1. Before entering upon his Junior Year, each student must choose one of the following courses of study which will constitute his Major Course. This course will be pursued through the Junior and Senior Years.

2. From the whole list of Optional Studies, each student must, before the beginning of each term, select a full study to be known as a minor study. But the student may not select during his Junior or Senior more than two full Minor studies from any one of the following departments: A. Natural History. B. Chemistry and Mineralogy. C. Physics and Astronomy. D. Mathematics. E. Philosophy and Didactics. F. History and Political Science. G. Greek and Latin. H. German and French. I. English and Music.

3. From the studies of some one of the groups mentioned in (1) or (2) each student must, before the beginning of each term, select a full study, to be known as his Free Elective study. But no student may choose in the same term his Free Elective study from the same group in which he has taken his Major or Minor Study.

4. No student may select a Major, Minor, or Free Elective study from those studies marked with a star (*) without special arrangement with the instructor in that department.

Department of Music.

This department is established for the purpose of affording superior advantages for the study of music in Pianoforte, Organ, Harmony, Voice Culture and Chorus drill.

It is the aim to give each student a knowledge of all the higher branches so will form a substantial ground work on which special studies and virtuosic attainments can be super-imposed.

Among the works studied are Beethoven, Bartini, Mozart, Mendelssohn, Schuman, etc.

Pianó-Forte.

In this department especial attention is paid to the technical touch and a refined and intelligent style of playing.

Cabinet Organ

A systematic instruction is given in technical execution in playing church music, short voluntaries, and interludes all of which exercises are intended to fit persons for the various uses of the instrument.

Chorus Music.

The facilities afforded for studying Choral works give students an opportunity seldom enjoyed for acquaintance with Oratorios and other sacred music. All students have the privilege of attending the beginning in Choral Music Free. And those who are sufficiently advanced can join the Musical Union a society for the higher forms of sacred music for \$2.00 per term.

Harmony

This class has adopted the course in Ritcher's Manual of Harmony.

Rules and Regulations Governing Students.

1. Students should bring with them, besides text-books, a Bible or Testament, Brethren's Hymn book or Gospel Hymns, towels, and a blanket or two, and should have their garments marked with full name.
2. All students are required to be present at Chapel Exercises and all recitations; also to attend Sunday School and one Church service each Lord's day, at the college Chapel or at some other place, where their parents or guardian may direct in writing.
3. Students are required to go to their rooms at the ringing of the study bell and observe order so as not to disturb others in study.
4. Students must extinguish their lights promptly at 10 o'clock P. M. unless excused by the professor in charge of the hall.
5. No lady or gentleman will be allowed to trespass on the territory of the opposite sex, except by special permission of the President.
6. Students desiring to leave the grounds or to visit other students during study hours must obtain permission from the professor in charge of their hall.
7. Ladies and gentlemen will not ride, walk or play together except by special arrangement with the President.
8. Students will be held responsible for misconduct in their rooms, and damage done to school property.
9. No student rooming in the dormitory shall be absent after 10 o'clock P. M. unless by permission of the President.
10. Students may organize literary societies which shall be governed and controlled by a constitution and by-laws, approved by the Faculty.
10. Students desiring to visit the cemetery or go to the city must obtain permission from the President, except on Saturday afternoons between the hours of one and four o'clock when general liberty to go to the city and return is granted.

12. Students will be permitted to meet in the chapel for social intercourse, twenty minutes immediately after supper of each day—Sunday excepted—also for twenty minutes after the close of society meeting, such social meetings to be under the supervision of one or more of the faculty.

13. Visitors desiring to call upon students in the building must apply to the President.

14. All members of the Brethren or German Baptist Church are required to comply with the principles of non-conformity to the world and to conform to the general order of the church in apparel and wearing of the hair. Those who are not members of the German Baptist church are expected to make no display in the use of jewelry and to observe the laws of plainness and simplicity in their apparel.

Prohibitions.

Card playing and similar games; (b) the use of tobacco and chewing gum on the college premises; (c) noisy, disorderly and unseemly conduct; (d) fire-arms or weapons of any kind; (e) the use of profane or obscene language; (f) visiting immoral places; (g) musical instruments except such as are used in the musical department.

In the enforcement of these rules and regulations, any member of the Faculty or any officer of the institution is empowered to correct irregularities and require obedience. Failure to comply on the part of any student will subject him to reprimand, suspension, or expulsion at the discretion of the Faculty.

General Information.

Aim.

The aim of the institution is to provide a thorough, Christian education. The end of this implies such intellectual, moral and religious training as shall harmoniously develop the entire being. It advocates plainness of dress, and simplicity in the habits of life; discourages castes, thus making it a home for rich and poor alike.

Location.

The College is located on College Place, a beautiful site east of the city of McPherson, Kan. This city may be reached by any one of the four leading railways of the west: Rock Island, Santa Fe, Missouri Pacific, and Union Pacific. Street Car line from depots direct to college campus.

Admission.

The college is open to all persons of good, moral character, who may wish to avail themselves of its privileges, and who are sufficiently advanced to prosecute successfully the studies of the course they may wish to enter. Applicants for admission to any classes will be examined in the previous studies leading to the branches they wish to pursue. Those who present certificates of good standing may be admitted without further examination.

Moral and Religious Influences.

It is the aim of the Faculty, in connection with the discipline of the intellect, to inculcate the duties of morality, and the truths of religion. The public exercises of each day are opened with religious worship. Religious services are held in the chapel both morning and evening on each Lord's day. A student's prayer meeting is held on each Wednesday evening. The students are divided into sections. Each section holds its evening service before retiring for the night. Few institutions have equal moral surroundings. There is not a saloon in the city and the prohibitory law is as well enforced as any other.

Among the attractions of the school are the two flourishing Literary Societies, conducted by the students; the "Ciceronian" and "Emersonian." They hold their meetings weekly. Every student is expected to be one a member of either of these societies.

Reports.

A monthly card is issued for each pupil giving the standing in each branch pursued and deportment during the month. These cards are sent to the parents or guardians when the pupil is under twenty-one. A class and deportment record is kept of each student which becomes the property of the college, as a perpetual memorial of the degree of his fidelity and scholarly attainments.
