under the direction of first-year coach Jeff Luster, enjoyed a solid season, winning all but two of their conference games.

Post-season awards were limited this year, with junior-transfer Tim Herrs receiving the only recognition among the team members. He was a KCAC All-Conference honorable mention selection.

Head coach Roger Trimmell did notch his 200th career victory on December 14 when the Bulldogs defeated Ottawa University. This was Trimmell's 15th year at the helm of the men's program.


