




Research shows that Gen Xers are skeptical of organized institutions. To what degree are you skeptical?

## CAMPUS JOINS IN WORLD AIDS DAY OBSERVANCE

On December 1, people walking through the hallways of McPherson College had some haunting images greeting them. Throughout the campus, plain, white sheets were draped neatly over all the art on campus. This was done as a visual reminder to what our world would look like without art and creativity. December 1 is known as "World AIDS Day". Throughout this day various memorials and speaking engagements take place all over the country. At McPherson College, we also took part in this somber day. The AIDS Quilt was put on display in Friendship Hall. The quilt is made up of various patches that are put together by the families and victims of AIDS. The quilt is a very moving reminder of how tragic this disease can be.

Manny Diaz, campus minister, led a candlelight walk honoring those who have been victim of the AIDS epidemic. A group of about 15 people walked in silence from the Mingenback Theatre to the McPherson Church of the Brethren. Once people were seated, a fellowship began. The story of Ryan White, one of the first to bring AIDS national attention, was read. Songs were sung and prayers were said aloud and in silence. On Friday, Dec. 3, Friendship Hall gallery was reopened with an exhibit featuring the work of professors Wayne Conyers and Kelly Frigard.

The play *Agnes of God* remains one of the most spellbinding quests for truth. Written by John Pielmeier, the play was first produced on Broadway in 1982 and draws on the diversified strengths of three independent women to craft a seamless offering. The play was presented on Sept. 17, 18, and 19 in the college's new Mingenback Theatre.

Inside a convent, a baby is discovered in a wastepaper basket with the umbilical cord knotted around its neck; the mother, a young nun, is found unconscious by the door to her room. She is duly indicted for manslaughter and her case assigned to a court psychiatrist to determine her sanity. In the meantime, it is discovered the young woman is an "innocent," a nun with a beautiful voice thought to be "of God." Added to this scenario are the court psychiatrist, a woman angered by a past stained by the death of her own sister in a convent, and the nun's atypical mother superior who is determined to protect the woman at all costs.







conference honors by two places. Freshman Michelle Schulz came across at 23:30 in 27<sup>th</sup> place. Sophomore Erin Marshall (38<sup>th</sup>, 26:37), senior Cheri Norsworthy (39<sup>th</sup>, 27:58), and freshman Marcie Bollinger (40<sup>th</sup>, 28:22) completed the team, which placed seventh overall.

"The competition was really tough, but we all ran exceptionally well," Schulz said. "I think we had good team unity; we really pulled together. I'm looking forward to next season and running the same courses again now that I've seen them before." Schulz was regularly number two runner for the women. This year's cross-country program has helped set a solid foundation for coming years. The experience gained this season by both young teams will be a great asset next fall. Coach Lyon is pleased with how the season went.

"Anytime you have a team without a lot of experience there are going to be a few bumps, but it will help us out in the long run," Lyon said.

"We have a lot of experience under our belts now, and we have lots of potential to improve upon for next season. With the new talent we get from recruiting, we'll be more competitive," Porter said.

Lyon believes that a strong recruiting class, along with the experience his runners gained this season, could result in an outstanding season next year.

The 1999 season for the men's and women's cross country teams ended at the Marion Reservoir at the KCAC Conference meet. Freshman Landon Porter was the lone Bulldog to earn All-Conference honors for either team by finishing 13<sup>th</sup> overall. Porter was the lead runner for the men's team this season. Early on, he broke his older brother junior Matthew Porter's mark by over four minutes, and shattered his own record with a personal best of 27:37 at the conference meet, setting yet another school record.

"He was the most consistent runner for the men this year, placing at many of the meets," said Coach Rob Lyon.

Rounding out the men's team were freshmen Shane Netherton (31<sup>st</sup>, 29:34), Heath Garner (51<sup>st</sup>, 33:17), Russell Williams (52<sup>nd</sup>, 33:49), and sophomore James Helton (56<sup>th</sup>, 42:16). With the addition of Helton, the men were able to field a full team. They were able to place sixth, beating Sterling College.

Elizabeth Stover, sophomore, led the Lady Bulldogs placing 17<sup>th</sup> at Conference with a time of 22:32, missing All-Con-

Injury, among other factors, plagued the women's soccer team this season. With the only upperclassmen being two juniors and two seniors on the squad, there was limited college-level playing experience on the field for the Lady Bulldogs. Along with a lack of experience, injuries hampered the team as well.

Sophomore Heather Schooley, Denver, Co. said, "We faced a lot of injuries this year. In fact, a lot of the players were playing with injuries. By the end of the season we were just tired and worn out."

With so many injuries on the team, the ladies were forced to forfeit a game due to not enough players. In many of the other games there were barely enough team members to play, and they played with little or no chance for breaks during the games.

Coach Dane Straight said, "We played with ten or fewer players during all but two games and had to forfeit a game because of not having enough players, due to injuries and ineligibilities."

Because there were so few players able to play, the team

After completing her first season as head coach, Jen Williams sees this season as a building block. She feels this was a hard way to start out, but it provided a good test for her.



The Bulldogs ended the 1999 football season in impressive fashion with a 73-9 win over Tabor College. Head coach Steve Kazo guided the team to a 7-3 record, the school's best since the 1980s. The 14-52 loss against Ottawa kept McPherson out of the play-offs; however, the team rallied to end their season with a convincing victory to send their seniors off in style.

Running back Kevin Steiner, sophomore, was one of several underclassmen to assume starting roles this season. Steiner was the primary running back until senior A.J. Wilson returned from an injury midway through the season. Steiner finished with 552 yard rushing and six TD's, and Wilson had 473 yards and four rushing TD's, including a 128-yard two-TD effort in his final game.

The Bulldogs also had some outstanding talent on the defensive side of the ball. David Snodgrass, sophomore, led the team with 61 tackles for the year. Sophomores in the secondary—Snodgrass, Brandon Born, and Larry Sanders—accounted for more than half of the team's 17 interceptions.

Ingelhart spent four days enduring what the locals of Terror Bay referred to as "Iakulik," meaning "gale winds." The stories told to him by his captain and the old fisherman in town could not have prepared him for the long hours and back-breaking work of his summer job fishing for salmon on board the Hula.

"It was 3 a.m. July 15, 1999 when the sound of rocks scraping the underside of the boat suddenly awoke us. The tide had come up so quickly from the winds that the boat drifted across the channel, slamming it into the rocks. I ran across the deck and hopped in the skiff (a small boat).

"I had to try and tow the boat off the rocks before much more damage occurred. I was towing full speed into the wind and current. The skiff was tilted over far enough to allow water to come over the rails. A gust over 80 knots hit me on the side causing the skiff to flip and sent me swimming. I was saved by a safety ring flung towards me in desperation by another Hula member," he said.

The crew of the Hula joined together as a team and found themselves on top of the water. Three other boats came to their rescue less than an hour later, saving not only the men but also their boat.

"I finished the season with the same boat. I made good money, found plenty of adventure, and now I have enough stories to tell my grandchildren," he said.




